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PROCEEDINGS 1 2 10:05 a.m. CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: I'm Jeff Young, 3 4 Chairman of the Central Coast Regional Water 5 Quality Control Board. Today is April 28th. Ms. 6 Hewitt, would you like to call the roll. 7 MS. HEWITT: I'm having a bit of a 8 technical problem with the recorder. 9 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: You are. Okay. 10 MS. HEWITT: -- hold for a second? CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: We'll wait for that 11 to be corrected. 12 Folks in the back of the room, would you 13 please remove the placards. I don't want them in 14 15 sight in the hearing room. They serve as a distraction. Please leave them outside. Thank 16 17 you very much. 18 (Pause.) MS. HEWITT: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. 19 20 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay, are you ready 21 now? Why don't we proceed with the roll call. 22 MS. HEWITT: Daniel Press. BOARD MEMBER PRESS: Present. 23 24 MS. HEWITT: Gary Shallcross. 25 BOARD MEMBER SHALLCROSS: Here.

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MS. HEWITT: Jeffrey Young. 1 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Here. 2 MS. HEWITT: Russ Jeffries. 3 4 BOARD MEMBER JEFFRIES: Here. 5 MS. HEWITT: John Hayashi. 6 BOARD MEMBER HAYASHI: Present. 7 MS. HEWITT: Monica Hunter. Absent. 8 Les Bowker. 9 BOARD MEMBER BOWKER: Here. 10 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Michael, would you like to introduce everybody that needs to be 11 introduced. 12 13 MR. THOMAS: Okay. 14 AUDIENCE SPEAKER: (inaudible). 15 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Thank you for letting us know that. And remind us if we talk 16 17 too softly. 18 MR. THOMAS: I'm Michael Thomas, the Assistant Executive Officer for the Water Board. 19 20 I'll introduce staff who are at the meeting here 21 today. And also -- well, first, John Richards, 22 Board's Counsel, is to my right. At the prosecution table is Sorrel Marks, Project Manager 23 24 with the Water Board. 25 Prosecution Staff attorney, Lori Okun.

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Matt Thompson, Project Manager with the Board. And to my right is Carol Hewitt, Executive Assistant.

And we'll have some folks in the back handing out cards. These cards are colored. We're this experiment. If you're opposed to the cease and desist orders, fill out a red card, a speaker card, that is. If you're in favor, fill out a blue card. And if you're Switzerland and you're neutral, fill out a white card.

The bathrooms are through the door to 11 the rear and to my left, to your right, out 12 through with the exit sign above it. And I --13 14 AUDIENCE SPEAKER: (inaudible). 15 MR. THOMAS: You don't have to; you can fill out a white card if you prefer. 16 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: That's just to make 17 18 it easy to categorize visually, that's all. MR. THOMAS: And as AGP Video announced 19 earlier, there is a camera out in the atrium area. 20 21 And this room does have a limit, obviously, so 22 we're going to be asking people to go out to the front and watch the broadcast from there so that 23 24 we don't get too many people in this room. 25 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Folks, what I want

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to do is take a few minutes to describe what's going to be happening today procedure-wise so that everybody at least has some idea of when things are going to happen, when they're not going to happen, and try to accommodate any special needs that may exist.

7 I want to start off with going over the 8 order of presentation. By the way, Mr. Onstot, 9 would you like to introduce the members at your 10 table?

11 MR. ONSTOT: Yes, Mr. Chairman. My name 12 is Stephen Onstot, O-n-s-t-o-t, with Burke, 13 Williams and Sorensen, representing the Los Osos 14 Community Services District. And to my right is 15 Gregory Murphy, also the same firm, representing 16 the CSD.

17 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Thank you. What I 18 want to do, folks, so that everybody can see 19 what's going to happen, is go over how we're going 20 to handle the order of presentations. And we are 21 going to, early on, go over and discuss the 22 preliminary procedural matters.

23 We've had a number of evidentiary 24 objections and other types of objections that have 25 been raised that need to be taken care of before

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we actually get into witnesses speaking.

2 And it occurred to me, Dr. Bowker, and maybe before we go any further, that you would 3 4 like to --5 BOARD MEMBER BOWKER: Make a statement. 6 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: -- make a statement, 7 and then --8 BOARD MEMBER BOWKER: I live in Los Osos, but not at the prohibition zone, I do my 9 10 shopping and so forth. So, it's almost impossible for me to avoid what is called ex parte 11 communications, communications on an issue outside 12 13 of a full quorum. So, on advice of legal counsel 14 and staff, I'm recusing myself from this issue. 15 Thank you. CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay. Thank you, 16 Dr. Bowker. That means you'll be stepping down. 17 18 BOARD MEMBER BOWKER: Yes. CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: All right. Better 19 take your chair with you, Les. 20 21 (Laughter.) CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Our first witnesses 22 23 are here, but I'm just going over the order that 24 we're going to do this thing. And I want people 25 to know, because we may set some things that might

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be somewhat more time-certain for some people. And I'd like everyone to know where we're headed and when they may be speaking.

We have different categories of presenters. The first group of people that are going to be addressing the Board are going to be non-(inaudible) comments by government agencies.

8 And along with those presentations will 9 be what we would consider public comment of 10 interested persons.

11 And that will be followed by 12 presentation of evidence by the Water Board Staff 13 Prosecution Team. We've estimated that time at 14 one hour. And the previous group of speakers that 15 I mentioned, the government and public comments 16 speakers, we've allocated about an hour and a half 17 to them.

And if people feel that - I don't have any speaker cards for that at this point, but, Michael is just going to have to tell me, we're just going to divide that number of speaker cards into the hour and a half and that's how much time the public is going to be given --

24 (Audience speaking simultaneously.)25 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: If people do not

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like that, they can discuss amongst themselves, if 1 2 they know that their comments are going to be similar to others, the possibility of --3 4 (Audience speaking simultaneously.) 5 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Excuse me. No one 6 is required to present anything today from the 7 public or interested persons. An hour and a half 8 is plenty of time in my opinion for those comments to be presented to the Board. 9 10 If people feel they need more time than that they don't have to speak, and that would 11 allow other people with the same comments to have 12 13 more time. That is up to you. An hour and a half 14 is all that we're going to allow for that. 15 One hour, as I said, for the prosecution team's case. Approximately a one-hour lunch break 16 17 probably starting at 1:00. 18 Within this timeframe we are going to probably take a break every hour and a half for 19 20 about 15 minutes or so. When we return from lunch we will have 21

the Los Osos Community Services District put on its case. And we estimate that will be about two hours of time. Up until the completion of the CSD's case, all of those comments are going to be

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incorporated automatically. And all that, any evidence that has been put into the record at that point will automatically be included in each of the individual hearings we will have for the individual property owners.

I worked this out to try to facilitate
the order of testimony and evidence to make it as
workable as possible.

9 Okay. Then after that point in time we 10 will have presentation of property-specific 11 evidence with respect to the proposed cease and 12 desist orders. We're estimating 15 minutes of 13 time by the prosecution staff to only present 14 property-specific information.

We will then have the individual 15 property owners with their presentation of 16 evidence. We're estimating about 15 minutes of 17 18 time for each of them. If any of the individual 45 property owners can make a case for needing 19 20 additional time for specific issues that they feel 21 are very important, the Board will listen to that and consider whether additional time is warranted. 22

23 We do encourage people to incorporate by 24 reference comments and evidence made by previous 25 speakers.

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We will then have cross-examination by designated parties. And that means the prosecution staff, the CSD staff members, and that means the individual property owners. I don't know how long that will take, but we'll see what happens.

7 We will then have rebuttal testimony by 8 the same designated parties. And then we will 9 have closing arguments by these same parties. And 10 the closing arguments, we'll proceed by the Water 11 Board Prosecution Staff, followed by the Los Osos 12 CSD Staff, and then the individual property owners 13 named in the proposed cease and desist orders.

14After that we're then going to have15Board deliberation and consideration of the16proposed orders in front of us.

I don't know how many of you had a chance to review the notice that I'm reading from now. It did go out (inaudible), but there are issues that the Board feels are relevant to what's happening today.

This is not the same hearing that we had before where there was an administrative civil liability before us against the District. This is an entirely different hearing. The issues that

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were presented in that hearing are not necessarily relevant to what's being proposed as an enforcement item in this hearing. 3

4 The first issue that we think is 5 important is the following: Are persons who own 6 or occupy each property, that is the persons named 7 in the proposed cease and desist orders, 8 discharging or threatening to discharge in violation of the Los Osos Baywood Park prohibition 9 10 in the basin plan.

The second issue is the following: 11 Is the requirement for pumping or an alternative or 12 13 equivalent corrective action with each proposed 14 cease and desist order the appropriate remedy for 15 violations of the prohibition. The specific circumstances of each discharge are relevant only 16 to the remedy the Board may adopt if the Board 17 18 finds that violations are taking place or threatening to take place. 19

20 I encourage everybody to try to focus their comments to us on these issues. I'm not 21 22 going to get in the way if you want to use up your time getting into other issues that you deem are 23 24 important. I'll let that happen. But I'm not going to extend time so that you can incorporate 25

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and get into other areas.

2 The big area that is not at issue here as far as the Board is concerned is the legality 3 4 or the validity of the prohibition zone, itself. 5 If people feel that that should be challenged, and 6 that there is something wrong with it, there are 7 other forums for that challenge to take place. It 8 is not going to take place here at this hearing. 9 I anticipate that we're not going to 10 complete all of these proposed CDOs today. I just don't think it's possible to do it. And I don't 11 know how many we're going to get done, we're going 12 13 to get some of them done. I just don't know what 14 number we will complete. 15 If we come to that point that we will continue the hearing, there may be a subpanel of 16 the Board that's appointed to continue with that 17 18 effort. Or maybe the entire Board of five. But I want you to know that I'm well aware that it's a 19 20 daunting task to tackle all 45. I don't want to 21 rush through going through these simply for the 22 sake of completion. Okay, one thing I would like to know 23 24 about, and this has to do with the individual

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property owners. If there are any of them that

have any pressing health issues or childcare 1 issues or anything that we should consider in 2 terms of how we want to prioritize the individual 3 CDO hearings. And you guys --4 5 AUDIENCE SPEAKER: -- pick up our 6 daughter by 5:00, so it would be great if we left before 5:00. 7 8 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay, and your name, sir? 9 10 MR. STOLEY (Phonetic): James Stoley 11 (phonetic.) CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay. 12 13 AUDIENCE SPEAKER: Does hair loss count 14 in this whole --15 (Laughter.) CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Well, if it did, I'm 16 17 going to check into it. 18 Okay, I just want to make sure we got that first individual. Okay. Anyone else that 19 20 has any pressing -- yes, sir, can you stand up so 21 we can hear you? MR. MOYLAN: Yeah, my name is Bill 22 Moylan. I've arranged to go see my father who's 23 24 in Illinois. He's in an urgent care facility. I'm leaving Monday and going to be gone for a 25

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week, so if this hearing goes beyond the 1 parameters of today, then I wouldn't be able to 2 attend next week. And I definitely want to 3 4 attend, so. 5 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay. 6 MR. MOYLAN: Thank you. 7 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Thank you. Anyone 8 else? Yes, sir. 9 AUDIENCE SPEAKER: I'm disabled; I can't 10 stand and I can't see because everyone's standing (inaudible) -- back here and got here early --11 AUDIENCE SPEAKER: He can have my chair. 12 13 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay. Sir, why 14 don't you come up here. AUDIENCE SPEAKER: Well, I've got a 15 special chair. I can't sit in those chairs --16 17 AUDIENCE SPEAKER: Can I move my chair? 18 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Do you have you 19 chair with you? 20 AUDIENCE SPEAKER: Yes, I do. 21 AUDIENCE SPEAKER: Is it okay if we roll 22 it right up here? AUDIENCE SPEAKER: Sure. 23 24 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Mr. Briggs. 25 MR. BRIGGS: Mr. Chairman, as of a few

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minutes ago there was still about ten chairs 1 available out in the atrium area. And we are 2 trying to bring some more chairs down, so --3 4 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Well, I understand 5 we may have some designated parties who are 6 standing. 7 AUDIENCE SPEAKER: We're sitting up 8 here. 9 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay. Well, can't we get those other chairs in here so at least the 10 11 designated parties have a seat. UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Sure. 12 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay. If you're a 13 14 designated party and you're standing, would you 15 raise your hand. 16 (Pause.) 17 AUDIENCE SPEAKER: Mr. Chairman. 18 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Yes. 19 AUDIENCE SPEAKER: I'm an ex-fireman, 20 retired. I think this room is overloaded and 21 we're violating the fire regulations of the City 22 and the state. So I would ask that you address the overcrowding in this room. It's overloaded. 23 24 (Parties speaking simultaneously.) 25 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Mr. Briggs, what is

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1 the loading requirement for this room? And is
2 that an issue --

3 (Pause.) 4 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Let's do this. Ιf 5 there are people who aren't designated parties, 6 I'm going to ask you to get up and go into the overflow room. Those people that are designated 7 8 parties can have a seat. And I would like then to 9 reduce the number down. I prefer we not have any 10 more than about a half-dozen people standing. Do we have all seats taken up at this point? Okay, 11 are there people that are not designated parties 12 13 sitting in the audience?

14 (Pause.)

15 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Why don't you come16 to the microphone so everybody can hear.

17 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: We have a party 18 here, Lucianne Colin; she's nearly 80 years old 19 and doesn't have a way to get back here if the 20 hearings go past today. So she would like to be 21 heard today.

CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay, then, what is
the last name?
UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Colin. That's
1036, is her number. 1036.

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CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay, we --1 2 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Thank you. CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Mr. Briggs has 3 4 informed me that the capacity for this room is 200 5 people, according to the Fire Marshal. And so 6 he's taking a quick count right now to see if 7 we're okay. 8 Okay, 150. All right. Now, what we will do then, we're going 9 to have Stonemans and Moylan and Colin, they're 10 11 going to be put on this priority. But I've also decided to move two presenters up that had quite a 12 13 more extensive and comprehensive comments in 14 evidence. And they were Mr. Shipe and 15 DerGarabedan. So they actually will be the first two that go, and then will be followed by these 16

17 three parties.

18 And then we will proceed through alphabetically. That will give people some idea 19 20 as to when they may come up and when they may not 21 come up. In that regard, to the latter group, the 22 latter half of the designated parties, about the last say 20 or 25 or so, once you have heard all 23 24 of the preliminary presentations, it may be that 25 you want to leave and come back about 4:00 or so.

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1 But I will leave that up to you.

2	MS. MOYLAN: Excuse me, I
3	CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: One thing I want
4	to
5	MS. MOYLAN: I have a question
6	about
7	CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Why don't you come
8	up here so we can all hear you. And then identify
9	yourself.
10	MS. MOYLAN: I'm Beverley DeWitt Moylan.
11	And my question is that my husband and I are
12	designated parties. And it isn't clear whether we
13	both have the opportunity to speak for 15 minutes
14	or if only one of us has that opportunity, or that
15	we have to split that 15 minutes somehow.
16	CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: It would be shared
17	between the two of you.
18	MS. MOYLAN: I'm sorry?
19	CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: It would be shared
20	between the two of you.
21	MS. MOYLAN: Thank you.
22	CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay. I want to
23	next address the room, and everybody, those that
24	were here for the ACL hearing, by and large I
25	think the hearing went pretty well. I expect the

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1 same to happen today.

2	We have many different points of view
3	that have been expressed, not only by the Board
4	and the community. I want everybody to allow
5	others to express themselves. I don't want to
6	hear sniping or comments or sighs and things like
7	that. Not only because it's disrespectful to the
8	speaker, and I don't frankly care which side
9	you're on when I make these comments. It's
10	distracting to me and the other Board Members.
11	I want to focus on who is speaking to
12	me. I don't want to be distracted by someone
13	jumping up in the back of the room, raising
14	placards, or trying to get my attention. I don't
15	like that and it's distracting.
16	And cellphones, yeah, let's take care of
17	our cellphones and put them on vibrate or silent.
18	And is Mr. Racano here?
19	AUDIENCE SPEAKER: Yes.
20	CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Joey Racano?
21	AUDIENCE SPEAKER: He's here.
22	CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: He is? Okay. All
23	right, well, if he can hear me
24	MR. RACANO: I'm here.
25	CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay, hang on. No

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1 photographs today.

2 MR. RACANO: I didn't bring my camera, Mr. Young. 3 4 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay. 5 MR. RACANO: But you look good. 6 (Laughter.) 7 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: I wish I looked as 8 good as you do, Mr. Racano. 9 (Laughter.) 10 MR. RACANO: I did bring copies of the Constitution of the United States, though. 11 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Well, I think I can 12 get those online -- but thank you for the offer, 13 14 anyway. 15 You've been very good in terms of respecting decorum. I just didn't want you to be 16 running up again and trying to take photos or 17 18 distracting what's going on. MR. RACANO: Right. 19 20 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay. So, if anyone 21 has some burning comment to make when they hear a 22 speaker give his or her presentation, please keep it to yourself. Or if you can't do that, and I 23 24 hear you start to express it, I'm going to ask you 25 to leave the room. And if that doesn't help, then

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Officer Hedges is going to help me get that done.

I don't think that's going to be necessary, but I don't want anyone to be surprised if it should come to that.

5 Okay, we're now going to address some of 6 the procedural objections and issues that have 7 been raised. And the first one I want to address 8 has to do with the three subpoenas that the CSD 9 served and issued on Mr. Jeffries, myself and Mr. 10 Shallcross.

11 So, Mr. Onstot, I think they came from 12 your office. Why don't you tell the Board -- I 13 haven't seen anything in writing as to what the 14 purpose is of the subpoenas. Are you trying to 15 get the Hearing Officers to testify as witnesses 16 in your case?

MR. ONSTOT: Well, Mr. Chair, there's no 17 18 requirement that written explanations be served 19 along with subpoenas. But, as you know, from the 20 comments in our case, we raised due process 21 objections based upon the comments at the ACL 22 hearing that the three Board Members who were subpoenaed made. And we have the transcripts of 23 24 those. Basically concluding that individual dischargers were liable for violating the basin 25

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1 plan.

2 And the reason that the subpoenas were issued is that because of those comments, those 3 4 three Board Members are material witnesses. And 5 as such, we have both a legal and ethical 6 obligation, in defending our client, as well as 7 the legal right to call material witnesses in our 8 defense to further flesh out the extent of that perceived bias, based upon the offer of proof of 9 10 the transcript statements made by the three Board Members. 11 That's the reason that --12 13 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: So the issue is 14 bias --15 MR. ONSTOT: Correct. CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: -- that you want to 16 address. All right. Well, it's always 17 appropriate to inquire into any bias of any 18 hearing officer in any proceeding. I don't think 19 20 it needs to be done with subpoenas. We have 21 addressed it in other ways in other hearings. But 22 I will have each of the Board Members, including 23 myself, given an opportunity to address those 24 issues and concerns that you have stated. 25 I have read through the transcript,

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1 myself, and I can put my own comments in context
2 of what was said.

But I'll start with Mr. Shallcross. If
you'd like to address Mr. Onstot's concerns.

5 BOARD MEMBER SHALLCROSS: Sure. Well, 6 the main part of the statement is the CSD, that I 7 made that the CSD seemed particularly concerned 8 about was, and I'm going to quote, "So hopefully 9 going after individual dischargers may create the 10 political will for something to happen in a 11 reasonable amount of time."

12 The CSD made a lot of this in response 13 about the comment of creating political will. I 14 probably should have been clear when I made the 15 statement that my concern was the possibility of a 16 failed 218 vote if that were required.

17 And also the Measure B requirement, that 18 the electorate be allowed to vote on it. And the 19 site of any project.

And if you'll recall, it concerned earlier in the hearing that this requirement of Measure B could result in a stream of failed elections in which no site was ever voted, or supported by the electorate.

25 It was not expressing bias that the PETERS SHORTHAND REPORTING CORPORATION (916) 362-2345

community took any particular path, but that, 1 2 quoting again, "Something happen in a reasonable amount of time." I have no bias in this matter 3 4 against or for any party. 5 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Mr. Jeffries. And, 6 by the way, do you have your subpoena? 7 BOARD MEMBER JEFFRIES: Yes. 8 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: I'd like you to hand it to me. 9 10 BOARD MEMBER JEFFRIES: I don't know 11 exactly what comments they are considering as bias, but I -- let me just state for a fact that I 12 13 don't live in the area; I don't have any bias one 14 way or the other. I'm here to hear all the 15 information that's provided to us. And I have no perceived notions or ideas before coming to any of 16 these hearings on how I will vote on one side or 17 18 the other. 19 You have to have an open mind when you're dealing with these types of issues. And 20 21 you have to hear all the information before you 22 can make up your mind. So I come with a clear

23 conscience, I come with a clear mind. And at the 24 previous hearing I did the same thing and I heard 25 all the information.

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1 And I don't know exactly what phrase or 2 comment that I made that was considered to be 3 biased one way or the other.

4 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Mr. Onstot, do you 5 have any particular evidence or statements that 6 this particular Board Member made that you're 7 concerned about?

8 MR. ONSTOT: the general context in 9 which the statements were made, as the Chair will 10 recall, was when, after the Board deliberated and 11 came back with its decision on the ACL. Basically 12 to direction, if you read the transcripts as a 13 whole, was this doesn't go far enough; we need the 14 individuals; we need them to be held accountable.

15 So, while we did take some specific comments out of the transcript, if you view them 16 17 as a whole in the context of where we were going, at least it's our view that the clear import of 18 19 the Board in directing Mr. Briggs to issue these 20 prosecutions against these individual homeowners, 21 was because the Board wanted them held 22 accountable.

And whether it's to increase the
political will or some other specific comments, I
understand the explanation for that.

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But, before the Board went into deliberations there was no intent that at least was expressed to these 150-or-so people that they would be dragged before the Board. And the Board came back after deliberating. Clear direction from the Board was putting these people in the pipeline.

8 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Let me offer my explanation for your concerns about my bias. And 9 10 I read through the transcript and what I said. And I think what you're forgetting to publicly 11 acknowledge, Mr. Onstot, is the role that Mr. 12 13 Seitz and yourself had at that hearing in 14 suggesting that the proper individuals or entities 15 for any enforcement action on discharge violations were the individual property owners, themselves. 16

17 That was not an issue by the Board 18 Members. But it was simply a reaction to the 19 evidence that we heard at that hearing.

And the comments that I made, and the exchange I had with Mr. Briggs, was simply to tell him that appears to be the next step with this community.

And I've read through my comments. I only directed him or asked him to go to the next

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step, which would be to look at individual enforcement actions, and then tell us what he's got planned, if anything. When and how and what types of measures he had planned.

5 I learned for the first time some of the 6 information to those questions that I had. But in 7 terms of those comments suggesting that I'm biased 8 against these 45 individuals, I don't know any of them. I recognize Mr. Payne's name because he 9 10 comes to the Board a lot, so I know him. And I 11 think Mr. Sargent has been before us a couple of times. 12

I don't know these individuals. I don't have any bias one way or the other. I'll tell you, Mr. Onstot, I have a lot of sympathy for them. And I don't relish or take any pleasure in the position that they've been put into because of circumstances.

But I have not made up my mind as to what I'm going to do today because I haven't heard any oral testimony. I have reviewed and read all of the documents that have been presented to me. And based on that I have some preliminary thoughts and opinions, but I haven't had a chance to deliberate with my fellow Board Members to see

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what their reactions are to the evidence, to come 1 2 up with any type of appropriate remedy whatsoever. So I will ask Mr. Shallcross whether he 3 4 feels that anything that's happened with respect 5 to himself that would preclude him from rending a 6 decision in this case in an unbiased fashion. 7 BOARD MEMBER SHALLCROSS: No, none at 8 all. 9 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: And, Mr. Jeffries, I ask you the same question. 10 BOARD MEMBER JEFFRIES: No, I have no 11 perceived conclusions until I hear all the 12 13 evidence. 14 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: And that is my 15 response to that question. I will quash these subpoenas, Mr. Onstot, and will return them to 16 you. Of course, that is something you can bring 17 18 up on appeal if there is an appeal, that is your 19 right. 20 MR. ONSTOT: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay. Now, we have 21 22 some other subpoenas that have been issued, and I want to address those issues. The one that pops 23 24 to mind is this individual that served Supervisor 25 Bianchi with the subpoena here.

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That was you that served the subpoena, 1 2 or had it served? MS. WATSON: I served it. 3 4 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay. Would you 5 come up to the podium and identify yourself. 6 MS. WATSON: Yes. My name is Elaine 7 Watson. 8 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Watson, --MS. WATSON: Yes. 9 10 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: -- okay. And can you tell me -- by the way, folks, I'm going to 11 simplify this. I will consider the subpoenas were 12 13 validly issued because I think they would have 14 been had these individuals come to the Board and asked that they been issued. So I'm not going to 15 make a technical issue about that, to say that 16 17 they're quashed for that purpose. 18 But I am going to find out what the reason is for your need for this particular 19 20 witness. 21 MS. WATSON: This witnesses needed to 22 hear Ms. Bianchi's testimony, and I was asked to deliver the subpoena to her. 23 24 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Oh, you're the process server. Okay. What I'm interested in --25 PETERS SHORTHAND REPORTING CORPORATION (916) 362-2345

1 okay, who's the individual that wanted the

2 service?

MS. WATSON: Alan Martyn. 3 4 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Where is Mr. Martyn? 5 Mr. Martyn? MR. MARTYN: I'm right here. 6 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay. Would you 7 8 come to the podium, sir. 9 MR. MARTYN: I'd like to ask a brief question of you before you ask me questions, Mr. 10 Chairman. Your Board Members, have they been 11 sworn to tell the truth, the whole truth and 12 nothing but the truth so help them God? 13 14 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Sir, we're not testifying today. That's the whole point of --15 MR. MARTYN: Oh, I see. 16 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: -- we are hearing 17 18 officers. MR. MARTYN: Oh, you were asking some 19 20 questions of the Board Members. I didn't know if 21 they had been sworn in. That was my question. 22 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Mr. Shallcross, do you affirm what you said is the truth? 23 24 BOARD MEMBER SHALLCROSS: I affirm it. 25 I so affirm.

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CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Mr. Jeffries, do you 1 2 affirm that the statement you made regarding your 3 possible bias is true? 4 BOARD MEMBER JEFFRIES: Absolutely 5 correct. 6 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay, and I affirm 7 that same statement I made earlier. 8 MR. MARTYN: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay. Now would you 9 please tell us, Mr. Martyn, of the need for these 10 11 particular witnesses that you subpoenaed? MR. MARTYN: The need for these 12 13 particular witnesses, that they're very key 14 witnesses in the saga and that has brought this 15 meeting to a head, Mr. Chairman. They have been critical players in 16 bringing about this particular cease and desist 17 18 order issue that is before you. They are top 19 witnesses to these entire proceedings, Your Honor. 20 And we have testimony. We have not only 21 testimony, but we have evidence to present to you 22 to corroborate that. CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Well, I'd like you 23 24 to give me an offer of proof that specifically what Supervisor Bianchi is going to testify to 25

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that is relevant to the issues in this cease and
 desist order hearing.

3 MR. MARTYN: You want me to present that4 to you at this particular time?

5 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Yes, I want an offer 6 of proof. I want to know more specifically what 7 you think this witness is going to present for 8 you, and that any other witness could not present.

9 MR. MARTYN: I have a voluminous file here, Mr. Chairman, to present to you regarding 10 these three individuals. It would take most of 11 your morning for me to present most of the 12 13 evidence that I have. I thought that that was 14 going to be done when the witnesses came to take 15 the stand, Mr. Chairman. And my understanding is that that would be the proper procedure, when they 16 17 come up to testify.

18 And I can assure you that it's very 19 relevant; it's very meaningful. And very 20 supportive of our defense.

21 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Well, when you 22 mention their testimony's important to lay out the 23 saga of this, by saga you're referring to the 24 history that goes back 20, 25 years of the Los 25 Osos wastewater situation? Is that what you are

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1 referring to?

2 MR. MARTYN: I'm saying to the recent developments that have brought about what is 3 4 happening here today, Mr. Chairman. We have 5 corroborative proof that the key role that these 6 people brought in bringing this disaster on the 7 community of Los Osos That we're here, which, you 8 know, we feel, you know, we don't deserve. We feel we're not in violation of your order. And 9 10 we're here to defend it. And we're going to defend it as best as we can. And we have enough 11 testimony. 12 13 Why you're questioning me about my 14 witnesses, I find it very disturbing, because that 15 will come out in the proceeding here, Mr. Chairman. 16 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: It's my role, also, 17 to make these proceedings as efficient as possible 18 19 in not duplication of testimony, And when it 20 comes to elected officials, I want to know why you 21 need Ms. Bianchi to testify about whether your 22 particular property is or is not violating the 23 prohibition in the basin plan. 24 Does she have testimony that's relevant 25 to that issue?

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MR. MARTYN: Yes. We're talking about 1 2 CDOs, isn't that correct? CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay. What do you 3 4 think she's going to say? Have you talked to her 5 about it? 6 MR. MARTYN: No, I have not talked to 7 her about it because I wanted it to come out in 8 public. And I have evidence that I want to present to all the Board Members of her stance 9 10 regarding, you know, the effect of our septic tanks, Mr. Chairman. 11 I have it in black and white in her 12 13 testimony, you know, testifying and making it very 14 relevant that our septic tanks, you know, would do the job very adequately. And that is our belief, 15 and it was her belief. And we have evidence to 16 present to support that stance that she took, Mr. 17 18 Chairman. 19 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Mr. Martyn, I don't believe Ms. Bianchi is an engineer or a soils 20 21 expert. And she may have expressed an opinion at 22 some point in the past. I don't know that that's critical for your case, or even relevant to the 23 24 issues that are before you. 25 Ms. McPherson, are you --

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1	MR. MARTYN: Well, Mr. Chairman, I feel
2	intimidated by your requesting, you know, I
3	brought a witness that I think is a very viable
4	witness to these proceedings. Why there has been
5	a push to make me declare the relevancy of her
6	I wouldn't have brought her here, and I'm not the
7	only one with that opinion. We have several other
8	people that are of the same opinion, Mr. Chairman.
9	That she is a relevant witness to these
10	proceedings.
11	And I know she has power and influence.
12	I know she's one of our supervisors. And I know
13	that she's been criticized for, you know,
14	neglecting Los Osos, just at her convenience, you
15	know. And I think that her testimony is very very
16	critical. And we will prove it is critical, Mr.
17	Chairman.
18	AUDIENCE SPEAKER: Heaven forbid our
19	supervisor be asked to speak.
20	AUDIENCE SPEAKER: How about a vote
21	CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay, I asked for no
22	public comments if you're not at the podium. Who
23	just said that?
24	(Audience speaking simultaneously.)
25	CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Sir, if you do that
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again, I'll ask you to leave the room. Please 1 don't do it. 2 All right, Mr. Martyn, who are your 3 other two witnesses that you --4 5 MR. MARTYN: Jerry Gregory is another 6 witness, and Pandora Nash-Karner. 7 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Do you need these 8 witnesses for the same testimony that you need Ms. 9 Bianchi? 10 MR. MARTYN: No, no, this is for 11 different testimony. CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay, and what is 12 13 that? 14 MR. MARTYN: The testimony is the 15 relevancy of the fact that addressing Mr. Jerry Gregory, that he has, in many instances, 16 proclaimed that we should be fined, et cetera, et 17 18 cetera, et cetera. He's been basically very deleterious to the community, to his fellow 19 20 citizens, to all the people that received the 21 cease and desist orders, and to the community, at 22 large. 23 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Is that what you 24 need his testimony for? 25 MR. MARTYN: That's part of it, Mr.

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1 Chairman.

CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: And what is the rest 2 3 of his testimony going towards? 4 MR. MARTYN: Excuse me for a second. 5 Well, I think that we're looking at a real estate, 6 so-called real estate expert. And I think that 7 the harmful effects that he has helped to create 8 on the community on the values in Los Osos and on our own properties and our well being, have been 9 10 very deleterious. And I intend to prove conclusively to 11 every member of this Board that he has been a part 12 13 and parcel, you know, of the CDOs that we're, you 14 know, receiving today. And I think that we have 15 enough proof, between him and Mr. Briggs, to substantiate our evidence. 16 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: And the last 17 18 subpoena was issued to who? MR. MARTYN: Pandora Nash-Karner. And 19 20 if you ask me why we need her here, I think would 21 be a rather unwarranted question. CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Well, tell me what 22 her evidence is going to tend to prove or 23 24 disprove. 25 MR. MARTYN: I mean I'm trying to --

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CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Folks, I know that 1 there's a lot of history here. No one on this 2 Board is stupid about that. But we're not going 3 4 to open up the entire history of Los Osos and all 5 the problems that it has shared as a community. 6 It's not relevant to the cease and desist orders. 7 If you feel that it is, you'll have the 8 opportunity to take it up on appeal, or present it 9 in a different forum. It's not going to be 10 presented here. As to Mr. Gregory's subpoena, I'm 11 quashing it. It's not relevant to what's going on 12 13 today. I don't care about the comments people 14 have made in the community about what we should or shouldn't do. It doesn't address the issues about 15 the ongoing --16 MR. MARTYN: Even to Mr. Briggs, Mr. 17 18 Chairman? CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: You can ask Mr. 19 20 Briggs anything you want in terms of the issues 21 that are at stake here. Definitely. But I don't 22 see the need for that particular witness --MR. MARTYN: That he -- that he's 23 24 insisting that we be fined to the fullest? 25 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: You'll have your

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1 2 opportunity to cross-examine Mr. Briggs, and you'll have freedom there.

Let's take the third one, Pandora Nash.
Does Pandora Nash have any evidence as --

5 MR. MARTYN: Mr. Chairman, can I ask you 6 a question, if I may respectfully submit a 7 question to you. Why are you questioning me about 8 my witnesses? For what reason and what purpose? 9 You haven't clarified that, Mr. Chairman.

10 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Because I have the obligation to make sure that we don't have 11 testimony and evidence being offered that is not 12 13 relevant to the proceedings. The Hearing Officer 14 always does that. There needs to be an offer of 15 proof for everything that's being presented. In some cases, that evidence is self evident as to 16 17 what its relevancy is.

18 MR. MARTYN: I thank you for your19 response.

20 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Otherwise, I would 21 have 500 witnesses lined up to testify and it 22 would be cumulative, duplicative and unnecessary 23 to prove points that are in dispute.

24 MR. MARTYN: Well, we didn't call 500 25 witnesses, and I didn't call -- I just called

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three witnesses. And I believe in my honest heart 1 -- from my heart, this is nothing but political 2 pressure. But, go again, Mr. Chairman, --3 4 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Tell me about your 5 last subpoena and why you need Pandora Nash. Is 6 it just for the history of how we got to this 7 point in time today? Or does Pandora Nash have 8 testimony about the specifics of your property? 9 MR. MARTYN: Okay, excuse me for a 10 second. CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Are you consulting 11 with your attorney? 12 13 AUDIENCE SPEAKER: No, it's not an 14 attorney. 15 AUDIENCE SPEAKER: Assistant attorney. AUDIENCE SPEAKER: Coach. 16 MR. MARTYN: Because I can't afford an 17 18 attorney, and I did have an advisor who has been an advisor to all of us here, why we have the CDOs 19 20 and why we are here, that is the reason why, you 21 know, we feel that Pandora --22 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Why Pandora Nash --MR. MARTYN: Yes, um-hum. 23 24 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: -- I'm quashing that 25 subpoena --

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MR. MARTYN: Pardon me?

2 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: I'm quashing the3 third subpoena.

4 MR. MARTYN: Well, I haven't told you 5 that we have document on document in the fact that 6 we feel that the Water Quality Control Board has 7 been kowtowing, in other words, to Pandora Nash-8 Karner, not the community of Los Osos. And we have prima facie evidence, you know, reams of 9 10 paperwork that show, you know, the deleterious 11 effect she has had on bringing these CDOs to the community that are so blatantly abusive of the 12 13 community.

14 And it seems like the Water Quality 15 Control Board, you know, has been pandering to Pandora and not to the community of Los Osos 16 17 trying to help solve their problems. Because 18 she -- I could go on, but I'm liable to lose my 19 cool, Mr. Chairman, because, you know, I think 20 that this woman has, from the very beginning, has 21 wreaked havoc on this community.

She lied to the community when the CSD was formed. She told us that a certain ponding solution --

25 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Mr. Martyn, I think PETERS SHORTHAND REPORTING CORPORATION (916) 362-2345

you're making my point as to why I want to quash 1 the subpoena. That testimony is not relevant to 2 the issues before us today. 3 Now, as to Supervisor Bianchi, --4 5 MS. OKUN: Mr. Chair, can I address that 6 quickly. One thing is that in the caption of that 7 subpoena it also mentions William Moylan, so I 8 don't know if you want to hear from him, as well. The subpoena appears to be on behalf of Mr. 9 10 Moylan, also. Also, Supervisor Bianchi, I don't know 11 if she's here, but she has the opportunity to make 12 13 comments during the public comment part of the 14 hearing. And the Board will have the opportunity 15 to ask her questions at that point. And perhaps you could rule after that. 16 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: That's right, it 17 18 would not subject her to cross-examination, which is what, I think, Mr. Martyn and the other 19 20 designated party would like to do. 21 MS. OKUN: Right. CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: So, at this point, I 22 don't know. I'd like to hear from my colleagues 23 24 as to what we should do about enforcing the 25 subpoena.

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1	MR. CASH: Mr. Chairman, could I
2	Wyatt Cash from the County Counsel's Office
3	could I make a comment about
4	CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Of course.
5	MR. CASH: Supervisor Bianchi's
6	CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Of course.
7	(Audience speaking simultaneously.)
8	MR. MARTYN: All right, I would like to
9	ask the Committee to (inaudible) and to address
10	the Board after this gentleman gets through, Mr.
11	Chairman.
12	MR. CASH: Good morning, Mr. Chairman,
13	Board. Thank you for allowing me to address this
14	issue. The subpoena that is at issue was, as has
15	just been pointed out, was issued by Mr. Alan
16	Martyn and Mr. William Moylan.
17	And we join in the Chairman's concern
18	about the irrelevance of any testimony that
19	Supervisor Bianchi could present. And I would
20	point out, as I'm sure your Board has noticed,
21	that when you asked for an offer of proof there
22	was really no reason given, other than some
23	information about a statement perhaps that
24	Supervisor Bianchi made about the adequacy of
25	septic tanks.

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And if that's the only testimony that 1 these parties expect to elicit, then I would say 2 that it goes back to Mr. Chairman's original 3 4 comments, that the justification for the 5 prohibition order is not at relevance in this 6 hearing. 7 And we would ask you to quash the 8 subpoena for those reasons. 9 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay. If I could, 10 I'd like to ask Supervisor Bianchi a few questions, if she wouldn't mind coming to the 11 podium. Good morning. 12 SUPERVISOR BIANCHI: Good morning. 13 14 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Supervisor, do you 15 have any specific information about --SUPERVISOR BIANCHI: Do you want my name 16 for the record? 17 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Please. 18 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: -- would you 19 20 speak up into the mike. 21 SUPERVISOR BIANCHI: Sure. Oh, okay. 22 Is that better, is that better, whoever said that? UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Yes. 23 SUPERVISOR BIANCHI: Okay. My name is 24 25 Shirley Bianchi, District 2 County Supervisor.

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CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: You're the 1 Supervisor for the Los Osos area? 2 SUPERVISOR BIANCHI: Yes. 3 4 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay. Ms. Bianchi, 5 do you know Mr. Martyn? 6 SUPERVISOR BIANCHI: I've known Mr. 7 Martyn casually for many years. 8 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay. Do you affirm that the statements you're going to make today --9 10 SUPERVISOR BIANCHI: Yes. CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: -- are true and 11 correct? 12 SUPERVISOR BIANCHI: Yes. 13 14 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay. Do you know 15 Mr. Martyn? SUPERVISOR BIANCHI: I've known Mr. 16 Martyn casually. You know, we're not close 17 18 friends, but I know who he is; he knows who I am. We've spoken upon occasion over the last 25, 30 19 20 years. CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay. Have you been 21 to his property, his house? 22 23 SUPERVISOR BIANCHI: No, I've never been 24 to his house. I have no idea where he lives. 25 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay. Do you have

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any information as to the specifics of his 1 individual onsite disposal system? 2 SUPERVISOR BIANCHI: None whatsoever. 3 4 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay. And as for 5 the other designated party, that's Mr. Moylan, do 6 you know Mr. Moylan? 7 SUPERVISOR BIANCHI: I met Mr. Moylan 8 for the first time this past Tuesday during our Board meeting. 9 10 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Have you ever been 11 to his property in Los Osos? SUPERVISOR BIANCHI: No. 12 13 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Do you have any 14 specific knowledge or information with respect to 15 the operation or maintenance of his onsite disposal system? 16 17 SUPERVISOR BIANCHI: None whatsoever. 18 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay. MR. SHIPE: Point of order. I'm sorry, 19 20 I have a question here. CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: In that case I'm 21 22 going to quash the subpoena for Ms. Bianchi. However, Ms. Bianchi, we do have a interested 23 24 public speaking part in our proceeding today if 25 you care to address the Board at that time.

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You're welcome to do that. But, I don't see where 1 2 your particular testimony is relevant to the issues that the Board has defined as at issue here 3 4 today. 5 SUPERVISOR BIANCHI: I had not planned 6 on making any comments. I've been here as an 7 observer. CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay. Well, I'm 8 just suggesting if you wanted to, you could do 9 10 that. Before I finalize that, I do want to hear from Mr. Martyn, and I want to hear from Mr. 11 Moylan. 12 SUPERVISOR BIANCHI: I will go into the 13 14 back of the room. MR. SHIPE: I have a point, because I 15 have a question regarding --16 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: -- please, you're 17 18 Mr. Shipe? MR. SHIPE: Yes, my name is Robert 19 20 Shipe. CDO number is 1024, the last four. I have 21 a question because you continually say does it 22 have anything to do with his specific site. And my question is are we individuals only going to be 23 24 allowed to talk to our specific sites? 25 Because I believe there were two parts

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to this, and one is are CDOs the correct response from this Board. And if that is one of the questions, then it is my belief that we should all be able to speak directly to whether or not the CDOs are applicable to us.

6 And the point I'm trying to make is the 7 prosecution staff, in their documents, have stated 8 time and time again that there is no current 9 project for sewer in Los Osos, as a part of the 10 reason why they're undertaking this.

11 And the history of Los Osos, especially 12 the recent history, specifically addresses why we 13 do not have a sewer project. And these people all 14 specifically talk to that end.

15 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: I don't see how 16 that's relevant to --

17 (Audience speaking simultaneously.) 18 MR. SHIPE: I understand, Mr. Chair, I 19 understand that. My only -- my question is if 20 it's not relevant, then I ask that you strike all 21 comments made by the prosecution staff regarding 22 the fact that we have no sewer system.

Because if that is not relevant to the
testimony, then that should be struck, as well.
CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Thank you for your

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comments. Let's get back to --1 2 (Applause.) MR. SHIPE: I'm sorry, did you rule on 3 4 that, Your Honor? I'm sorry, how should I address 5 you, sir? UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Mr. Chairman. 6 7 MR. SHIPE: Mr. Chairman. 8 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Mr. Young is fine. MR. SHIPE: Okav. 9 10 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Thank you for you 11 comments. Please sit down. Mr. Martyn, do you have any comments after Ms. Bianchi spoke? 12 13 MR. MARTYN: Yes, I do, Mr. Young, but 14 I'd like to defer to Gail McPherson. I think she 15 can probably elaborate -- I don't have an attorney here. And she can probably elaborate better than 16 I can. So, with your kind permission, I'd like to 17 18 have Gail McPherson address this. 19 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Fine, go ahead. 20 MS. McPHERSON: Gail McPherson, Los 21 Osos. The reason that he's deferring to me is 22 that there's many many people who got CDOs that don't feel comfortable coming to the podium. I 23 24 can't tell you that I feel any more comfortable standing before your smiling faces. 25

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And I think that it's important to note 1 2 that throughout this process I may be helping them in talking to them. There's nothing improper in 3 4 that. We have an 80-year-old woman who doesn't 5 speak very clear English, and so I'm going to be 6 assisting. And I hope that that's going to be 7 okay. 8 I'm familiar with some of their conditions. I'm probably more familiar with their 9 10 homes and conditions than Mr. Briggs or any of the staff, because they've never come to Mr. Martyn's 11 home or Mr. Moylan's home. 12 13 Further, the documentation that we have 14 is about why we don't have a sewer, and it's not 15 about 30 years. It's about less than 30 days. CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay, let's get back 16 to where we were --17 18 MS. McPHERSON: Where we were was on Ms. Bianchi. She is material to that. The reason 19 20 that we don't have a sewer is because of a failed 21 compromise that Assemblyman Blakeslee led. And 22 she was part of why we don't have that. She sent documentation to discourage and 23 24 actually quash a plant being placed out of town. 25 And she sent letters on the County letterhead to

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that effect. And there's much information between 1 2 the State Water Board and Ms. Bianchi and the other party that was subpoenaed. 3 4 Now, the other people here, designated 5 parties, also have witnesses that were not 6 subpoenaed. They have a long list of them. And 7 they were going to be calling them, and I don't 8 know if you need a copy of that, as well. 9 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Right now the only, there's three subpoenas before us. Mr. Moylan, 10 11 would you like to address --MR. MOYLAN: Yes, I would. 12 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: -- Ms. Bianchi's 13 14 comments? MR. MOYLAN: Ms. Bianchi's comments? 15 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Yes. Supervisor 16 Bianchi. In other words, the need to justify 17 18 compelling her to appear as a witness in these 19 proceedings. 20 MR. MOYLAN: Basically it's just that we 21 would like to get the truth out. CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: The truth about 22 23 what? MR. MOYLAN: The truth about her role in 24 quashing the sewer project after it was stopped 25

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1 and how it was quashed before it could be put

2 outside of town.

3 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay. Thank you for 4 your comments --

5 MR. MOYLAN: But I have another comment, 6 sir.

7 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Yes.

8 MR. MOYLAN: You keep referring to, is 9 this site-specific, does Ms. Bianchi have anything 10 site-specific, has she ever been to your house. 11 No. And so you want to quash her as a -- or quash 12 the subpoena of Ms. Bianchi and the other people, 13 Jerry Gregory and Pandora Nash-Karner.

14 If you quash those subpoenas, sir, 15 you're going to be eliminating a lot of the truth 16 regarding the existing CDOs that we have. And 17 it's relevant. It's absolutely relevant. Their 18 testimony is relevant. And if you do that you 19 wouldn't be giving us a fair hearing.

20 And as far as site-specific, if 21 everything's just site-specific I don't believe 22 that the Board has any site-specific information 23 on any of our septic systems. Is that true? 24 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Well, that is part 25 of what --

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(Audience speaking simultaneously.) 1 2 (Applause.) MR. MOYLAN: Is that true, sir? 3 4 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay, Ms. Tacker, I 5 know you, I can identify you. I don't want 6 clapping, either. 7 MS. TACKER: (inaudible). CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: This is not an 8 athletic competition. 9 10 MS. TACKER: I did not clap --(Audience speaking simultaneously.) 11 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: This is what this 12 hearing is about. 13 14 MR. MOYLAN: I know, and I just --CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: -- for the 15 prosecution team to make their case as to each 16 17 individual property. MR. MOYLAN: Well, then allow the people 18 that are subpoenaed to speak, and get the truth 19 20 out. CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: I'm not. I'm 21 quashing all three subpoenas --22 23 MR. MOYLAN: Are you saying you don't 24 want the truth to come out, sir? 25 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: I'm saying that the

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evidence that you think they are going offer at 1 this hearing is not relevant to proving --2 MR. MOYLAN: How can it be -- how can it 3 4 be deemed relevant or irrelevant before it's 5 heard, sir? 6 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: You told me --7 MR. MOYLAN: I didn't tell you what 8 they're going to say. I haven't told you what they're going to say. I don't know what they're 9 10 going to say, but we need to hear what they're 11 going to say. CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Mr. Moylan, thank 12 13 you for your comments. I've made my decision. 14 The three subpoenas are quashed. 15 (Audience speaking simultaneously.) CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: If you disagree with 16 it, you can --17 18 MR. MOYLAN: I disagree vehemently. CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: That's fine. You're 19 20 entitled to. 21 MR. MOYLAN: I would like the truth to 22 come out. MR. ONSTOT: Mr. Chairman, --23 24 AUDIENCE SPEAKER: -- CDOs that we could work before the project and (inaudible). 25

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1 (Laughter.)

2	CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: All right.
3	MR. ONSTOT: Mr. Chair, may I make a
4	comment, please?
5	CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Yes.
6	MR. ONSTOT: The CSD, we did not issue
7	the three subpoenas, but for the record, we would
8	note that one of the considerations that this
9	Board is to make is the remedy. And it seems to
10	us, based on what was just said here, that the
11	real estate person who would testify as to the
12	decline in property values, attaching a CAO or
13	cease and desist order to individual properties,
14	especially as 150 of them, would logically be an
15	impact that the Board would want to consider in
16	making its decision as to remedies, or whether to
17	issue a type of enforcement order.
18	So for that purpose the CSD would like
19	to go on record as saying that we believe that
20	information is relevant.
21	CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Well, and I can
22	appreciate that. And I think that any of these
23	individuals can certainly tell the Board that, in
24	their opinion, the issuance of the CDOs will have
25	a negative impact on their property values. Okay.

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By the way, this is our Board Attorney from the State Water Resources Control Board, John Richards. He's been appointed to advise the Board since we don't have the services of Ms. Okun and the prosecution staff, who are all separated from their functions.

7 Mr. Richards has some comments to make
8 that I think will tie this up with the subpoenas.
9 Mr. Richards.

10 MR. RICHARDS: Mr. Young, the discussion 11 right at the moment is focusing on the validity of 12 the subpoenas. And witnesses have the ability, or 13 parties have the ability to compel the testimony 14 of witnesses who have direct personal knowledge of 15 relevant evidence.

16 You have given the parties an 17 opportunity to offer proof that the evidence of 18 the people subpoenaed would be relevant to this 19 proceeding. And they have essentially failed to 20 do so.

This does not preclude the people -which justifies your decision to quash the subpoenas and not compel testimony of these witnesses.

25 However, the parties are free to call PETERS SHORTHAND REPORTING CORPORATION (916) 362-2345

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any of those witnesses and present the evidence that they want them to present during the proceeding as part of their own case.

4 It is just the issue here is whether the 5 parties have provided sufficient evidence that the 6 testimony of these witnesses would be relevant in 7 order to compel their attendance, to force their 8 attendance.

9 These individuals, the designated parties, can call the people that were served 10 11 subpoenas in their own presentations if those witnesses want to come and testify for those 12 individuals. The issue is whether the Board is 13 14 going to compel, to mandate and force their attendance to testify. And that would be resolved 15 in quashing the subpoenas because there's been an 16 inadequate showing of relevance for issues at 17 18 stake here.

CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay, thank you.
 We're going to go on --

21 MR. MARTYN: One last question, Mr. 22 Chairman, with your kind indulgence. What if 23 these witnesses are not here? Addressing your 24 counsel's question that --

25 MR. RICHARDS: Well, it's up to the

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1 parties to produce their own witnesses.

2	MR. MARTYN: They came reluctantly, sir.
3	MR. RICHARDS: You have the opportunity
4	to compel them through a subpoena. But in order
5	to get the subpoena, you must be able to show the
6	Presiding Officer that the evidence that you're
7	going to be putting on through that witness will
8	be relevant to the issues that are presented
9	before the Board.
10	And as ruled by the Chair, you have
11	failed to do that, at least to the satisfaction of
12	the Chair.
13	MR. MARTYN: Thank you, Mr. Richards. I
14	don't think they have the guts to stay here.
15	Thank you very much, though.
16	CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay, moving on to
17	our next procedural issue. I didn't have a chance
18	to completely review the Prosecution Team's
19	objections to the CSD exhibit list, but let me
20	and I did review the entire CSD exhibit list last
21	night. I made a cursory review of the objections.
22	And I don't want to spend a lot of time
23	on this. What I'm proposing to do, and I'll hear
24	from Mr. Onstot and Ms. Okun about this. Mr.
25	Onstot, I reviewed that list. It seems like you
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could have pulled everything off of the shelves in 1 the CSD library. There's videotapes of CSD Board 2 meetings; there are newspaper articles; there are, 3 4 is it 800 documents? MS. OKUN: I think it's 847. 5 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: A lot of them are 6 7 not completely irrelevant to what's going on, 8 unless you subscribe to -- that this proceeding is supposed to be a rehash of the saga of the Los 9 10 Osos wastewater -- which I do not. 11 I'm going to ask that during the lunch break you go through that list. I don't want to 12 13 do it now. And pay attention to the Prosecution 14 Team's objections to exhibits which you are 15 proposing. I want you to go through and decide those documents you really feel are necessary to 16 make your case. 17 18 I don't want to take time now to go through line by line, and make that decision. I 19 20 think you can do a better job at that. I want it 21 to be on your time, not the Board's time. 22 MR. ONSTOT: Mr. Chair, I understand that. And like we did last time, we have a very 23 inclusive list. As a defendant here and 24 respondent, we don't know what the prosecution 25

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1 case is. We don't know exactly what would be
2 relevant.

3 So, just like last time, we had a very 4 exhaustive exhibit list, and we only presented a 5 handful, both in terms of our case-in-chief, as 6 well as in response to the prosecution case. That 7 is our strategy here again.

8 Most of these, the vast majority, will 9 not be presented, probably won't be presented. 10 But rather than to be precluded at the outset, not 11 knowing what the prosecution's going to put on the 12 table, it would be premature to do that. I 13 understand the concern for the exhaustiveness.

14 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay. Well, I 15 appreciate that. And I understand why you want to 16 be inclusive and not leave anything out. I have a 17 problem with that, but I will tell you there are 18 some things that don't belong in there to begin 19 with. And that's newspaper articles and CSD 20 videotapes and hearings and the (inaudible).

But I want you to really look carefully at that list and pare it down to what you really think is important to prove or disprove any of the issues in contention here.

25 MR. ONSTOT: Okay.

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CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: We can finalize that 1 2 list at some other time, but I would like you to take the labor, and in response to Ms. Okun's 3 4 objections, and try to get that straightened out 5 amongst the two of you before we take Board time 6 to do it. 7 Ms. Okun, do you have any comments about 8 that? MS. OKUN: I just have a couple of 9 comments. One is that my objections incorrectly 10 11 stated that we didn't have a copy of document 133, which is ACL-185. It's is quarterly progress 12 13 reports on the progress of the wastewater 14 treatment plant. And we do object to those as 15 irrelevant, but we do have them. There is also a document that was left 16 off because I hadn't had a chance to review it, 17 and I couldn't tell from the description what it 18 was. It's ACL-119, document 86 in this 19 20 proceeding. It's the response to Julie Tacker's 21 Public Records Act request, and the subject matter 22 is limited to the Tri-W project and the construction contracts related to that. 23 24 There were a few documents that were incorrectly described in the CSD's document list 25

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so that I would ask when they go through that list 1 2 to keep that in mind. CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay. Well, I would 3 4 like the two of you to work to pare down that 5 list. Do you have any objections to the 6 Prosecution Team's list? 7 MR. ONSTOT: No. 8 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay. I think we are ready. 9 10 MS. OKUN: Excuse me. Someone from the County Counsel's Office handed me an objection to 11 a subpoena duces tecum issued by Gregory Murphy 12 13 for the CSD. I haven't seen a copy of that 14 subpoena, but apparently it's asking for 15 information regarding a complaint to County Environmental Health Services. 16 17 I'm not sure what that subject matter 18 The County is objecting, based on the is. official information, privilege evidence from 19 20 1040. I don't know if you have a copy of this 21 objection. 22 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: I have not seen the 23 subpoena. 24 MS. OKUN: I haven't seen the subpoena, but I can give you a copy of the County's 25

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objection if you want to see it. I don't know if 1 2 somebody's here from the County to address that. CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Who was the 3 4 individual who issued the subpoena? Isn't that 5 CSD? 6 MR. ONSTOT: Mr. Chair, if I can address 7 that. We did subpoena the Director of the 8 County's Environmental Health Program for the purposes of testifying as to the County's active 9 10 involvement in regulating the septic tank systems, 11 which are directly at issue here. We did issue a subpoena for him to 12 13 testify personally, as well as for documents 14 relating to these properties. We were served with 15 an objection only as to some of those documents that are confidential because they may be privacy 16 or enforcement concerns. 17 18 We have no objections to those objections raised by the County. We are not 19 20 asking for confidential information. 21 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Is this the 22 individual that supervises the septic tank oversight? 23 24 MR. ONSTOT: Correct. 25 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Well, I think he

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would be an important witness. Is he here?

MS. BOUCHARD: Your Honor, my name is 2 Kathy Bouchard. I'm Deputy County Counsel. 3 4 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay. 5 MS. BOUCHARD: And I am representing the 6 County of San Luis Obispo Environmental Health. 7 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay. 8 MS. BOUCHARD: And with me today is Mr. Steve Carnes, who we have designated our most 9 knowledgeable person. 10 I did make the objection to the 11 subpoena. The subpoena is dated April 20th, 12 issued by Mr. Murphy. Apparently, I just heard --13 14 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Can you speak 15 louder. MS. BOUCHARD: Apparently, I just heard 16 that they did not seek information that is 17 18 confidential. Do we have any information that is not confidential? 19 20 MR. CARNES: No, and I can explain that. MS. BOUCHARD: Okay. The only 21 22 information we have is confidential, the entirety of the records and the identity of the informants. 23 24 The records that they seek are records of complaints of discharge failures from septic 25

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1 systems in Los Osos.

And because of my pleading all of the 2 information that they seek is privileged and 3 4 confidential. 5 I understand about the issue of 6 relevance, but when something is privileged then 7 normally under 1040 and 1041 it would require you 8 to do a balancing test. That balancing test under Evidence Code 915(b) needs to be done out of the 9 public purview, like in chambers. 10 I have copies of 1040, 1041, and 915 for 11 your --12 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: I don't think I need 13 14 to look at those. It's my understanding of what 15 the County can do is just simply strike the names of the people filing the complaints. 16 MS. BOUCHARD: That's a 1041 objection. 17 18 We also made a 1040 objection. When people give their information to Environmental Health, they do 19 20 so under a promise of confidentiality. That 21 promise of confidentiality is consistent with 22 public policy to encourage people to report, as we 23 are an enforcement agency, as well. CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: But if their names 24 are not disclosed how is their confidentiality 25 PETERS SHORTHAND REPORTING CORPORATION (916) 362-2345

1 breached?

MS. BOUCHARD: The data -- this isn't 2 just something that's a personal privilege; it's 3 4 also the data, because the data, itself, may lead 5 to identity and information about the person 6 disclosing. 7 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay, well, I'm not going to be able to resolve this --8 9 MS. BOUCHARD: I understand. CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: -- but I have to 10 have the lawyers take a look at this and tell me 11 what they think about it. I will tell you that I 12 13 think that this gentleman's testimony may be 14 relevant to issues with respect to septic tanks in 15 the area. MS. BOUCHARD: Clearly relevancy is an 16 issue in balancing, I understand. We have to make 17 the --18 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: And the actual 19 reports, themselves, -- when did you -- did you 20 21 want those for your case? 22 MR. ONSTOT: Yes, Mr. Chairman, again, I'll reiterate. We're not asking for confidential 23 24 information. We're not asking for names. We're asking for the County's regulatory program and how 25

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it is coordinated with this Board's efforts in 1 2 managing septic tanks. CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: But did you ask for 3 4 individual complaints? 5 MR. ONSTOT: No, the request for 6 documents was quite broad. We did receive the 7 objections. We have no problem with the 8 objections. We're not going to ask that any confidential documents be produced. 9 10 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay. MS. BOUCHARD: Okay, we understand. 11 We've narrowed the scope, then. 12 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay. Good. 13 14 MS. BOUCHARD: Thank you. 15 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Thank you. MR. CARNES: Mr. Young, may I clarify 16 something because it's pretty significant. Steve 17 18 Carnes, County Environmental Health. Unlike many counties in the State of 19 20 California, Environmental Health Services in this 21 County does not -- is not the administrative 22 authority for septic tank installation and repairs. We do not issue permits; we do not 23 24 review construction; we do not size them. 25 This authority rests in this County with

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the building official. So my ability to clarify 1 issues would be limited only to complaints that 2 are reported to us. And even then if we find a 3 4 failure we report that to the building department 5 or code enforcement for them to secure and obtain 6 compliance. 7 So I don't think that I will be that 8 helpful to the proceedings here. 9 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: I understand that, 10 you can only testify as to what you personally 11 know, anyway. MR. CARNES: Exactly. 12 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay. All right, 13 14 thank you. 15 MS. BOUCHARD: Thank you. 16 MR. CARNES: Thank you. CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: All right. Any 17 18 other objections? MS. McPHERSON: Excuse me, I have to 19 20 tell you that he's on our witness list, as well, 21 for several of the designated parties. And they 22 just wanted to ask him some questions about septic tanks. 23 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: That's fine. 24 25 MS. McPHERSON: I just wanted to make

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1 sure that that was on the record.

2 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okav. The 3 designated parties can call any witnesses that 4 they want. The only issue we were dealing with 5 before whether the Board was going to force people 6 to testify that didn't necessarily want to do it 7 voluntarily. That was the issue of the subpoenas. 8 This is the preferred way to get witnesses in to testify, is if they come 9 voluntarily. We got that resolved. Okay, any 10 other objections? This is all with respect to 11 witnesses, documents --12 MR. SHIPE: Mr. Chairman, --13 14 MR. ONSTOT: No, Your Honor, but we do 15 have one motion to make before we get into the actual substance of the case today. 16 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay, let's take 17 18 that up after we get this resolved. Ms. Okun, any other issues? Okay. Any other designated parties 19 20 have any issues? Mr. Shipe, go ahead. 21 MR. SHIPE: Yes, Mr. Young. First I'd 22 like to also apologize for kind of how loud I got last time. We're all individuals, we aren't used 23 24 to this. And the adrenalin is running really high. And so I just kind of -- I felt a little 25

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aggressive, and that was not my point at all. So
I just wanted to clarify that.

A couple questions I had going back to 3 4 the yellow, I mean, I'm sorry, the white and blue 5 cards and the red cards. You mentioned that time 6 will be divided between the different cards. And 7 I wanted to find out if you were going to be 8 dividing that time equally between the different cards, or are you going to divide the time 9 proportionately between the different cards? 10 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: As to the -- you're 11 talking about --12 MR. SHIPE: For interested parties. 13 14 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: For interested 15 parties we're just adding up the total number of 16 cards. MR. SHIPE: Yes. 17 18 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Dividing them into an hour and a half. 19 20 MR. SHIPE: Okay, but what I'm saying is when you divide that, there are people speaking --21 we were told to fill out blue cards if we were in 22 favor of the action --23

CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Color, this is not a
discriminating -- this issue. I don't care what

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1 color the card is.

2 MR. SHIPE: Okay, --CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: No one is getting 3 4 more time because they're on the red side --5 MR. SHIPE: -- so, no, what --CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: -- or the blue side. 6 7 MR. SHIPE: Okay, so the reason why I 8 brought that up is because we were specifically told if we wanted to speak on one side, fill out 9 10 this card. And so I just wanted to make sure 11 you're getting a representative of the --CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: The answer to that 12 13 is if people feel that someone else -- other 14 people can just as well, or better, make their 15 point, that perhaps they would like to step aside; that does donate time to everybody 16 proportionately. Everyone else is --17 18 MR. SHIPE: Okay, so --CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: All right, so I'm 19 not trying to find --20 21 BOARD MEMBER PRESS: Mr. Chair, perhaps 22 to clarify a little bit, you might make a distinction between interested parties and 23 24 designated parties. 25 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Yeah, and we're all PETERS SHORTHAND REPORTING CORPORATION (916) 362-2345

1 referring to the interested parties --

2 MR. SHIPE: Right, yes. BOARD MEMBER PRESS: And so you want to 3 4 reiterate the designated parties are going to have 5 their -- more time than any particular interested 6 party. 7 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Thank you. 8 MR. SHIPE: Okay. Second, I wanted to ask again, so when, looking at the timeline of 9 events it appears the CSD is going to have two 10 11 hours to speak on behalf of a joint defense on everybody. And then each individual is going to 12 13 have 15 minutes to speak on property-specific 14 information only. 15 And the vast majority of evidence that I have to submit is essentially the same type of 16 evidence that the CSD is submitting. But I am 17 very confident that a lot of it is not what they 18 19 are submitting. 20 And so I noticed that you said I'd be 21 able to speak early on. And I'm just hoping that 22 I'm going to be able to speak, and I believe 23 everybody should be able to speak to the issue to 24 everybody, instead of just everybody having to

25 address property-specific issues.

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CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: And perhaps I wasn't 1 clear earlier. But I'm going to let people use 2 their 15 minutes any way they want to. 3 4 MR. SHIPE: Okay. 5 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: If they don't to 6 even get into specific property issues, that's 7 their choice. 8 MR. SHIPE: Okay. CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: I'm only suggesting 9 that when we come to the specific issues of each 10 CDO that it would be most helpful to the Board is 11 to hear some of the specific facts and evidence 12 13 with respect to each individual CDO. 14 If they want to discuss other issues, I'm not going to cut them off, I'll --15 MR. SHIPE: Okay. 16 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: -- let them get into 17 18 that. MR. SHIPE: Okay, thank you. Another 19 question is regarding the time. I submitted my 20 21 evidence jointly with Mr. Bob Borthwick, who is 1048. And he does not live in the area. And we 22 submitted evidence jointly, hoping that we could 23 24 join our evidence and our time. 25 So I'm requesting that I be given the

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1 full half hour.

2 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Where is he? MR. SHIPE: He lives in Huntington 3 4 Beach. He purchased this property out here last 5 August, and he bought it to eventually retire up 6 here. He does not have the ability to come up 7 here and represent himself. And we submitted our 8 evidence jointly, and we're making our argument jointly, just as the prosecution staff requested. 9 10 BOARD MEMBER PRESS: Mr. Chair, wouldn't you need some kind of proxy request --11 MR. SHIPE: I believe the evidence 12 13 packet that I submitted was submitted jointly by 14 both of us. Both of our names are on it. Both of 15 our names signed for all evidence within that 16 packet. CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: I didn't anticipate 17 a request like this. What I did put in the order 18 was that a individual property owner did not have 19 20 to come and make an oral presentation. 21 MR. SHIPE: Yes. 22 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay. MR. SHIPE: But he --23 24 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: That the Board could act solely based on their written submission. So, 25

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in terms of cobbling time together, --1 MR. SHIPE: Well, Mr. Young, the 2 prosecution staff specifically -- okay. 3 4 (Pause.) 5 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Go ahead. 6 MR. SHIPE: Okay, so basically I was 7 just asking, I mean because, like I said, the 8 prosecution staff, in their documents over and over again, they say please make argument and 9 evidence jointly. And I --10 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: That was not meant 11 to say you would be given additional time. 12 MR. SHIPE: I'm not ask --13 14 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: -- to coordinate the 15 presentation. MR. SHIPE: Okay. 16 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: What we will do is 17 18 see how your presentation goes, --19 MR. SHIPE: Okay. 20 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: -- and if you can 21 tell us how you would use the additional time with 22 respect to that property --MR. SHIPE: Not -- well, hold on, but we 23 24 can talk on any issue --25 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: I understand that.

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But you're making a request -- I would prefer to 1 have this done in advance of the hearing, to take 2 up right now. 3 4 MR. SHIPE: Okay, I'm sorry. 5 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: So, --6 MR. SHIPE: Mr. Young, --7 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: -- I'd like to hear 8 what you have to say once we get towards the end of your --9 10 MR. SHIPE: That's fair. CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: -- use it wisely. 11 MR. SHIPE: Oh, I definitely will. And 12 I believe you'll be very interested in what I have 13 14 to say. 15 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay. MR. SHIPE: A couple other questions. 16 Because we have not been granted individual 17 18 hearings, then it is my belief that no CDO should be issued until all have been heard. 19 20 To quote Mr. Jeffries just now, you have 21 to hear all the info before you can make up your 22 mind. 23 (Laughter.) 24 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay. 25 MR. SHIPE: Would you be willing to --

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that is my request that you don't -- because you 1 had said earlier that you planned on ruling on 2 some today, and coming back probably next week on 3 4 others. And I'm asking that you wait till you 5 hear everybody, because we have all asked to 6 submit our evidence jointly. 7 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Well, you guys are 8 very creative. I've --9 (Laughter.) 10 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: -- got a lot of energy. Due process does not require what you're 11 asking, okay. I went through this procedure, 12 13 myself. I laid out the order of presentation as I 14 see fit in terms of trying to accommodate what we 15 need to do today or in another day or two. People are going to be given the chance 16 to present their individual situations and cases. 17 18 I made the decision not to wait until the very end, but to take these one at a time when that 19 20 evidence is most fresh in our mind. I'm hoping 21 we're going to see property-specific evidence. MR. SHIPE: Okay. 22 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: And I want the Board 23 to be able to consider that at that moment 24 25 because, Mr. Shipe, after 20 or 25, I'm liable to

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forget some of the pertinent facts that happened 1 2 early on in the proceeding. And especially because we will most 3 4 likely continue this, --5 MR. SHIPE: Yes. 6 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: -- it's even more 7 important that we at least deal with everything 8 that's presented to us and it's fresh at that 9 moment. That's why I want to do it in this 10 fashion. MR. SHIPE: Okay. 11 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Excuse me, let me 12 just hear from Mr. Shallcross. 13 14 BOARD MEMBER SHALLCROSS: Yeah, I think 15 we need to make something clear, is that each individual party who is subject to a cease and 16 desist order, their particular individual case 17 18 that they put on after the main case has been put on, are not part of each other's case. 19 20 In other words, when you put on your 21 case, and then someone else puts on theirs, we 22 don't take into consideration what you said in your case when we go to rule on their case. 23 24 MR. SHIPE: So, are you saying that 25 basically since the CSD has asked to become a

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designated party, you have granted them all of the 1 authority in representing the entirety of Los 2 Osos? 3 BOARD MEMBER SHALLCROSS: They're not 4 5 representing the entirety, they're representing --CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: I (inaudible) --6 7 (Parties speaking simultaneously.) 8 MR. SHIPE: Okay, sorry. CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: We didn't give them 9 any authority to represent anybody. 10 11 MR. SHIPE: Okay. CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Frankly, as far as I 12 13 know, the lawyers at this table only represent the 14 CSD. So if you're telling me that they're also 15 representing individual property owners, that's new to me. 16 MR. SHIPE: Okay. Then I'm --17 18 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: The reason why I gave them designated party status was because I 19 20 thought they have some legitimate and important 21 issues that they could put before the Board for 22 consideration, and probably have the most wherewithal to do that, to make a presentation. 23 24 And that they could most efficiently cobble that 25 information together and make a presentation that

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most of the individuals would have the benefit of 1 2 simply incorporating by reference. MR. SHIPE: Okay. 3 4 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: That was my 5 decision. 6 MR. SHIPE: Okay, I object to it, but I 7 accept it. CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay. Next point? 8 9 MR. SHIPE: That was basically it, so I look forward to speaking with you this afternoon. 10 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay, fine. All 11 right. Any other designated parties have any 12 issues that they would like the Board to consider? 13 14 Yes, sir. MS. McPHERSON: Can I --15 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: -- we're going to be 16 on a first-name basis --17 MS. McPHERSON: Go ahead. 18 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Go ahead. 19 20 MS. McPHERSON: I am working with 21 designated parties who I'm speaking for about the documents. Are we on documents? 22 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Which designated 23 24 party? 25 MS. McPHERSON: I'd have to go get the

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1 list.

CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Well, Mr. Moylan --2 MR. MOYLAN: She's the coach. 3 4 MS. McPHERSON: I thought we were 5 talking about documents, and I just wanted to --6 like to hear --7 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Sir, what is your 8 name? 9 MR. BEARDSLEY: Are you talking to me? 10 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Yes, I am. MR. BEARDSLEY: Jack Beardsley 11 (phonetic) with The Bay News. 12 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Oh, you're press? 13 14 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Yeah, okay. 15 (Laughter.) CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: I had asked earlier 16 no photos, but the media is not included in that. 17 18 (Audience speaking simultaneously.) CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Please don't do that 19 20 while we are in the middle of discussing things 21 with people. I would appreciate that; it just is 22 distracting. MS. McPHERSON: Let me know when I can 23 24 mention --25 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Documents

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(inaudible). Okay, Mr. Moylan.

MR. MOYLAN: Yes, I have an objection 2 3 about an email that was sent to designated parties 4 last night. 5 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: From who? 6 MR. MOYLAN: Kelley Blacksher. 7 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Who's this person? 8 MR. MOYLAN: Apparently she works for your Board. 9 10 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay, go 11 ahead. MR. MOYLAN: This is at the eleventh 12 13 hour, 23 hours before this meeting, she said that 14 they were objecting to certain kinds of evidence. One of the kinds of evidence that was 15 being objected to by your Board was newspapers, 16 articles. Now, everybody reads the newspapers and 17 18 we're not talking about yellow journalism newspapers like The Globe or The World or 19 20 whatever. We're talking about TT and The Tribune. 21 At any rate, I just had this objection, 22 and it's the last-minute objection to evidence presented to you over three weeks ago. It's 23 24 objectionable to me. The proper time to elicit your objections to any evidence presented was 25 PETERS SHORTHAND REPORTING CORPORATION (916) 362-2345

April 19, 2006 when you submitted your rebuttal to 1 all the evidence that we presented on April 5th. 2 Sending out prosecution staff evidence 3 4 objections just 23 hours before our hearing date 5 in time is unjust and reprehensible. I do not 6 accept this inappropriate eleventh hour 7 submission. 8 MS. OKUN: Would you like me to respond to that? 9 10 MR. MOYLAN: No, --11 (Laughter.) CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Ms. Okun, did that 12 come from the prosecution staff's --13 14 MS. OKUN: I believe he's referring to 15 the prosecution staff evidence objections which we did provide to everyone that we had email 16 addresses for. I confirmed with Mr. Thomas before 17 18 the hearing that there was no due date for the evidence objection, so we actually could have 19 20 showed up today and made them today. 21 I wanted to provide as much notice as 22 possible to the Board and to the parties. And unfortunately, it took me much longer than I 23 24 expected because of the extraordinary length of 25 the submission from the CSD. And the fact that

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some of those 849 documents weren't actually 1 2 documents. They were files consisting of hundreds 3 of pages. Some of them were mislabeled. It took 4 a very long time to go through those documents. 5 I could have gotten the objections in 6 earlier had they done a better job of refining 7 their evidence list. 8 Also, in terms of --(Audience speaking simultaneously.) 9 10 MS. OKUN: -- the speaker referring to 11 your objections, I did want to point out again that those objections were from the prosecution 12 13 staff and not from the Board team. The Board 14 actually hasn't ruled on those objections, as you 15 said earlier; and hasn't thoroughly reviewed them, either. 16 17 On the issue of accepting newspaper articles, these are hearsay. They're not the type 18 19 of materials that people are accustomed to rely on in the conduct of serious affairs, which is the 20 21 evidentiary standard for this hearing. And for 22 that reason we move to exclude all newspaper articles, and similarly, press releases and blogs 23 24 (inaudible). 25 MR. MOYLAN: I'd like to rebut that.

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CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Go ahead.

2 MR. MOYLAN: As far as newspaper 3 articles being hearsay, it's actually how truthful 4 the person writing the article is. Later on, 5 after a person reads an article they may find out 6 that there was an omission or an error in the 7 newsprint.

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8 But generally when you read a good 9 newspaper article by whom you consider good staff 10 on the writing staff, you believe it pretty much.

And as far as dismissing it just as hearsay, Roger Briggs, Executive Officer, said that there's no reason why people of Los Osos shouldn't have known about the cease and desist orders or the prohibition zone, even if they bought their property after 1988, because it's been all over the press.

18 So he expects us to get our information 19 from the press, but then we can't use other 20 information from the press that you don't want to 21 allow us.

CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Mr. Moylan, first of all the newspaper articles are hearsay without anyone making an issue about it. These are outof-court, out-of-proceedings statements, period.

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1 Read the definition of that.

2 Just like you go outside and have some conversation with somebody, that's a hearsay 3 4 statement to this proceeding. So, they're 5 hearsay. 6 The question is is it the type of 7 hearsay that people would take into consideration 8 in a proceeding like this. I'm saying no because maybe 80 percent of an article is true, depends on 9 10 who the writer is, as you say. But it is full of opinion and facts that are not accurate. 11 MR. MOYLAN: That could also be said for 12 testimony or opinions by the Board, correct? 13 14 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Any testimony is 15 subject to impeachment, that's correct. MR. MOYLAN: Okay. 16 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: And if you have 17 18 issues with whatever Mr. Briggs has said, you are free to ask him that when it's your time to do so. 19 20 MR. MOYLAN: Thank you. 21 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: But a newspaper 22 article is just naturally untrustworthy for this type of hearing. That's why they're excluded. 23 24 Thank you for your comments. 25 MR. MOYLAN: Okay, thank you.

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CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Does anyone else 1 2 have any procedural evidentiary issues? Okay, Mr. Pearson, are you represented? 3 MS. McPHERSON: I'll be happy to get a 4 5 list of people at the break, if you'd like that. 6 It wasn't requested. And unless you want all of 7 them to weigh in here, I can probably make it more 8 efficient. You did mention that that was part of your goal. 9 10 If you want to call each one, --CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: I didn't want to do 11 that, but I would like that --12 MS. McPHERSON: Okay, I just want to --13 14 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: I would like a list 15 later of who you're representing. MS. McPHERSON: Okay. 16 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Go ahead. 17 MS. McPHERSON: You'll have that. 18 I apologize that defendants in these 19 proceedings don't understand evidentiary standards 20 21 and some of the issues surrounding documents. The 22 documents were compiled by the CSD, but also by the defendants. And so many of them here, and 23 24 there's very very many that have been knocked out, 25 off the list, and these are documents that are

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being used by all 45, at least 23 I know of.

2 And each has had a chance -- has not had a chance to object to Ms. Okun knocking those off. 3 4 And they probably will need to. 5 But one of the things that's really 6 difficult is that the documents that were removed, 7 they were not aware of that. It's not on the 8 website. And the information came to the CSD. So, many of the people here are depending upon 9 10 using documents that are removed. And so they're going to have to sit down at lunch, also, at a 11 very large table, I would say, and go through each 12 of these documents and say, oh, that's one I'm 13 14 using. In addition to that, in addition to that 15 in order to have a fair hearing, I think if it was 16 too difficult to get this out in time, that 17 18 prosecution certainly would have had a good reason for a continuance. We really begged for a 19 20 continuance because we felt like we needed at 21 least a week to figure out how to regroup since 22 the CDOs had changed and the documents that we would use to make a defense had changed. 23 And if it's too difficult for the 24 prosecution to pull that together, I suggest we do 25

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have a continuance in the interests of justice.

And in the press, our own CSD Members have been quoted in the press as doing all kinds of things which then have made their way into staff reports and positions by the Board, Board Staff, in taking action against the community.

7 So, there's actually action taken 8 against the citizens. Whether we would even have 9 CDOs today for individuals is questionable. And 10 that's the reason question, why are we here. Why 11 are we getting CDOs. And I think some of these 12 documents are necessary in order to demonstrate 13 that.

14 And I also wanted to just add that the 15 taped information to hear the cases and then rule on them all afterwards, in the procedures it was 16 17 very unclear whether these people were supposed to 18 somehow consolidate their testimony without 19 knowing who the other ones were, just as you're 20 asking them to consolidate their interested 21 parties' comments without knowing -- I mean 22 they're not psychic. They can't tell what the 23 other one's going to say.

24It's impossible. And so they are joined25in using one another's testimony. I believe the

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procedures say that, that all of this would be 1 considered together for each case. And it would 2 3 all be incorporated. 4 Now, are they to say, when they come up 5 here, incorporate everything that was said from 6 this time to this time, or do they have to specify 7 that, or is it all going to be incorporated? 8 That's very unclear at this point. And I think that the procedures are convoluted for the 9 average citizen. And you probably heard from the 10 ones that had the best grip. So, you know, hold 11 on for the rest of the --12 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Anything else? 13 14 MS. McPHERSON: Probably, but I'll --CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay, let me take 15 these one at a time. 16 17 MS. McPHERSON: Okay. CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: As to the exhibits, 18 I think it's entirely appropriate for the other 19 designated parties to be able to review the CSD's 20 21 exhibit list when the prosecution team does so, 22 and so they get to weigh in if they feel that any of those exhibits that Ms. Okun feels should be 23 24 stricken, if any of the other designated parties, 25 and not -- Ms. McPherson may not be speaking for

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you, there may be others out there, it is entirely appropriate for you to have some input into any of those exhibits that you feel are -- that you need or want to rely upon.

5 So, I will let you take that up, you can 6 take that up with Ms. Okun, Mr. Onstot in terms of 7 how that's to be coordinated.

8 MS. McPHERSON: And that's to be done at 9 lunch?

10 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Well, I think it 11 should start at some point, not while we're all 12 sitting here waiting for it to happen. Okay, so I 13 think possibly at lunch.

14 MS. McPHERSON: Well, I was up until 15 3:00 in the morning just drawing lines through everything, and then trying to get kind of a grip, 16 17 myself. So I don't know how it's going to be able 18 to have people who -- it's going to be incredibly difficult to come back and say that something 19 20 should be allowed out of the record, and not be 21 allowed as evidence.

22 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay, well, let me 23 think about that, and the other Board Members 24 think about it and our counsel, Board Counsel. 25 We'll revisit that issue as to how to coordinate

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1 that.

All right, secondly, as to a 2 continuance, the prosecution team simply removed a 3 4 recommendation that they had put into the prospective CDOs. That's all that they did. 5 6 MS. McPHERSON: They also took out other 7 language, lots of other language in the CDO 8 besides just the pumping requirement. 9 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay, well, I don't 10 see that as a need for a continuance, that they hadn't serving anything new that you would have to 11 respond to it. The alternative for a designated 12 13 party to come up with an alternative to pumping 14 has always been there. 15 MS. McPHERSON: Just the time to compare the two documents, and look through them and make 16 sure that -- the staff report also changed. And 17 18 then there was a rebuttal that came out from the 19th, it was posted. And people went through 19 20 that. Then things changed, and they have to go 21 back and take a look at how they were going to 22 present their defense in light of all of these changes up to, and some of them, most of them 23 24 don't know about the document changes. 25 I mean I got them literally at 2:00,

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hand-carried from somebody who had them at the CSD office. I didn't have those. The designated parties did not have those. So it does go to a fair defense, because they don't know how. I guess they don't know what

5 they don't know how. I guess they don't know wha 6 they're giving away by going along with what you 7 say is not a problem.

8 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: No, I didn't say 9 it's not a problem. What I said was staff's 10 recommendation to the Board on a specific remedy 11 is then deleted. Part of that is still in effect. 12 MS. MCPHERSON: They put -- they put --13 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: So I don't see that 14 as a need for a continuance.

15 MS. MCPHERSON: Are you familiar with 16 what came out last night in our emails that said, 17 in fact, pumping is there? And yesterday it 18 wasn't there. And this morning on the news it 19 wasn't there. But in the press it was there.

20 We are so confused. What we think is 21 that you probably have taken the pumping out so 22 that you can add it back in, or -- I mean, we just 23 don't even know.

CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay, well, there
was a -- the Board issued its own response, if

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that's what we want to call it, -- the first time we heard about the prosecution team's changing any part of the CDOs is when everyone else did. I read that and wasn't quite sure what that was all about.

6 But I wanted the public to know that the 7 Board can fashion its own remedy irrespective of 8 what the staff is recommending. It is based on 9 facts presented before us. And so staff is not 10 recommending pumping, but the Board is free to 11 fashion any remedy, including pumping, if it puts 12 its reasoning on the record. And so --

MS. MCPHERSON: And what part does the designated party play in that decision, since they're recommending something that you are going to --

17 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: They are going to18 have a part in that that is changed.

MS. McPHERSON: Well, they have to
present that information to you.
CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: What information?

22 MS. McPHERSON: As to a remedy. 23 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: That's always been 24 there.

25 MS. McPHERSON: Apparently that's not

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really there, either. What is says is that, when 1 we've made calls, is that you can bring that to us 2 after you get your CDO. You accept the CDO as you 3 4 get it, and if you have another remedy then you 5 bring it to us to review after. I had --6 BOARD MEMBER PRESS: Mr. Chair, I think 7 we're getting into the hearing, itself. I think 8 that what the speaker was suggesting is that we have the hearing, that staff makes its 9 10 recommendation. The Board will consider the evidence and fashion its own remedy. It's not --11 I'm getting the sense that you are suggesting that 12 13 a remedy has been decided upon, and that the Board 14 is --15 MS. McPHERSON: No, we --BOARD MEMBER PRESS: -- going to be 16 17 basically --18 MS. McPHERSON: But we're --CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: -- or not, so I 19 think that we have to wait and hear what all sides 20 21 have to say. And then we have to deliberate. I don't think that -- I mean it's an infinite 22 23 regress to have proposals and counterproposals back and forth. And then never hold a hearing 24 25 because you want to respond --

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1 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: I think what she's 2 saying is that if the CDO is to be accepted that 3 there has been -- staff is not recommending that 4 people put forth any alternative --

5 BOARD MEMBER PRESS: I think we need to6 hear the staff's presentation.

7 MS. McPHERSON: I think that the people 8 have 15 minutes to make a case, and there's a moving target, and we don't know what the staff is 9 10 going to recommend. And so we don't know what 11 we're supposed to be defending or what we're supposed to be presenting. It's a moving target; 12 13 keeps going back and forth. And it's being 14 reported all over one way and another. And 15 there's so much confusion out there.

Each person has 15 minutes, and that's not enough to defend themselves and then try to figure out what they say today and what you may come up with as a remedy.

And so what I'm saying is that people have done -- some people have done hundreds of hours of research, only to be told by staff that that would be considered afterwards. After we get our CDOs.

25 So, we're really unclear on that 15

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1 minutes and how best to use that time.

2	CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Well, I don't know
3	what staff has told anybody, because they're not
4	talking so I need to hear what staff has to say
5	about this. And we'll revisit this issue
6	MS. McPHERSON: Should some use their
7	defense time to show emails to confirm what I'm
8	saying or what?
9	CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: I'd like to take a
10	look at the emails that you're referring to at
11	lunch. Not right now. Your request, I'm not
12	going to grant that. I'm interested to know what
13	your concern is
14	MS. McPHERSON: I'm concerned
15	CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: I want to see that
16	email, and I want to see what was put I want to
17	take a look again at the CDOs.
18	MS. McPHERSON: Okay.
19	CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: So,
20	MS. OKUN: Yeah, I can provide some
21	clarification on this. The original proposal was
22	to require bimonthly pumping of the septic tanks,
23	or to propose an alternative that would achieve
24	equivalent water quality protection.
25	The way the CDOs were drafted the Board

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didn't have to approve those alternatives. 1 Thev 2 could adopt the CDOs and the parties could provide their proposals later to be approved by the 3 4 Executive Officer. 5 I think that's what Ms. McPherson is 6 referring to about the people being told that they 7 could bring their evidence of alternatives later. 8 We changed our proposal as requested by virtually all of the parties who submitted 9 comments to remove the pumping requirements and 10 11 the requirement to propose an alternative for parties who didn't want to be pumping. 12 13 So, if the CDOs are adopted as currently 14 proposed, proposing alternatives isn't an issue. 15 That requirement's been deleted from the proposal. CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: All right, I've got 16 it. 17 18 MS. McPHERSON: Okay, so some of these 19 people didn't get it. 20 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Well, I'm afraid 21 that that's always the situation in many different 22 kinds of proceedings. I can't go through, myself, 23 individually, and advise people. People do have a 24 responsibility to get competent consultation and counsel. That's just how these proceedings work 25

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1 in many --

2 MS. McPHERSON: When the --CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: So, let's --3 4 MS. McPHERSON: When the last change 5 occurred --6 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Ms. McPherson, we're 7 not going to continue on --8 MS. McPHERSON: Okay. 9 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Let's go to the next 10 issue, where someone confused about 11 incorporation --MS. SCHICKER: Mr. Young. 12 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Excuse me. Ms. 13 14 McPherson, your last point had to do with 15 incorporation. And the point was that the proceeding testimony from the CSD could be 16 incorporated by the individual designated 17 18 homeowners if they wanted to incorporate it so they didn't have to repeat that testimony, and 19 20 they wanted to rely upon it. MS. McPHERSON: And so they need to 21 22 track what's being --CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: No, it's 23 24 automatically done. 25 MS. McPHERSON: It's automatically done.

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1	CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Automatically done.
2	They don't have to worry about mentioning it.
3	Go ahead.
4	MR. RICHARDS: The Regional Board
5	Chairman and its Advisors, which is Mike Thomas
6	and myself, in conjunction with Mr. Young, decided
7	that the testimony that would be presented all
8	the interested parties, all the interested
9	persons, excuse me, all the interested persons'
10	commentary and all the testimony presented by the
11	Regional Board Prosecution Team and all of the
12	testimony presented by the Community Services
13	District would be automatically included in the
14	record of the proceedings for each individual
15	cease and desist order.
16	So, the designated parties who are
17	subject to these proceedings today don't have to
18	do anything in order to have that testimony, those
19	arguments and those comments, incorporated into
20	the record of their proceedings.
21	The Chair has also ruled that individual
22	designated parties may incorporate, by reference,
23	testimony offered by other designated parties.
24	So, if the first designated party who
25	takes his or her 15 minutes and presents evidence
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that can be deemed relevant to a subsequent 1 2 proceeding, that subsequent designated party can 3 ask that the prior testimony be incorporated into 4 the record for their proceeding. 5 MS. McPHERSON: So that's not automatic. MR. RICHARDS: If it is relevant. No. 6 That is not automatic. In each case the person 7 8 asking to incorporate must show the Board how the evidence that they seek to incorporate by 9 10 reference is relevant to their particular 11 proceeding. And that's the way the procedure has 12 13 been set up today. And that's how it's going to 14 be addressed as the hearing goes on. 15 MS. McPHERSON: So, if they're asking to have -- they need to keep a scorecard, pretty 16 much, I'm just talking to the benefit, and correct 17 18 me if I'm wrong, they basically have to keep a 19 score of who's saying what that might apply to 20 them, which they're not aware of as of now. And 21 seek to incorporate that by reference at the 22 beginning of their 15 minutes. And then if you have questions as to the relevancy, then you would 23 24 ask that. That wouldn't come out of their 15 25 minutes, correct? The questions? And to

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1 establish the relevance of that.

2	And then they would go ahead and then
3	give their presentation. Is that the is that
4	how it works?
5	CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: I would say that
6	that is pretty much the way I see it. They're
7	going to have to keep track of what testimony they
8	want to incorporate.
9	MS. McPHERSON: Okay.
10	CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: They're going to
11	have to listen and keep notes. And if there's
12	things, if there's evidence submitted that they
13	feel is relevant and important and they want to
14	incorporate it, they're going to have to let us
15	know about that.
16	MS. McPHERSON: Okay. I just didn't
17	want them to think it was automatic for them.
18	CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: That's not.
19	MS. McPHERSON: The record, itself, is
20	automatic.
21	CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: The CSD's testimony,
22	the prosecution staff's testimony, that's
23	automatically being incorporated into all the
24	individual property owners case, yes.
25	MS. McPHERSON: Okay.

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CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay. 1 MS. McPHERSON: Okay, I hope that's 2 clear with --3 4 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: All right. Ms. 5 Schicker, you --6 MS. SCHICKER: Yes. 7 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: -- have an attorney 8 here --9 MS. SCHICKER: I know. 10 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: -- and you're not --MS. SCHICKER: I need to be able to 11 speak to you for a second, please. 12 13 My name is Lisa Schicker; I'm the 14 President of the Los Osos Community Services 15 District. And I was directly involved in the preparation of the documents, which our attorneys 16 were not. I work full time. And I have not had a 17 18 chance to review the rejection list, except 19 briefly. 20 And there are documents on there that I 21 completely object to being removed. And they are 22 not hearsay and newspaper articles, et cetera. And I request time to be able to consult 23 24 with our attorneys before, to go through that 850document list where many documents were removed. 25

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And I don't know about them yet. I didn't receive 1 2 anything from Ms. Okun. I have email, too. And I need some more time. That's all I'm asking. 3 4 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Well, you have an 5 attorney that's representing you, Ms. Schicker --6 MS. SCHICKER: I realize that. 7 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: -- your attorney is 8 who should be handling this objection for you. 9 MS. SCHICKER: I want to be able to --CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Excuse me. I've 10 11 asked the attorneys to please meet and confer over this issue. Consult with your attorney, Mr. 12 13 Onstot, and allow him to do that for you. 14 I've given time for that. I haven't 15 created a deadline for that to take place. I'm encouraging it to happen over the lunch hour. 16 MS. SCHICKER: I don't believe -- I just 17 would like to object to the amount of time. 18 Ιt 19 would take longer than that. 20 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: I note your 21 objection and --22 MS. SCHICKER: Thank you. CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: All right, then. 23 24 Any other objections we need to take up? Okay. 25 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: I just wanted to

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1 clarify one issue.

2	CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Your name?
3	UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: My name is
4	(redacted.)
5	CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay.
6	UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: We received one
7	of the CDOs.
8	CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Yes.
9	UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: The last
10	discussion still left me a little bit confused.
11	And I would just like to ask the Board if during
12	our testimony we would choose to offer a remedy
13	instead of CDO, would the Board consider that at
14	this time.
15	The written materials we have received
16	and the last few minutes of testimony have still
17	left it unclear. And I apologize if I'm being
18	repetitious, but if you could just give me a clear
19	answer so I would know.
20	CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Well, the answer is
21	the Board considers everything that's submitted to
22	us within your presentation. And certainly, as
23	part of it, if you want to propose anything to the
24	Board, we're all going to be open ears to it.
25	I can't tell you how we're going to

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1 respond to it, but I can tell you we're going to
2 listen to it and consider it.

3 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Okay, and I 4 appreciate this. That's because one of the first 5 documents did state that basically the CDOs would 6 be issued if they were to be decided upon, and 7 then we could come back with alternatives. So, 8 you're saying we could present an alternative now 9 that you may consider?

10 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: I would say that 11 anything like that is possible. I'm saying the Board can act upon the proposed CDOs and fashion 12 13 some remedy if it sees fit, as long as its 14 conclusions are based on facts in the record. And 15 the Board has to state what those would be, why they're doing whatever they want to do. So, 16 you'll have an opportunity to make that pitch to 17 18 the Board.

19 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Okay, I
20 appreciate that. The first documents made it
21 sound as though we wouldn't even be allowed to
22 present that argument at this time. I appreciate
23 your clarification, thank you.

24 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Ms. Okun, do you25 want to clarify any confusion that may be there?

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Are individuals permitted to make pitches to the 1 2 Board? MS. OKUN: Of course. 3 4 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Yeah. There's 5 nothing that the prosecution team has issued that 6 can prevent that from happening, is that right? 7 MS. OKUN: That's correct. 8 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay. All right. Any other objections? 9 10 MR. MATTINGLY: My name's Dustan Mattingly and --11 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Are you a designated 12 13 party? 14 MR. MATTINGLY: Yes, sir. 15 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay, --MR. MATTINGLY: I know I don't look like 16 it. But, as you can see, I have been pulling my 17 18 hair out, so I am a local lucky lottery winner --CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay. Your address, 19 20 sir? 21 MR. MATTINGLY: 440 Woodland. 22 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay. 23 MR. MATTINGLY: And that is in Los Osos, 24 California. 25 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay.

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MR. MATTINGLY: Not Los Grosos. I'd 1 2 just like to see a show of hands of anybody else in here that maybe has been pulling their hair out 3 4 or is completely confused --5 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Sir, do you --MR. MATTINGLY: I would like it on the 6 7 record to see how man of these people are confused 8 about this recent document that came to us saying that -- and all this jargon. I'd like some time 9 10 to go over it with my attorneys, too. 11 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay. Can you please state --12 MR. MATTINGLY: Show of hands? Can I 13 14 have a record of this, sir? I think it's a --15 that everyone here should be recorded that is confused. Because maybe you're not confused, but 16 I know damn right I'm confused. And all these 17 other people are. Okay, you have elderly people 18 19 in here, you have young people like myself that 20 aren't into the political game. We just want to 21 live in Los Osos. We've paid our money; we've 22 paid our dues to live in Los Osos. 23 Because we have people that decided to 24 jump the gun on starting a project does not mean 25 that we should be punished for it. So I think we

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should have ample time to review all of the 1 2 documents and everything else, besides a two-day notice that was dropped at my door. I would have 3 4 liked a certified letter, personally. Thank you. 5 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Thank you for you 6 comments. 7 (Applause.) 8 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Does anyone else have any objections? How could I think we were --9 10 MR. BISHOP: We can't be done yet. CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Sir, your name for 11 the record? 12 MR. BISHOP: My name's Larry Bishop, and 13 14 I have the CDO. 15 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay. MR. BISHOP: I come with a solution 16 17 rather than problems and accusations. 18 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Is this something 19 you can share with us during the presentation? 20 MR. BISHOP: I would -- it's probably 21 going to take a lot longer than 15 minutes to 22 share with you. I would like the opportunity, if it has to be over lunchtime, to meet with whoever 23 24 can look at my idea and bring it back to you, and 25 say, yes, it's a very workable solution, to end

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1 all this.

CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Is this something 2 3 that you put in writing to us as part of your 4 package? 5 MR. BISHOP: Part of it was, and it has 6 changed over the time because of the pumping 7 requirements and all that. And more thought to 8 it. 9 I think I really have an idea of how you can solve this whole problem very quickly if you'd 10 just do a quick little math. If you take five 11 minutes for every CDO, the Board Members are going 12 to sit here for 400 hours. And I can save you 13 14 that time. 15 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Thank you for your 16 comments. MS. McPHERSON: There's somebody who 17 18 wanted -- you had asked earlier for people who had to leave and needed to have, kind of for the 19 20 record, who could have some kind of special, I guess, consideration. 21 22 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Pertinent health 23 issues, --24 MS. McPHERSON: yes. CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: -- or --25 PETERS SHORTHAND REPORTING CORPORATION (916) 362-2345

1 MS. McPHERSON: This lady would like to 2 speak.

CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay. 3 4 MS. McPHERSON: She's on dialysis. 5 MS. CINDERSON: I don't know what to say 6 very much, but I'm on dialysis. I've been in Los 7 Osos, it's been 30 years. My name is Sheila 8 Cinderson. I'm fighting for my life on my kidneys. My husband works -- people know it's 9 10 from here, from Los Osos. I've been out there 30 years. I don't have a CDO yet. I pump my septic 11 tank every three years, so I don't know what you 12 13 want. 14 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Ma'am, you have not received --15 MS. CINDERSON: Not yet, but it's making 16 me sick. I'm on the deathbed almost. I mean I 17 18 can't even -- the stress of this is killing me. CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: You don't have to be 19 20 here today. MS. CINDERSON: I know I don't have to 21 22 be here, but I don't know how to do it. 23 (Parties speaking simultaneously.) 24 MS. CINDERSON: I'm sorry --25 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay, I suggest you

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contact Ms. Okun or the prosecution team staff --1 2 MS. CINDERSON: To do what? CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: To present your 3 4 questions if there's something you don't know how 5 to do. You should seek competent advice. 6 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: The Board can't 7 give that to you. 8 MS. CINDERSON: I know. CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay? 9 10 MS. CINDERSON: But I would like you to know that people are -- it's not just me. I know 11 there's other people out there that are sick. 12 Maybe I'm not important, but I feel that I might 13 14 be important --15 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: You are important. (Audience speaking simultaneously.) 16 17 (Applause.) 18 MS. CINDERSON: And I do appreciate what everybody's trying to do. I do pump my septic 19 20 tank out every three years. And I don't know what 21 to do. And I hope that you guys decide the right 22 decision. And I hope that you take consideration about other people. Thank you. That's all I 23 24 wanted to say. 25 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Thank you very much,

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1 okay.

2 (Applause.) CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Folks, please. 3 4 MS. McPHERSON: I apologize. She just 5 needed to make her public comments, and she asked if she could do that. She has to leave. 6 7 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: She's not even a 8 designated party. 9 MS. McPHERSON: No, no, she can't be 10 here. She wanted to be here for her --(Audience speaking simultaneously.) 11 MS. McPHERSON: She just wanted to be 12 13 here for public comment and she could not be here, that's all. 14 15 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay. MR. ALABE: My name's Chris Alabe, CDO 16 I have submitted my statements for the 17 victim. 18 Board, along with Mr. Payne's. And will we get 30 minutes for our presentation, or 15 total? 19 20 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: You're both here. 21 MR. ALABE: Right. 22 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: So you can have your 15 minutes each. 23 24 MR. ALABE: Each. Okay. 25 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay?

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MR. ALABE: Thank you. 1 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: If you want to stand 2 up here together and give evidence, that's fine 3 4 with me. All right? 5 MR. ALABE: Okay, thank you. 6 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Any other issues? 7 Okay. We are going to take a break and come back 8 at 12:30. Then we'll resume with public comments/ interested party presentations. 9 10 MR. PAIGE: I have one other point of -one other issue. 11 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: What is your name? 12 13 MR. PAIGE: My name is Steven Paige, and 14 I live in the prohibition zone. CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Sir, let's take it 15 up at 12:30. I'll let you begin at 12:30. 16 MR. PAIGE: Okay, thank you. 17 18 (Brief recess.) CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: It's 12:30, why 19 don't we resume. If everybody would come in and 20 21 find a seat we can begin with our interested 22 persons. But before we do that, I believe Mr. Paige had a few comments. 23 24 Mr. Paige, are you a CDO recipient? 25 MR. PAIGE: No, I'm basically a witness

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1 for the CSD.

CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay. Can that 2 wait, then, until they've put on their case, 3 4 what --5 MR. PAIGE: Well, I just don't know how 6 to describe what I'm going to describe to you, 7 whether it's something that's already approved or 8 not approved. 9 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Well, we will deal with that when it comes up. 10 MR. PAIGE: Okay, that's fine. 11 MS. OKUN: Mr. Young. 12 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Yes. 13 14 MS. OKUN: I had a question at the break 15 from one of the people who had requested to have their names and address redacted for safety 16 reasons because of their profession. And they 17 were asking how that's going to be handled at this 18 hearing. 19 20 In terms of our presentation we have a 21 map showing approximately where the locations of 22 all the CDOs are. We're not planning on stating any addresses. 23 24 But I was wondering if you could respond 25 to their concerns about what was going to be

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public. Obviously, this is a public hearing, and it's being broadcast on cable tv. So if people stand up and choose to give certain information, it's public.

5 I don't know if the Board's going to be 6 stating any other additional information, or 7 requiring any other additional information. But 8 those concerns have been expressed.

9 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Well, I'd ask Mr. 10 Richards maybe to assist me on that. We're 11 dealing with site-specific properties. And so I 12 don't know how we can't get that information into 13 the record in front of the public. Any thoughts? 14 (Pause.)

15 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: We will allow those 16 individuals to just identify themselves by their 17 order number, and they won't have to state what 18 their address is, if that's their preference, they 19 may put that on the record.

Okay, folks, Ms. Hewitt handed me a
sign-in sheet. I'm not quite sure what this is.
MR. SHIPE: That's mine.
CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay. I just wanted
people to know that this is not the Regional

25 Board's sign-in sheet. Mr. Shipe, you are

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1 circulating this?

2 MR. SHIPE: Absolutely. CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay. 3 4 MR. SHIPE: And I told the first people 5 that -- it's a telephone -- and it didn't get 6 around, I guess. 7 I'm sorry, I told the first few people that I handed it to, but I guess that didn't go 8 9 around with it. 10 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay, why don't you just -- I'm going to hand this back to you --11 12 MR. SHIPE: Okay. CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: -- and you could 13 14 label it so it's self-identifying. 15 MR. SHIPE: My apologies. And if anybody wants to take their name off the list, 16 feel free to contact me. 17 18 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay. Yes, ma'am. MS. MOYLAN: Excuse me, Mr. Young. I'm 19 Beverley DeWitt-Moylan, and --20 21 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Right. MS. MOYLAN: -- I just wanted to lodge 22 an objection before we moved along. 23 24 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay. 25 MS. MOYLAN: You had mentioned that my

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husband and I would have to consolidate our time. 1 2 And I just would like to object to that. He and I, both, prepared presentations. 3 And because I am also a designated 4 5 party, I had assumed that I also had the 15 6 minutes, so that between us we would have 30 7 minutes to present. 8 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay; your objection is noted. Thank you. 9 10 All right. Interested persons --11 actually, is the Assemblyman still here, or someone from his office? Not here. Okay. We 12 13 didn't let him know we were going to let him go 14 first. I understand he had a hearing --15 MR. ONSTOT: Mr. Chairman, we did have two points before --16 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay. 17 18 MR. ONSTOT: One is that the individual 19 dischargers have retained an expert, Dr. Daniel 20 Wickham, who's President of ABG Wastewater 21 Solutions. And he's out of Sebastopol, and he's 22 on the clock. So he asked to be put on a priority 23 status, along with the others, as well, since he 24 traveled a long way to be here today. And 25 obviously has relevant testimony, since he has a

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PhD and is an expert in septic tank pumping and 1 its affect on the environment. 2 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay. 3 4 MR. ONSTOT: So that's one request --5 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: He's not retained by 6 the CSD, but retained by individual --7 MR. ONSTOT: Dischargers. 8 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: -- dischargers, okay. And where is he? 9 10 MR. ONSTOT: He's here. CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Where? 11 (Parties speaking simultaneously.) 12 13 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay, as long as 14 he's at hand, that's fine. 15 All right, Michael, how many cards do we have? 16 MR. ONSTOT: The other --17 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Go ahead. 18 MR. ONSTOT: The other thing, Mr. 19 Chairman, is the CSD does have a motion to dismiss 20 that I would like to make at this time. 21 22 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay. MR. ONSTOT: As you know, we submitted 23 24 extensive comments relating to what we perceive are due process violations. And unfortunately, we 25

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felt so strongly about this that our President, 1 2 Ms. Schicker, wrote to the State Board asking the State Board to intervene and stop these 3 4 proceedings today. 5 We received yesterday a reply from the 6 Chairwoman of the State Board, and I'll read it. 7 It's only one paragraph: 8 "Thank you for your email. The State Water Resources Control Board takes due process 9 concerns very seriously. While it cannot 10 11 actively intervene in the ongoing process before the Central Coast Water Board, I have 12 13 relayed your concerns to the Water Board 14 Staff. I've also requested that they 15 carefully consider all procedural requests such as your request for a continuance, and 16 17 insure that their hearing procedures protect 18 the due process rights of all individuals." 19 And that's signed by Chairwoman Doduc. Now, the reason that's important is because we 20 21 have a brand new court case that is directly on 22 point. And it is called the Morongo Band of Mission Indians v. The State Water Resources 23 24 Control Board. The decision is of January 2006. 25 And in that case the due process aspects of having

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1 a prosecution team was directly at issue. And the 2 court found, along with another court, that when 3 you have a prosecution team that has members that 4 also advises a water board, even on different 5 matters, that that is a violation of due process 6 and the proceedings cannot go forward.

7 The case number, for those of you who 8 want to write it down and for the press at home, is case number 04-CS-00535. And the specific 9 10 facts in that case dealt with a enforcement team that went before the State Board. And the 11 attorney on the enforcement team was also an 12 13 attorney that advised the State Board on other 14 matters.

15 The court found that that was a 16 violation of due process because it imputed bias 17 on the part of the proceedings because board 18 members naturally, maybe not consciously, give 19 greater credibility to the professionals that 20 advise it on a regular basis, as opposed to other 21 people who appear before the board.

Now this court case relied upon another decision called the Quintero v. City of Santa Ana case. It's a 2003 case at 114Cal.Ap.4th, page 810. And in that case we had a city attorney's

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1 office, where the deputy city attorney worked both 2 the personnel board prosecution team, as well as 3 advised the personnel board, itself. And in that 4 case it was also held to be a violation of due 5 process for that to happen.

6 The bottomline is that this case holds, 7 as did Quintero, that the quote-unquote Chinese 8 wall that is set up with regional boards for 9 prosecution teams that are regional board staff 10 members that also advise the board, are a 11 violation of constitutional due process.

12 In this particular case Mr. Briggs is 13 designated to be on the prosecution team. We have 14 ample evidence that Mr. Briggs advises this Board 15 on a number of other matters.

16 In addition, Ms. Okun is the attorney 17 designated on the prosecution team. And Ms. Okun 18 routinely advises this Board on other matters. 19 Even on today's agenda, in closed session there's 20 at least 20 different cases that Ms. Okun will be 21 advising this Board on.

Because Mr. Briggs and Ms. Okun have submitted comments to this Board on behalf of the prosecution team, and have been major players thus far, the imputed bias to this Board is clearly

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1 established by their conduct thus far.

0	
2	Accordingly, based upon the Morongo Band
3	of Indians v. State Water Resources case, and the
4	Quintero v. City of Santa Ana case, the Community
5	Services District hereby moves that these
6	proceedings be dismissed immediately.
7	CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay. Ms. Okun, any
8	comments?
9	MS. OKUN: Well, first of all, the
10	Morongo case is a trial court decision which I
11	believe is on appeal. In terms of the Quintero
12	argument we have complied with all requirements of
13	the Administrative Procedure Act that apply to
14	state agencies. Those procedures don't apply to
15	cities that weren't considered in the Quintero
16	case. And therefore this case is distinguishable
17	from Quintero on that basis.
18	I haven't had any communications with
19	any of the Board Members or their Advisors other
20	than regarding noncontroversial procedural issues
21	since this matter started. And, in fact, we
22	retained the separation wall that we established
23	for the cease and desist order, even though that
24	wasn't required.
25	So, we've complied with the applicable
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requirements. I don't think that the appropriate 1 response would be a motion to dismiss. I think 2 that you should hear from you attorney. And if he 3 4 has any concerns about this objection, the 5 appropriate response would either be to continue 6 this case, or I guess to proceed without Mr. 7 Briggs and I, although I would object to that. I 8 don't think it's necessary, and I don't think it's fair to the prosecution staff. 9 10 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay, well, let me hear from Mr. Richards. 11 MR. RICHARDS: Well, we are, of course, 12 13 familiar with both the Quintero case and the 14 Morongo case. 15 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: By we you're referring to? 16 MR. RICHARDS: The Office of Chief 17 18 Counsel, which provides all of the attorneys for the regional boards, including myself and Ms. 19 20 Okun. And we have, in fact, reviewed these cases. 21 And it is our conclusion that this manner of 22 proceeding is an appropriate mechanism to deal with the problems associated with having --23 24 AUDIENCE SPEAKER: Higher, please. 25 AUDIENCE SPEAKER: Would you speak a

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1 little higher, please.

2	MR. RICHARDS: The protocols that the
3	Regional Board is using in this case are an
4	appropriate response to the need to separate
5	functions between the prosecution and the advisory
6	roles that the Board Staff sometimes has to deal
7	with in complex enforcement actions. And
8	therefore it is not appropriate to dismiss this
9	action at this time.
10	The separation that has been maintained
11	between the prosecution staff and the advisory
12	staff is sufficient to insure that the Board's
13	decision will not be tainted by the fact that some
14	of its staff has engaged on each side.
15	CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay. Mr. Onstot,
16	is it true that the Morongo case is a trial court
17	decision?
18	MR. ONSTOT: Yes, but
19	CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay, and that has
20	no precedence, does it, throughout the State of
21	California?
22	MR. ONSTOT: No, it does, it does, Mr.
23	Chairman.
24	CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Is it a Superior
25	Court case?

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MR. ONSTOT: It's a Superior Court case. 1 2 The Superior Courts are superior jurisdiction over all tribunals unless there's specific exceptions 3 4 carved out like for the Public Utilities 5 Commission. And even though I understand Mr. 6 Richards --7 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Wait, wait, excuse 8 Are you saying you can cite a trial court me. decision as precedence in a legal brief? 9 10 MR. ONSTOT: Sure. CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Go ahead. 11 MR. ONSTOT: And even though I 12 understand Mr. Richards' opinion, and I will give 13 14 the copy of this case, and I know we have 15 attorneys on the Board to read it, and I'll quote one line from it: "In the instant matter the 16 facts fall squarely within the Quintero's bright 17 18 line rule that an attorney may not simultaneously represent both a board and the litigants who 19 20 appear before it, even on difference matters." 21 That was the legal issue in Quintero. 22 That's the legal issue here. And I think that we could save ourselves a whole lot of time, 23 24 regardless of what the attorneys believe, because 25 the Court of Appeals decision in Quintero is

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definitely binding. And we would argue that the 1 trial court is definitely persuasive, and that is 2 why we're citing it. 3 4 The State Board lost in this case, and 5 of course, the State Board, Mr. Richards has to 6 defend the State Board's position here on the 7 record now because the case is on appeal. But 8 regardless of those arguments, the state is 0-and-2 on procedures such as these where you have 9 10 people wearing two hats. And, again, here's a copy of the case 11 for the press and any of the Board Members who'd 12 13 like it. 14 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay. Well, on advice of our Board Counsel, I will deny the 15 motion. But your objection is preserved for any 16 appeal that you may wish to bring. Thank you. 17 18 Okay, back to Mr. Thomas. How many speaker cards do we have? 19 MR. THOMAS: I have 37 cards from folks 20 21 who want to speak, and marked the card that they 22 want to speak, that they want to testify. I have 21 cards from folks where they marked that they 23 did not want to testify. I'm not sure if people 24 25 understand the difference between testifying and

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speaking. These are public speaker cards, even 1 though it says testify on here. This is the 2 public speaker time for this particular item. 3 4 And I'm not sure if some people marked 5 "I do not wish to testify" but they actually did 6 want to speak during public comment period. So, 7 we have to clarify that. 8 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay, do you have another group of cards? 9 10 MR. THOMAS: I have a group of cards from the designated parties. I have 27 cards from 11 the designated parties, but this is not the time 12 for the --13 14 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: For the designated 15 parties. MR. THOMAS: -- designated parties to 16 17 speak. 18 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Yeah, because their 19 items are on the agenda. 20 Okay, let's proceed then with the 37 21 that have indicated that they wanted to speak -the 21 --22 MR. THOMAS: Mr. Chairman, 37. 23 24 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Are there --BOARD MEMBER PRESS: Mr. Chairman. 25

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CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Yes. 1 2 BOARD MEMBER PRESS: Could you make it 3 clear if you are asking designated parties not to 4 speak during the interested public comment, 5 interested party public comment period? 6 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Well, that --7 BOARD MEMBER PRESS: Would you clarify? 8 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: If you're a designated party, like Mr. Moylan is, and his 9 wife, he's not going to be permitted to speak at 10 this initial phase. He has his own time slot 11 designated for him. 12 13 It's people that are interested parties; 14 these are the ones that have not received a 15 proposed cease and desist order, but want to address the Board on what's being presented today. 16 17 Those are the people that are going to speak at 18 this point in time. Now, we have 21 cards where people put 19 20 they did not want to testify. I'd like to maybe 21 figure out if those individuals didn't want to 22 speak to the Board at this time, and they got confused over testifying and speaking. 23 24 Sir, tell us who you are. 25 MR. KLEIGER: Yes, sir; my name's

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Lawrence Kleiger. And I do have a cease and 1 desist order. And my wife and I both, 2 inadvertently filled out a red card --3 4 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay. 5 MR. KLEIGER: -- and so --6 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay. Good. He has 7 a -- well let's take -- did you find his card? 8 Has anyone that has received a cease and desist order, have any of you filled out a speaker card, 9 10 thinking that you needed to? Okay. Why don't we just go down the line and 11 we can get your names and we can pull your cards 12 13 out. 14 MR. SHIPE: We were told to. 15 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay. (Audience speaking simultaneously.) 16 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Oh, those have 17 already been pulled out. Okay. All right, so 18 there is a group of 21 that put on their cards 19 20 they did not want to testify. Do you know who you 21 are? Okay. Do you mind --22 (Parties speaking simultaneously.) CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: What I want to do is 23 divide their time up now. So, if I know who's 24 going to speak, everyone's going to know what 25

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their time is. I don't want to chop it up for 1 2 them. So that's why I need to know who it is. Dr. Press? 3 4 BOARD MEMBER PRESS: What you say is 5 anyone who is not a designated party who filled 6 out a card and wants to speak, if you could 7 corroborate or correlate your number of cards --8 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: How about -- you know what I'm going to do --9 10 BOARD MEMBER PRESS: -- you could get a show of hands --11 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Where are the ones -12 13 - is this the whole stack? 14 MR. THOMAS: These are the folks that 15 want to speak, and --CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay, give me the 16 21. Okay. Took me awhile to figure this out, but 17 18 bear with me. 19 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Can we get a month continuance to figure this out --20 21 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Hang on. Thomas 22 Dempset (sic) are you here, sir? Mr. Dempset? 23 AUDIENCE SPEAKER: Just a quick point to 24 ask, I mean earlier you asked -- only because the 25 room was crowded, there were fire concerns, you

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asked all but the designated parties to leave. 1 So 2 they may be out of the room. MR. THOMAS: Yes, but our audio --3 4 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: The audio feed goes 5 in there. 6 (Audience speaking simultaneously.) CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: So if there's 7 8 anybody in the other room, in the overflow room 9 who is not a recipient of a cease and desist order 10 I would appreciate it if you would come into the hearing room at this point in time. Okay? 11 (Parties speaking simultaneously.) 12 13 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay, I'm going to 14 go through the cards I have so I can get this 15 clarified. Thomas Dempset, or Dempsey? Is he here? Okay. Oh, and Josephine Dempsey? Okay. 16 Mr. Braverman, I know you're here. Is he here? 17 18 He was. Betty Braverman. Okay. Charles Kostas. Mr. Kostas, are you here? Okay. Shirley Norman, 19 Ms. Norman, are you here? 20 21 Sandra Stilts or Saundra Stilts? Okay. 22 Did you wish to speak? AUDIENCE SPEAKER: No. 23 24 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: It's up to you. 25 MS. STILTS: No, I pass.

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CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: You pass, okay. 1 2 Hans Schwarz, Dr. Schwarz, are you here? Dr. Schwarz. Okay. Mark Connelly, Mr. Connelly, are 3 4 you here? Okay. Elaine Watson. Okay. Ms. 5 Watson, do you wish to speak? 6 MS. WATSON: I will speak. 7 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: You do? 8 MS. WATSON: I will, yes. CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay. All right, 9 Merrie Pastel? Ms. Pastel, are you here? Okay. 10 Rose Povero? 11 MS. POVERO: I pass. 12 13 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: You pass, okay. 14 Leonard --15 MR. AMBRUSO: Ambruso. CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Yes. 16 MR. AMBRUSO: I pass. 17 18 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: You pass, okay. Mark Robinson? Mr. Robinson, are you here? Okay. 19 Darlene Reynolds? Ms. Reynolds, are you here? 20 21 AUDIENCE SPEAKER: She left. 22 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: She left, okay. Barbara Akle or Akle? Yes, do you wish to speak? 23 24 MS. AKLE: Yes. 25 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: You do, okay. Carol

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1 Cribbs? Are you here, Ms. Cribbs?

2	MS. CRIBBS: Mr. Chairman, I'm one of
3	the 45 who has a CDO, and I'm just wondering if
4	earlier you had said something about how maybe
5	people need to come back after 4:00 because that's
6	when things
7	CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Yes.
8	MS. CRIBBS: are really going to get
9	started. So I'm just wondering, since a lot of
10	people have left, maybe they're under the
11	impression that they're not even going to have a
12	chance to speak until after 4:00.
13	CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay, well, that
14	MS. CRIBBS: I would just like to make
15	that noted for the record, please.
16	CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay. Well, those
17	comments were directed only to the recipients of
18	CDOs, not to interested persons. If they
19	misunderstood
20	MS. BRUTON: Point of order, Chairman.
21	I've found that
22	CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Excuse me,
23	MS. BRUTON: No. We were told after
24	3:00 would be public hearing by your staff. Now
25	you cannot bring all these people in here and then
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look at the trouble -- how are you going to make 1 2 decisions --3 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Excuse me, excuse 4 me, --5 MS. BRUTON: -- you can't even do this 6 part --7 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: -- excuse me, excuse 8 me --9 MS. BRUTON: -- of it. 10 (Laughter.) CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Excuse me. 11 MS. BRUTON: I mean do you know how 12 ridiculous --13 14 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Excuse me, I'm going to ask --15 MS. BRUTON: -- you look? 16 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay. Officer, 17 18 please. I want you out. (Audience speaking simultaneously.) 19 20 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: She has done this 21 before at other hearings. 22 MS. BRUTON: Excuse me, but you are hijacking the public due process. 23 24 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay, please remove 25 yourself from this room.

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MS. BRUTON: I have a right to speak to 1 2 that. CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Please remove 3 yourself from this room. If you submitted a 4 5 speaker card, that'll be your opportunity to 6 speak. Have you? 7 MS. BRUTON: Yes. 8 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay. Thank you. Carol Cribbs. Ms. Cribbs, are you here? Susan 9 10 McGinty. Are you here Ms. McGinty? Jay Harding. Mr. Harding, are you here? 11 AUDIENCE SPEAKER: Some of these folks 12 13 could be out in the area; you can't run all the 14 way --15 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay. Joan Anderson. Ms. Anderson, are you here? And 16 Sharlot Sunshine. Are you here, Ms. Sunshine? 17 18 Okay, well, I have a group of cards. You've heard who did not respond. We'll take them 19 up at the last moment, but now how many -- we have 20 41, so divide that into an hour and a half. What 21 is that? 22 23 And is Mr. Blakeslee here, Assemblyman 24 Blakeslee? Is that you? 25 AUDIENCE SPEAKER: No.

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CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Are you a recipient 1 of a cease and desist order? 2 AUDIENCE SPEAKER: No, I'm not. 3 4 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay. Why don't you 5 come up here. Oh, did you check off that you 6 wanted to speak? 7 AUDIENCE SPEAKER: Yes, I did. 8 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay, well, you're in the stack. It's those that put they did not 9 want to speak, okay, that we're trying to deal 10 with. 11 Okay, folks, those that are going to be 12 13 speaking, you're going to have two minutes to 14 address the Board. Is the Assemblyman here? 15 AUDIENCE SPEAKER: Yes, he is, he's going out the door. 16 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: He's going out the 17 18 door? AUDIENCE SPEAKER: No, he's our --19 20 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay. All right. 21 Okay, Supervisor Bianchi. Okay, Ms. Bianchi, like 22 everyone else you'll have two minutes for your 23 comments. 24 SUPERVISOR BIANCHI: My comments will be very brief. They're just simply that I'm here to 25 PETERS SHORTHAND REPORTING CORPORATION (916) 362-2345

answer any questions that the Board might have, 1 2 that's all. CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay. 3 4 AUDIENCE SPEAKER: Don't answer the 5 public. 6 (Audience speaking simultaneously.) 7 SUPERVISOR BIANCHI: And I commend you 8 on your patience. 9 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Well, they're testing me, I think, with this. 10 Folks, please keep it down. 11 All right, thank you. And thank you for 12 13 being here. 14 SUPERVISOR BIANCHI: I'm going to be 15 leaving shortly, so if there's any questions I'd just as soon have them now. I have an agenda to 16 17 read for next Tuesday. 18 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay. Well, let me ask the Board. Does the Board have any questions 19 20 of Supervisor Bianchi? 21 Okay, I guess not. SUPERVISOR BIANCHI: Okay, thank you. 22 23 Thank you very much. 24 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay. All right, 25 next speaker is Jack Pastel. I'll read four names

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off in a row so you can get ready. Jack Pastel; 1 Dustan Mattingly; Steven Paige; and Maria Kelly. 2 If I butchered those names, I apologize. And, Mr. 3 4 Racano, you're the fifth one. 5 MS. OKUN: Mr. Chair, Mr. Mattingly is a 6 designated party. CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay. All right. 7 8 MR. ONSTOT: Mr. Chair, I'm also informed that Assemblyman Blakeslee is on his way. 9 10 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay. Well, when he comes then we'll just insert him. 11 MS. SCHICKER: Fifteen to 20 minutes. 12 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: He'll be here in 15 13 14 to 20 minutes? 15 MS. SCHICKER: Yes. CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay. All right. 16 Jack Pastel, Steven Paige, Maria Kelly, Joey 17 18 Racano. Mr. Racano, there's two cards for you. Ι don't believe you're really trying to get in extra 19 20 time. There's a red and a white card. 21 All right, Mr. Pastel, Jack Pastel. 22 Okay. All right, Steven Paige. Yes. Then Maria 23 Kelly, then Joey Racano, then Joyce Albright. 24 MR. PAIGE: Excuse me, Mr. Young, how 25 much time do we get?

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CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Two minutes. Two
 minutes.

3 MR. PAIGE: Okay. I submitted a 4 voluntary plan to source sequester the solid 5 waste, the solid human waste on my property. And 6 I gave the plan to Harvey Packard over 34 days 7 ago.

8 And his initial response in his email 9 said that the plan was very viable; in so many 10 words he said that.

11 My plan reduces the total nitrogen 12 emission on an individual property by 58 percent. 13 It cuts shipping wastes by 90 percent, thus 14 cutting the air pollution by 90 percent. And it 15 also causes no water withdrawal from the aquifer 16 at all.

17 It is based on a Swedish system. I was 18 just wondering if you had an opportunity to review 19 it. I took the plan into the San Luis Obispo 20 Building Department and they kicked it upstairs to 21 your guys. And I've been waiting to hear back 22 from them on my plan.

It's also posted on your website, my
plan is posted on your website. I think it's a
viable alternative to hauling 9000 gallons of

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waste per year per household. You reduce that
 down to about 400 to 600 gallons. And you
 certainly cut the truck APCD issue by about 90
 percent, 80 or 90 percent.

5 I would like to have an opportunity to 6 hear back from your Board. I assume, at this 7 point I assume my plan is approved under CalCode 8 section 65943 because since the plan was kicked out of the building department and sent to you 9 10 I've not heard, over 30 days I've not heard from 11 your Board. And I assume that my plan, at this point, is approved because it's gone past that 30 12 13 days.

14 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: All right, time's 15 Thank you for your comments. The Board, up. itself, has not seen anything you have presented. 16 17 I'm looking in my interested party section of my 18 package. I don't see any written comments by you. MR. PAIGE: It's emailed and was posted 19 on your website. 20 21 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay, well, --

22 MR. PAIGE: No, this is posted in the --23 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay, anyway, the 24 proper thing is to submit it to the staff for 25 their analysis and review, and then

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1 recommendations.

MR. PAIGE: Yes, I did submit it on the 2 23rd. 3 4 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay. Well, I can't 5 tell you right now where that is in the process, 6 but you can take that up with staff afterward. 7 And maybe somehow that falls into the, you know, 8 recipe for what to do. 9 MR. PAIGE: Okay. 10 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay? MR. PAIGE: Yeah. 11 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Thank you for your 12 13 comments. 14 I did want to, and I'm addressing 15 something else right now, with Mr. Pastel, I did note he had some comments on the back of his card. 16 And I overlooked that, and I think he wants me to 17 18 read this, so I will do it on his behalf. 19 Thank you, Mr. Paige. 20 MR. PAIGE: Okay. 21 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: And then Maria Kelly 22 can come up while I read this. This is from, I believe, Jack Pastel: "I am a local resident for 23 24 11 years and have seen a positive change with our 25 new CSD Board. At last we have a CSD that is

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working toward a common goal to have a sewer plan 1 2 outside of town. Please allow them to get the job done within a reasonable timeframe. This current 3 4 action is slowing down the process. You can see 5 by the turnout today we want to move forward. 6 Thanks." Most likely it's his signature, Jack 7 Pastel. 8 Okay. Maria Kelly. MS. KELLY: I'm Maria Kelly. I have no 9 public comment at this time. I just wanted to put 10 in a comment. So I don't want to take your time. 11 I just wanted to let you know. 12 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay, all right. 13 14 Mr. Racano, followed by Joyce Albright, and then 15 Ann Calhoun. And then Keith Wimer, Wimer, I'm not sure. Mr. Shallcross. 16 BOARD MEMBER SHALLCROSS: Yeah, I think 17 there has been some confusion on this part of the 18 19 proceedings. Because the public forum, which is 20 different than what we're doing now, the public 21 forum is after 3:00, and is noticed after 3:00. 22 And that's for folks to speak on any item not on the agenda. So, you know, it's unfortunate if 23 24 folks didn't understand that. But these folks are 25 speaking on an item on the agenda, so they have to

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1 speak within the item.

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2	CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Yean.
3	BOARD MEMBER SHALLCROSS: And I think
4	that's where the confusion came.
5	CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay. All right,
6	Mr. Racano.
7	MR. RACANO: Honorable Board, staff,
8	friends, friends at home, Joey Racano, the Orange
9	County Ocean Outfall Group.
10	It is the position of the Ocean Outfall
11	Group that individual cease and desist orders by
12	this Board leveled at the good citizens of Los
13	Osos violates them of their constitutional right
14	to equal protection under the law. This because
15	you have selected individuals and not all
16	individuals.
17	Cease and desist orders were meant to be
18	leveled at organizations, agencies, industries,
19	but it seems that we've found a new way to attack
20	the citizenry.
21	It is not the fault of the citizens of
22	Los Osos that the former CSD Board, who was
23	recalled in disgrace, chose to attempt to spend
24	the community into submission, their own words,
25	and begin the project, spending millions, with

CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Yeah.

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only 27 days before a recall election that would
 ultimately recall them all.

It is my knowledge that the regional boards were created in the '70s from the state boards, who were in turn created in the '40s from the old rancher boards that made sure there was water for cattle.

8 So never has the regional board served 9 the needs of the people or clean water. 10 Historically, you have served the needs of 11 industry, and it is the Ocean Outfall Group's 12 position that you continue to do so. 13 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Time's up; thank you

14 for your comments.

15 MR. RACANO: I thank you for this 16 opportunity to address you, and I urge you to 17 recognize the attempts by the community to remedy 18 any water quality situations.

CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Joyce Albright; Ann
 Calhoun; Keith Wimer --

21AUDIENCE SPEAKER: Wimer.22CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Winer, okay, pardon23me.

24AUDIENCE SPEAKER: With an "m".25CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Wimer, okay. And

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1 then Jim Hensley.

CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay, Ms. Albright, 2 3 you have two minutes. 4 MS. ALBRIGHT: Yes. Fine. Can you hear 5 me? 6 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Yes. 7 MS. ALBRIGHT: Good morning, Honorable 8 Board; Joyce Albright, and I'm of Los Osos. When I was searching for property --9 10 AUDIENCE SPEAKERS: Can't hear. CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Would you speak up, 11 Ms. Albright. Howard, can you make sure --12 MS. ALBRIGHT: Shall I start over? 13 14 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Go ahead. 15 (Audience speaking simultaneously.) (Pause.) 16 17 MS. ALBRIGHT: That's much better. 18 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay, I'm starting right now. 19 20 MS. ALBRIGHT: Good morning, Honorable 21 Board; Joyce Albright of Los Osos. When I was 22 searching for property on the central coast in the mid '80s my sister warned me to stay away from Los 23 24 Osos because it had sewer problems. 25 But I fell in love with this beautiful

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community and chose it for retirement, which 1 2 translates to limited income. I, too, will be financially strapped, whether I'm paying for 3 4 regular pumping of my septic tank or for a sewer. 5 We had in construction an aesthetic, 6 state of the art, odorless, gravity system 7 designed to deal with salt water intrusion and to 8 refurbish our groundwater. It was to be surrounded by a lovely park besides, and it was 9 just down below me. 10 This project was stopped by the very 11 people who are fighting you today. Some of them 12 13 have been fighting against a sewer for over 20 14 years, same plan, different words. 15 While I do not want your enforcement measures to cause financial pressure on me or on 16 17 our citizens, this community must be made aware 18 that the time has come to stop dallying and build 19 the sewer now. 20 The situation has developed into an 21 enormous health issue. There is absolutely no 22 excuse to put the sewer off any longer. Twenty 23 years of dumping our sewage into our drinking 24 water is unacceptable. 25 Community support to dissolve the LOCSD PETERS SHORTHAND REPORTING CORPORATION (916) 362-2345

and a transfer of the sewer project, and all 1 2 services, back to the County is accelerating rapidly. Most of Los Osos realizes we must build 3 4 the damn sewer now. 5 You can get the facts at our new 6 website, dissolveLOC.org. Thank you, ladies and 7 gentlemen of the Regional Water Quality Control 8 Board for your continuing efforts to save our water and the Bay. 9 10 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay, thank you for 11 your comments. (Audience speaking simultaneously.) 12 13 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Excuse me, please 14 keep your comments to yourselves. 15 Ann Calhoun. MS. CALHOUN: Watch your toes, everyone. 16 Got some rush-hour traffic here. 17 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: So this is the 18 infamous Ann Calhoun? 19 20 MS. CALHOUN: Infamous, yes. Ann 21 Calhoun, Los Osos. 22 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay, so how are we going to end up in tomorrow's blog? 23 24 (Laughter.) 25 MS. CALHOUN: You know blogs are not

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submittable, or not relied upon by any persons of 1 2 serious mien and --CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: That's right, and --3 4 (Applause.) 5 MS. CALHOUN: Which I thought was funny 6 because it was sent out in the form of a press 7 release. 8 (Laughter.) CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay, Ms. Calhoun, 9 10 you have two minutes. MS. CALHOUN: Thank you. Edward R. 11 Murrow once accurately observed to be persuasive 12 we must be believable. To be believable we must 13 14 be credible. To be credible we must be truthful. 15 The recent April 27th Tribune editorial noted its dismay at the muddlement over the air 16 quality issues that suddenly showed up. And noted 17 18 the Regional Board's failure to gather all the facts which is guaranteed to further erode public 19 20 confidence in the Regional Water Board. 21 If this Board wants to restore public confidence I think it needs to call for a 22 continuance; get its scientific ducks in a row; 23 24 its legal and procedural ducks in a row. 25 I would then suggest that it work with

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the CSD to help create a septic management 1 district. Ironically, the proposed Board's 2 alternative plan that was going to require every 3 4 tank be pumped, inspected and certified, is 5 something that the community members have been 6 asking be done for years. And if I'm not mistaken 7 it's what the CSD is also proposing. 8 Above all I would hope this Board would move immediately to update an amend the basin 9 10 plan, and resolution 8312 and '13 to reflect present day realities, open the way for an 11 expandable wastewater treatment plan that prepares 12 13 for the new state septic tank regulations. 14 That action, I think, will go a long way 15 to restoring confidence that the Regional Board is interested in solving water quality problems and 16 you don't need community-wide CDOs to do it. 17 18 Thank you. CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Thank you for your 19 comments. Okay, next speaker is Mr. Wimer. 20 21 MR. WIMER: Yes. 22 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Thank you. And then 23 Jim Hensley, and then Lalelle Speegle. Lazelle 24 Speegle. 25 MR. SPEEGLE: I have a CDO.

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CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay. Are you Mr.
 Speegle?

MR. SPEEGLE: Yeah. 3 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay, so you have a 4 5 CDO, so we'll take that out. I'll give it to Mr. 6 Thomas. Okay, Mr. Wimer, you have two minutes. 7 8 MR. WIMER: Yes. Mr. Young, Regional Board, my name is Keith Wimer. I live in the 9 10 prohibition zone of Los Osos. I was uncommitted on the wastewater issue until your Board imposed 11 these measures. I am now committed to fighting 12 13 your action in any way I can.

14 I'm particularly offended and distressed 15 by a divide-and-conquer tactic, to single my neighbors and me out on the basis of an arbitrary 16 designation called the prohibition zone; to 17 18 threaten to take control of my property when you have no direct evidence of my breaking a law; 19 violate my rights and force me to become active. 20 I'm a citizen who values the 21

environment. I follow the laws. I respect the role of agencies such as yours to protect the environment and the public. I'm here to tell you that people like me believe your actions will have

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more negative consequences than positive. They will not move Los Osos any closer to a solution, and they are wrong.

Regardless of how I voted or anyone in
the last CSD election, the democratic process was
followed and the new CSD has a plan for a more
long-term and comprehensive solution than the last
one, which should make up for any delay.

9 Importantly, their solution, I believe, 10 has the greatest potential for healing the rift in 11 the community. Your actions will only inflict 12 deeper wounds, rob scarce water from the reserves, 13 drain money from our pockets that could go towards 14 treatment and cause us to waste time and energy in 15 court.

I know your Board can come up with more productive measures to resolve this issue. The measures will have to respect us as law-abiding citizens; they will have to impact everyone in the community equally; and they will have to produce the best solution for the environment and for all the people of Los Osos.

If you implement such measures you will affirm your roles as protectors of the environment and servants of the public. If not, you will fail

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the people of Los Osos and the central coast. 1 I ask you to stop these regressive 2 measures against the citizens of Los Osos. Thank 3 4 you. 5 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay, thank you for 6 you comments. 7 (Applause.) 8 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Mr. Hensley and then Lacy Cooper and then Bo Cooper. 9 10 MR. HENSLEY: Honorable Board, Members of the Board, thanks for letting me --11 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Can you speak up a 12 little louder, sir, into the microphone. 13 14 MR. HENSLEY: Thanks for allowing me to 15 speak here. I'm an old hand at Los Osos; I'm probably like older than dirt here. I've been 16 paying for a sewer cleanout for 30 years. Now, 17 18 that's taken out of my taxes every year, every 19 year. 20 The only way you're going to get this 21 sewer done is you to do your job, which you've 22 been doing so far. You got to do something or 23 these people are not going to do it. 24 Twenty years ago one of our members 25 hired a lawyer in Los Angeles that told him that

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they could keep this thing going and never get a sewer here for years and years and years.

This group that's in there right now has 3 4 no plan, but they promised a plan, and they were 5 on their feet running when they got elected to the 6 new Board. All they've done is lose money for us, 7 completely. They lost the big grant from federal 8 government, \$35 million. They also turned down the state's revolving fund, too. Right now 9 10 they're working on a shoestring.

But when all of that's gone, no more money, those lawyers are going to go bye, bye, bye, bye. And we're going to be stuck with all those bills that are there, anyway. And the County is going to probably have to put the sewer in for us.

17 I thank you. 18 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay, thank you. 19 (Applause.) 20 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay, yeah, folks, 21 I've asked you numerous times to please refrain 22 from clapping. Lacey Cooper, Bo Cooper, Mrs. R. Stern 23 24 and then Diane Burke. 25 MS. COOPER: Can I speak now because I -

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2 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Yeah, go ahead, Ms. 3 Cooper.

MS. COOPER: Today I'm celebrating my
27th wedding anniversary. And as you can imagine,
I'm overjoyed to be here. Just thrilled.

(Laughter.)

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8 MS. COOPER: At least I'm here with my 9 partner in crime, my husband, Bo, who will speak 10 behind me. During the hearing Los Osos citizens 11 will easily prove that the CDOs are unjust, 12 unnecessary and totally uncalled for.

So why are we really here. We are here 13 14 today to be tried and convicted for the serious crime of votus wrongus. In the eyes of the 15 Regional Board Staff, we, the majority of Los Osos 16 residents, voted the wrong way in our last CSD 17 18 election. We had the nerve to want an affordable, sustainable sewer plant away from our downtown and 19 20 we voted for it.

21 We did not let the pre- and post-22 election threats of the Regional Board Staff 23 intimidate us. We are not letting the promise of 24 CDOs deter us.

25 Even the perception that a state agency PETERS SHORTHAND REPORTING CORPORATION (916) 362-2345

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is using its power and authority to coerce or intimidate voters before or after an election has a profoundly negative effect on the democratic process.

5 Your Board's current punitive actions 6 are directly fanning the flames of ignorance and 7 fear, which threatens to dissolve our local 8 government, which you've heard from previous 9 speakers.

10 My sincere hope is that you will cease 11 and desist this campaign of individual 12 intimidation and punishment. Instead of coercion 13 we ask that you work with the LOCSD to establish a 14 truly viable wastewater solution.

In addition, if you drop all the CDOs
that would make a great wedding anniversary
present for my husband and myself. Thank you.

18 (Laughter.)

MS. COOPER: I also had a quick procedural question, if I could, just about the CDOS. I don't understand how people are going to defend themselves, because you said in a frequently asked question that even if they get their nitrate levels down they're still discharging into the total basin, so it doesn't

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1 matter if individuals aren't polluting.

2 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay, those 3 individuals will take that up during their 4 presentations. They can ask that --5 MS. COOPER: Okay, hope so. 6 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: -- at that point in 7 time. 8 MS. COOPER: Thank you. CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Thank you for you 9 comments. Okay, and Ms. Cooper's partner in 10 11 crime, Mr. Cooper. MR. COOPER: Bo Cooper, married to that 12 13 wonderful woman, Lacey Cooper, for 27 years. I 14 want to speak about the ACL lawyers. And the ACL 15 lawyers said that the voters are the CSD, and the voters are the decisionmakers for the CSD, and 16 17 therefore the implication being that the individuals are responsible for the actions of the 18 19 CSD, whether the individuals agreed with the 20 decisions of the CSD Board or not. 21 My question is who else thinks that 22 individuals should be responsible for the 23 representative government. And my answer is Osama 24 Bin Laden. Osama Bin Laden said in January of 25 '99, he said, quote, "Muslim scholars have issued

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a religious directive against any American who 1 2 pays taxes to his government. He is our target because he is helping the American war machine 3 4 against the Muslim nation." 5 Picking out individuals for the 6 decisions of the group, the whole body politic, I 7 think is very unjust. I'm not calling your guys 8 terrorists, not calling you guys terrorists, but I

9 think you are terrorizing the individuals in Los10 Osos. It concerns me deeply.

What also concerns me deeply is the process that's going on here. I guess I'm feeling a little terrorized by the procedures that are going on, by what appears to me to be a kangaroo court, by the appearance of being railroaded through. I'm very concerned about what's going on.

18 I've played the part of the Great Bodini before. I must say the Great Bodini predicts that 19 20 CSDs will come down for all the people because I 21 think you guys are not really listening, not 22 really making a new decision, and have predetermined what's going on. Thank you. 23 24 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Thank you for your comments. Mrs. Stern, Mrs. R. Stern. Did I get 25

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1 the name right?

2 MR. THOMAS: Stern. CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Yeah, Mrs. R. Stern. 3 4 Okay. Diane Burke, followed by David Duggan and 5 then Gewynn Taylor. Okay. Hang on, let me 6 restart this. Okay, go ahead. 7 MS. BURKE: Diane Burke, the prohibition 8 zone. I completely object to any CDO against any household within Los Osos. It's never been proven 9 that septics are, in fact, the source of nitrate 10 pollution. However, we have other water problems 11 and they need to be addressed. 12

This current mandate by your Board will do nothing to improve our water quality or supply. And will, in fact, further deplete our aquifer resulting in more denigration of our water and supply.

As evidenced by the latest news from the Air Quality Control Board any such forced mandate will pollute the air we breathe, clean air and water, life sustaining substances, without which nothing can survive.

This mandate smacks of rogue
dictatorship, manipulation and extortion of only
one-third of our community without considering

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long-term adverse effects to either air, water or individual rights.

Under the constitution each individual 3 4 has the right to peacefully enjoy their home 5 without interference. We have but one water basin 6 serving all who draw from it. Your agency drew a 7 line in the sand making only 4700 homeowners 8 financially and morally responsible. Thus 9 promoting new construction outside this boundary 10 just when our water supply is at peril. New development must be reined in with the 11 introduction of water conservation and smaller 12 13 homes for the whole community of Los Osos. 14 Our duly elected CSD Board has answers 15 for all these problems. Your agency should support their endeavors to move ahead 16 17 expeditiously. 18 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay, can you wrap 19 it up, please, Ms. Burke? 20 MS. BURKE: Yes. This will be to 21 everyone's ultimate benefit. Thanks. 22 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay, thank you for 23 your comments. Gewynn Taylor, followed by 24 Assemblyman Blakeslee. And then George Taylor. MS. TAYLOR: Excuse me, you called Mr. 25

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1 Duggan before you called me, sir.

CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Yeah, you're right. 2 I just moved his card off. Thank you. Yeah, Mr. 3 4 Duggan. 5 MR. DUGGAN: I have a question before I 6 start. 7 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Yeah. 8 MR. DUGGAN: Is my interested party statement included in your documents? 9 10 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Oh, yeah, I have vivid memories late at night going through --11 AUDIENCE SPEAKER: Great. 12 13 (Audience speaking simultaneously.) 14 MS. OKUN: There is some additional 15 comment that was received yesterday, as well. MR. DUGGAN: Is that included in the 16 17 record? 18 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Yes, yours was the extensive CEQA challenge and comments --19 20 MR. DUGGAN: Yes, it is. 21 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: -- that I read. 22 MR. DUGGAN: I just wanted to make sure that I was allowed to have that entered into the 23 24 record. 25 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Of course, yeah,

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1 it's 18 pages; it's in our packets.

2 MR. DUGGAN: Not only just the first statement, but my rebuttal to their rebuttal? 3 4 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: No, you have two 5 minutes, sir. Your time's --6 MS. OKUN: Excuse me, he submitted two 7 comments. One was within the comment period and 8 that's in the printed comments. But he also submitted comments yesterday by email that were 9 10 late. CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Yeah, those are not 11 allowed in. Yeah, they're late. But, you have 12 13 two minutes now to address this. I'll restart the 14 clock. 15 MR. DUGGAN: David Duggan, Los Osos. As the prosecution has chosen to rebut my statement 16 and didn't choose to associate my statement with 17 18 that of the LOCSD, who is a designated party, and 19 as the prosecution deemed to characterize my 20 statement, after extensive research, as having no 21 merit, it is apparent that the prosecution has 22 given my statement great weight. 23 As the prosecution has dedicated 24 resources to counter and rebut my statement it is 25 evident that my statement goes beyond interested

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party status on its own merits. And I petition the Board to allow my counter-rebuttal of the prosecution's rebuttal be placed on the record.

I also point out that the prosecution has, on more than one occasion, changed the conditions of the CDOs, and at an even more recent date, April 24th, has changed the conditions of the CDOs again. These actions alone should allow for new evidence and statements to be entered into the record.

It is also apparent that the recent 11 change of the conditions of the CDOs is due to the 12 concerns of the Air Pollution Control District 13 14 concerning the pumping requirement and the 15 possibility of air pollution due to the use of added machinery, as in this case, a fleet of 16 diesel trucks, and a reasonable possibility of a 17 18 significant effect on the environment.

19 This is only one of the conditions
20 required to deny the exemption from CEQA, and it
21 has been met; it clearly has been met.

22 Since the staff has indicated that they 23 may revisit the pumping requirement, I would 24 enjoin this Board to delay this hearing until this 25 matter can fully be explored through a hearing of

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the Air Pollution Control District.

2 As the process of these hearings are in 3 doubt, as well as the reasons for bringing these actions, I would encourage this Board to rethink 4 5 its approach to work with all concerned agencies 6 you find appropriate and long-term solutions to 7 what has become to be known as the Los Osos Sewer 8 issue. Thank you. 9 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Thank you. Ms. 10 Taylor, you're next, and then Assemblyman Blakeslee. 11 MS. TAYLOR: Good afternoon; my name is 12 13 Gewynn Taylor; I'm a resident of Los Osos in the 14 prohibition area. 15 Mr. Wimer eloquently expressed many positions that I take, as well as my husband. 16 Having been in Los Osos for over 34 years, and 17 18 having been active with three former executives of the Water Quality Control Board, I truly object to 19 20 being assumed guilty of polluting the aquifer by 21 using our septic tanks. 22 CDOs are meant for major polluters, not for individual residents with properly working 23 24 septic systems. I have never been challenged that 25 my septic system pollutes the groundwater. We

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1 have our septic system pumped on a basic

2 timeframe.

We are only residents for part time. If anyone would like to come out and prove that we are polluting the water, please make arrangements at your expense to prove that we are polluting the groundwater.

8 Thank you.

9 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay, --

10 (Applause.)

11 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Assemblyman

12 Blakeslee.

ASSEMBLYMAN BLAKESLEE: Chair, Members, thank you for the opportunity to come before you today. I apologize that I wasn't here when you initially called. I was pulled away to another meeting, and returned as quickly as I could.

18 In the course of working on this 19 challenging project and problem I've had the good 20 fortune of working with many members of the 21 community who have demonstrated to me, I think, 22 quite unequivocally they do seek a clean water 23 solution as quickly as possible.

24I'm fully respective of the fact that25different elected boards and appointed entities

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that have responsibilities under the law are duly operating in that context, and doing their best to find a resolution of this complicated issue.

4 But I, in my analysis of the problem, 5 come to the conclusion there may be no such ready 6 quick resolution. And therefore I'm seeking to 7 work with all the entities to see if, in fact, it 8 might be possible to find a legislative remedy which would allow us, through statute, to resolve 9 the many legal, financial, and frankly, technical 10 problems which we're now faced with here today. 11

I cannot at this time tell you we have found such a solution. But I can tell you we're working in good faith with all parties to solicit their input and see if such a solution can be devised through legislation.

And so I would as, as you deliberate 17 today, with the various options you have with 18 enforcement orders, to consider including in any 19 20 final determination and deliberation a provision 21 which would allow for a rapid sunsetting of 22 enforcement actions by this Board and by this body, in the event a legislative solution can be 23 24 found.

25 I believe that such a representation by PETERS SHORTHAND REPORTING CORPORATION (916) 362-2345

this Board would be very helpful to discussions 1 that are occurring currently. And I certainly 2 would never urge you to do anything inconsistent 3 4 with your responsibilities under law. But to the 5 degree that a solution can be found that's 6 consistent with law, having your assurance and 7 your statements here today that you would work to 8 find a quick and speedy expedited way to pull back those enforcement actions, I think, would be 9 10 helpful. And I request that. And I thank you for 11 the opportunity to address you. 12 13 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay, thank you for 14 your comments. 15 (Applause.) CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Dr. Press. 16 BOARD MEMBER PRESS: Assemblyman, could 17 18 you -- we have a few questions for you. BOARD MEMBER PRESS: Would you mind? 19 20 Yes, I appreciate your comment very much. 21 I just wondered if you could -- if you 22 might suggest, what, in your view, is the -- do 23 you have any thoughts about what a most rapid or 24 expeditious way of getting to water quality 25 improvements would be.

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ASSEMBLYMAN BLAKESLEE: Well, 1 2 personally, I do believe there is a significant clean water issue that probably needs to be 3 4 addressed through a wastewater treatment system. 5 We need to find solutions which take 6 down lawsuits that otherwise would impede our 7 building to move forward. We need to find 8 solutions that clear up questions about future liability. We need to make sure that to the 9 10 degree we can take actions to restart the SRF 11 loan, those actions can be taken. And there have to be some deliberations, 12 13 obviously, about the ultimate technology solution. 14 And although I have strong feelings about each of 15 those elements, in the course of being respectful for those with whom I'm dialogue-ing and 16 soliciting input from, I want to be sure that I 17 18 don't prematurely talk about the particulars of a 19 solution until we are at a place where I think all 20 parties would be ready to shake hands and work 21 together and say, yeah, we can go ahead and accept 22 this, even though it may only be half a loaf or 60 percent of a loaf. 23 Because I think ultimately if there is 24

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to be a solution no one will be fully happy with

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the outcome. I'm sorry to report there is no 1 2 solution which will make everyone happy. But I do believe there's a solution we 3 4 could find which can expedite us building of a 5 project, which can restart moneys, which can 6 reduce liability. And most importantly, comport 7 with the laws of the state to insure a clean water 8 outcome as quickly as possible, which is very 9 important to me and I know it's important to you. 10 BOARD MEMBER HAYASHI: I have a 11 question. CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Yes. 12 13 BOARD MEMBER HAYASHI: Good morning. 14 ASSEMBLYMAN BLAKESLEE: Mr. Hayashi, 15 good to see you, John. BOARD MEMBER HAYASHI: You say 16 expeditiously. What kind of a timeframe are you 17 18 thinking about? (Laughter - audience speaking 19 20 simultaneously.) 21 ASSEMBLYMAN BLAKESLEE: I don't think we 22 can afford to wait years. I think we need to find a solution which could have a potential restart on 23 24 some of the critical elements in months, not 25 years.

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BOARD MEMBER HAYASHI: Okay, thank you. 1 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: And by critical 2 elements, what do you mean by that? 3 4 (Audience Laughter.) 5 ASSEMBLYMAN BLAKESLEE: You guys aren't 6 going to make this easy on me, are you? CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Well, --7 8 ASSEMBLYMAN BLAKESLEE: Mr. Young, again, my challenge is to be forthcoming with you, 9 to ask and share with you how you can be helpful 10 in terms of having a speedy sunsetting of 11 enforcement actions if we can find such a 12 13 solution. 14 I want to also be very respectful of all 15 the parties with whom we're having these conversations to not inadvertently talk about 16 elements which could reduce the likelihood we'd 17 18 find ultimate a compromise. So, if you will forgive that rather -- I 19 sound like a politician --20 21 (Laughter.) 22 ASSEMBLYMAN BLAKESLEE: If you'll forgive the --23 24 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: I'm glad you said 25 it.

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ASSEMBLYMAN BLAKESLEE: If you'll 1 forgive the imprecision of my answer, it's not 2 unwillingness to respond, but it's out of a 3 4 sincere desire to see an answer come forward 5 through legislation. 6 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Well, we appreciate 7 your involvement, and hope that it, you know, gets 8 all of us to where we want to be in the end, which is a solution and clean water. 9 10 So, thank you for your comments. ASSEMBLYMAN BLAKESLEE: Thank you, 11 Board, thank you, Chair. 12 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay. Let's see. 13 14 (Applause.) 15 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Did I call anyone else at this time? 16 MR. TAYLOR: Yes, George Taylor. 17 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Yeah, okay. Mr. 18 Taylor, you're the last speaker and I think, 19 20 Board, should we then break for lunch? 21 BOARD MEMBER: Yes. CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Because I've got 22 about another 40 minutes worth of interested 23 24 parties. Okay, Mr. Taylor, you're the last 25 speaker for now, and then we're going to break for

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lunch. And I'll announce when we're going to return. Go ahead.

MR. TAYLOR: George Taylor, a Los Osos 3 4 resident in the prohibition zone. And a 5 interested party participant.

6 I'm here to protect our right to due 7 process. I did not feel that if I didn't speak 8 that I would be represented in any further action, and I want to be. 9

10 We understand that the Water Quality Control Board tasked Mr. Briggs with bringing in 11 the individual CDO actions. No emergency existed 12 13 to force the Regional Water Quality Control Board 14 to act at the hearing. And even if there were, 15 the Regional Water Quality Control Board failed to follow their own requirements for emergency 16 situations. 17

18 Clearly, this represents a lack of due process. Having Mr. Briggs and prosecution team 19 20 members hearing the CDOs is like having a fox hear 21 the pleadings of the hens within the henhouse. 22 (Laughter.)

MR. TAYLOR: Thomas Jefferson wrote that 23 24 we should never have appointed individuals that have decisionmaking capacity. All commissions 25

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should be filled with elected-by-the-people 1 individuals. Thank you. 2 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay, thank you. 3 4 (Audience speaking simultaneously.) 5 (Applause.) 6 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: All right, we're 7 going to break for lunch. And let's see, we're 8 going close by, we're walking. Can we get back 9 here in 45 minutes, is that possible or is that just -- okay, an hour then, right? An hour. 10 So we will resume in one hour from now. 11 And we'll continue. And I'll tell you who is 12 next. Michael Jones, Alon Perlman, Pat Renshaw, 13 14 Lawson Schaller. Those are the ones that are up 15 next. Thank you. 16 (Whereupon, at 1:38 p.m., the meeting 17 18 was adjourned, to reconvene at 2:38 p.m., at this same location.) 19 --000--20 21 22 23 24 25

AFTERNOON SESSION 1 2 2:43 p.m. CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: You're with the Air 3 4 Pollution Control District? 5 MR. ALLEN: Yes, I am. CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay. And you need 6 7 to leave by 3:30, or you have a 3:30 appointment? 8 MR. ALLEN: I have a 3:30 appointment, but I'm only about five minutes away, so --9 10 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay. MR. ALLEN: -- 3:20, if I could get out 11 of here by 3:20 that would be fine. 12 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay. Well, have 13 14 you been called as a witness, do you know, by 15 anybody? MR. ALLEN: No, I have not. I just 16 17 wanted to --18 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Mr. Onstot, do you know if he's been called by a witness? 19 20 MR. ONSTOT: I'm sorry, Mr. Chair, who is he? 21 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: This is the 22 gentleman from the Air Pollution Control District. 23 MR. ONSTOT: He's not on our list. 24 25 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay.

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MR. ONSTOT: Name? 1 MR. ALLEN: Larry Allen. 2 MR. ONSTOT: He's not on our list. 3 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay. And no one 4 5 has asked you to testify? 6 MR. ALLEN: No. I was asked to be 7 present for questions, but --8 MR. BRIGGS: I asked if someone could be 9 present. 10 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay. MR. ALLEN: I did have some comments 11 that I would like to make if you didn't have 12 13 questions of me. 14 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay, well, might as 15 well do it now, as opposed to waiting till the end if he needs to leave. 16 Dr. Press, this is Mr. Allen of the 17 18 APCD. Why don't you give us your comments, okay? And then if the Board has questions of you, then 19 20 we'll proceed. 21 MR. ALLEN: Thank you. My name is Larry Allen; I'm with the Air Pollution Control 22 District; I'm the Air Pollution Control Officer. 23 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay. Could you 24 speak up into the microphone so everybody in the 25 PETERS SHORTHAND REPORTING CORPORATION (916) 362-2345
1 back of the room could hear you.

2	MR. ALLEN: Yes. Larry Allen with the
3	Air Pollution Control District; I'm the Air
4	Pollution Control Officer for the District.
5	I'm here today to ask your Board to
6	conduct an air quality risk assessment before you
7	move forward with the full order on all residences
8	out in Los Osos that would require pumping of all
9	of the houses out there six times per year.
10	And I gave a phone call to Roger Briggs
11	and talked to Harvey Packard, also, a couple of
12	weeks ago. And I'd like to say that your staff
13	has been very cooperative and responsive to our
14	concerns. They've been very good to work with.
15	If you could put the slide forward. Our
16	recommendations are that you would assess the full
17	air quality impacts from the septic pump-out
18	project to determine potential impacts to the
19	community.
20	That you would also look at what
21	strategies might be needed to reduce any nuisance
22	potential that would result from those actions.
23	And that you would define and also
24	implement any mitigation measures that would be
25	necessary to reduce those emissions and community
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exposure to diesel particulate to something that's less than significant.

And push that forward again. Our assessment we would ask for would be to look at the emissions from the daily pump-outs. Right now the preliminary calculations we have are that there would be about 82 per day.

8 We'd like to see emissions from the 9 truck trips, any other equipment that's associated 10 with that, and that you would compare those to 11 what our significance thresholds are for the 12 different criteria pollutants.

But more importantly, we believe that a health risk assessment is needed to look at acute, chronic and potential carcinogenic risk impacts to both the community, to the San Luis Obispo community that is going to be adjacent to the San Luis Sewage Treatment Plant where all the effluent would be dumped on a daily basis.

20And also to sensitive receptors like21daycare, schools and playgrounds.

And just as a bit of background on that, next slide. The diesel particulate matter is identified as a toxic air contaminant with no threshold of significance. And that was done by

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the California Air Resources Board back in 1999.

2 It's the number one source of health risk from air pollution in the State of 3 4 California, actually in the United States. It's 5 responsible for about 70 percent of all health 6 risks from air pollution in California. And all 7 local air regulatory agencies have put significant 8 efforts into working on diesel risk reduction plans. 9

And some of the statewide toxic control measures that are applicable to this project are that you would need to limit uncontrolled diesel engines that, you know, greater than 50 horsepower, to 20 hours per year or less of operation, in that they can't operate within 500 feet of a school facility during school hours.

17 In San Luis Obispo County we are 18 nonattainment for the PM10 standard. We have 19 adopted a PM plan in 2005. And so we are 20 concerned about particulate emissions that would 21 affect our ability to attain and maintain those 22 standards.

This slide shows you the potential health risk from engines that are similar to the ones that would be used in these trucks. And on

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the left side you see risk per million; and on the right side you see distance. And those numbers are in meters on the bottom.

But our significance threshold statewide are one in a million, which is that second line up from the bottom. And so within about a 500-foot range of those engines, this is for operating at 50 hours per year, you're going to exceed that risk.

10 And if you look at the next slide at the 11 proposed rate, just a preliminary impact analysis 12 that we saw, was that there would potentially be 13 two pump-out trucks operating within a two-block 14 period with any given point in time.

15 So this is kind of a random section of 16 Baywood Park right there, with two trucks. And 17 you can see that it's a pretty large radius, 18 that's the 500-foot radius for each one of those.

So the potential for risk with this is fairly high. But there are mitigations that can be put in place that I believe that would reduce that risk significantly.

The largest one is to install diesel emission control devices on all the diesel equipment. It's going to add to the cost. They

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can be expensive. But they're very effective.

Also, using newer diesel equipment beyond 1996, they also have much lower emissions, maintaining them in proper tune, using low-sulfur diesel, making sure that you limit the activity for pumping when you're near sensitive receptors like schools and daycare centers. Limit unnecessary idling.

9 From the nuisance side, installing 10 carbon filters on the vacuum trucks to reduce the 11 odors would be important. And then to, you know, 12 monitor and have a complaint response plan, 13 because that would likely fall to us. When you 14 start getting complaints on odors, they come our 15 way.

16 So, we would ask that you would conduct 17 a thorough assessment of the potential air quality 18 impacts from the pump-out. And that would include 19 a health risk assessment of the impacted 20 communities and look at what the potential cancer 21 risk would be.

And when you determine that, if it is significant, beyond our one-in-a-million threshold, that you would work with us to define mitigation strategies that would reduce that to a

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level of acceptability, which I believe can be
 done.

3 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay. Are these all 4 diesel engines that are going to be used? I mean, 5 do you know that?

6 MR. ALLEN: Yes. Typically those septic 7 trucks are -- they need the power. Diesel is what 8 provides the power, so our understanding is that 9 all of the equipment out there would be diesel 10 trucks.

CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay. Dr. Press. 11 BOARD MEMBER PRESS: I assume that when 12 13 you say San Luis Obispo County is nonattainment 14 for PM10, you include probably have a breakdown of 15 different parts of the County? Or is that considered your planning unit, and so you just --16 MR. ALLEN: It's a regional designation. 17 BOARD MEMBER PRESS: Right, so you don't 18 break it down by MAS, or smaller MSAs or anything 19 20 like that? 21 MR. ALLEN: No.

22 BOARD MEMBER PRESS: Okay. I assume 23 that a lot of this mitigation measures you're 24 already trying to implement, right? 25 MR. ALLEN: We are, and in fact there

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will be -- there are air toxic control measures by 1 2 the state that, for instance there's private fleet measure coming out. But that's going to take 3 4 awhile to be implemented. That starts out with 5 the newer vehicles, so it's not going to be 6 effective on any existing equipment that's out 7 there. 8 BOARD MEMBER PRESS: Yeah, I guess my question is, but you're already trying to get to 9 attainment, so --10 MR. ALLEN: Correct. 11 BOARD MEMBER PRESS: -- the Air District 12 13 is already out of attainment, and you're worried 14 about going further out of attainment? 15 MR. ALLEN: That's correct. BOARD MEMBER PRESS: So, I guess what 16 17 I'm trying to get at is you have a nonattainment 18 status; you're trying to get into attainment. But 19 you also have the potential for economic growth that is going to, whether it's construction or 20 21 some other -- hauling, for example, any time 22 there's a bump in the economy, you're going to get more diesel traffic. 23 24 And so, essentially this, some kind of frequent pumping would, in essence, be similar to 25

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what would happen with a lot of economic activity, 1 2 because you get more diesel activity, right? So how do you -- how are you planning on 3 4 different scenarios of diesel truck activity. 5 This is just one among what might be several. 6 MR. ALLEN: Right. We don't -- well, 7 first of all, let me state that it's actually the 8 health risk from the toxic component of the diesel that we are most concerned with. Even though 9 particulate matter we are nonattainment throughout 10 the state, -- well, nonattainment here in this 11 County. 12 13 And we have a plan that was adopted by 14 our Board in July that has a series of control 15 measures in it that will help move us towards attainment. 16 However, we do not have authority over 17 18 mobile sources. And so we don't have direct 19 authority to require control equipment on these vehicles right now. And it's not in our plan. 20 21 That's a statewide authority that is not delegated 22 to us. We have only authority over stationary

23 sources.

Through CEQA we can require or recommend that controls be put on for any project. And then

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that can be added as a mitigation for the project. But we don't have direct authority to require it.

BOARD MEMBER PRESS: But does that, by the same token, mean that the regional boards don't have the authority to require mitigation measures for diesel, either?

7 MR. ALLEN: Well, actually I believe 8 that you do have the authority, because you're 9 requiring the project to move forward. And if 10 you're requiring that, you can condition the 11 project however you see fit. It happens all the 12 time, you know, when we're dealing with urban 13 development.

14 So, I believe that that could be a 15 condition in your contract with whoever's doing 16 the pumping, that they would have to have control 17 devices.

18 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Well, we're not 19 entering any contracts --

(Laughter.)

21 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: -- with anybody. The 22 staff has made a recommendation of a possible 23 alternative, which they have withdrawn now because 24 of your agency's concern. But the Board doesn't 25 enter into contracts with contractors to do work

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1 like this.

2	MR. ALLEN: Well, it seems like some
3	analysis is going to be necessary to figure out
4	how to apply those mitigations if there is deemed
5	to be a significant health risk. And I'm not sure
6	what your mechanism would be then, if you're not -
7	- if that's the way that it's working.
8	But,
9	BOARD MEMBER PRESS: I was not aware
10	that we had a cross-medium kind of authority. Mr.
11	Richards? Do we have any cross-medium do we
12	have that kind of authority? I wouldn't think so.
13	MR. RICHARDS: Not exactly, but this
14	gets a little this is a complicated area of
15	CEQA because what an agency is required to do,
16	especially a responsible agency that does not have
17	complete authority over all aspects of a project,
18	is to identify mitigation measures and identify
19	the agencies or authorities that do have the power
20	to impose those mitigation measures.
21	The Regional Board can only impose those
22	mitigation measures which are within its
23	authority. But would have to identify other
24	measures and the entities that would have the
25	power to impose those measures.

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MR. ALLEN: Sounds like a complicated 1 2 situation. CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay, any other --3 4 Mr. Jeffries. 5 BOARD MEMBER JEFFRIES: Yeah, thank you, 6 Mr. Chair. I just have one question. Do you have 7 an air quality monitoring station in the Los Osos 8 area? 9 MR. ALLEN: We have one in Morro Bay right across the Bay. 10 BOARD MEMBER JEFFRIES: Right across the 11 Bay. So the graph that you showed us is 12 13 collectively from the whole County? Or you whole 14 air quality District? 15 MR. ALLEN: That was a graph developed by the Air Resources Board. It's independent of 16 location. It's just showing for a given level of 17 18 emissions at a specific meteorological regime what the potential concentration and impact of those 19 20 emissions would be. So that chart is applicable 21 to anywhere. 22 BOARD MEMBER JEFFRIES: But you did not bring a graph of any station that's near the 23 24 vicinity of Los Osos? 25 MR. ALLEN: No, I did not, because this

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is -- I'm trying to distinguish between health risk assessment and just merely looking at a concentration of a particulate matter on a filter, which is how we measure it.

5 And so when you do that you get one 6 value, say 45 mcg/cubic meter. That does not tell 7 you what the health risk is. You then take that 8 concentration, put it into a computer model, and model the concentrate versus the population and 9 10 look at what the potential and what the risk 11 factors are for that specific pollutant. And it pops out a number that says here's what the health 12 13 risk is for any given part of the population. 14 BOARD MEMBER JEFFRIES: Thank you. 15 BOARD MEMBER PRESS: Can you think of any other project in the County that would have an 16 equivalent level of, whether it's benzene -- I 17 18 don't know what the toxic constituent is that you're concerned --19 20 MR. ALLEN: Diesel particulate matter. 21 BOARD MEMBER PRESS: That's the toxic 22 that's, as opposed to PM10? MR. ALLEN: Yes. 23 24 BOARD MEMBER PRESS: All right, so is

25 there any other project you can think of in the

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whole APCD, San Luis Obispo APCD, jurisdiction that would have an equivalent to this? Or is this the largest you've seen?

MR. ALLEN: No, I wouldn't say it's the largest we've seen. I would say the largest we've seen was the Avila Beach remediation, which was huge. And we had -- we required diesel particulate filters on most of the equipment that was operating out there to try and reduce the risk to the local population.

And we see construction projects a lot; you see a large construction project like, for instance, the proposed Delidio (phonetic) project. They're going to have, if that goes through, a lot of diesel equipment out there operating simultaneously at the same time. And there's a potential risk from that.

18 BOARD MEMBER PRESS: And you will order 19 filters on those?

20 MR. ALLEN: Yes. And we do that through 21 CEQA all the time on all kinds of projects. 22 BOARD MEMBER PRESS: Okay, thank you. 23 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay, any other 24 Board questions? No. Okay, thank you. 25 MR. ALLEN: I appreciate the opportunity

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1 to speak, --

2 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Sure. MR. ALLEN: -- and look forward to 3 4 working with your staff. 5 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay, thank you very 6 much for your time. 7 MR. PAYNE: I have a question for him. 8 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Mr. Payne, have you called him as a witness for your case? 9 10 MR. PAYNE: He's a witness for the air quality and this is very important air quality. I 11 hear all of you being concerned about diesel 12 13 particulates. Nobody said a thing about the 14 exhaust from the compressors that are vacuuming the tanks out and blowing air out into the 15 atmosphere with pathogens and E.coli and -- for 16 one thing, there's --17 18 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Mr. Payne, excuse 19 me. 20 MR. PAYNE: Yes. 21 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Excuse me, sir. 22 You'll have your opportunity later with your own case. But, --23 24 MR. PAYNE: This is not my case, this is 25 air quality that nobody is answering --

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CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay, Mr. Payne, Mr. 1 Payne, Mr. Payne. If you want this gentleman to 2 testify, ask him to stay and he can speak during 3 4 your time allotment. 5 MR. PAYNE: Please stay. And if you 6 have time, look up the Lane County Fair and the 7 E.coli sickness that caused the people --CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Don't look at me. 8 9 MR. PAYNE: Okay? 10 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay. MR. PAYNE: There's documentation on 11 that. 12 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: All right. 13 14 MR. ALLEN: That's an Environmental Health --15 MR. PAYNE: E.coli is health; that's 16 what makes people sick. 17 18 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: All right. MR. PAYNE: Kids died from E.coli in 19 20 hamburgers not that long ago. 21 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay, Mr. Allen, 22 thank you for your testimony, your comments. We're now going to continue with our 23 24 interested persons' presentations. We have 25 Michael Jones --

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AUDIENCE SPEAKER: Excuse me, Mr. Young. 1 2 Does not Mr. Allen have to leave shortly? CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Yes. 3 4 AUDIENCE SPEAKER: Will there be a way 5 to have him called as a witness for Mr. Payne in 6 some other fashion? 7 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Only if -- with 8 anybody who has their own presentation they're going to give, they have to make arrangements with 9 10 witnesses in advance, or ask this gentleman if he wants to come back at some point in time to be 11 used as a witness. That's how this is done. 12 MR. ALLEN: If I could, just briefly? 13 14 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Yes. 15 AUDIENCE SPEAKER: Thank you. MR. ALLEN: E.coli is an issue for the 16 17 Environmental Health Department. It is not 18 something that we deal with. We deal strictly 19 with air pollution that doesn't contain live 20 matter in it. So I would to be able to answer any 21 questions or deal with that. I'm sorry. 22 AUDIENCE SPEAKER: Thank you. 23 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay. 24 AUDIENCE SPEAKER: Thank you. Suggest 25 we talk later.

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CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: All right. Michael 1 2 Jones, Alon Perlman, Pat Renshaw and then Lawson Schaller. That's the order. Please come up. You 3 4 have two minutes. 5 Okay, Michael Jones --6 MR. PERLMAN: Before you start the 7 clock, I'm Alon Perlman; I understood that Michael 8 Jones has gone to work. And he was under the impression that his testimony or comments could 9 happen closer to 4:00, which is --10 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay, what I will 11 do, I'll --12 MR. PERLMAN; So, if you could --13 14 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: -- put his name at 15 the bottom of the list. MR. PERLMAN: I do appreciate it. 16 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay. Mr. Perlman. 17 MR. PERLMAN: Yes. My name is Alon 18 Perlman. I live in the prohibition zone. I'm 19 currently running for LOCAC, and I believe we've 20 21 met before. 22 What I would -- in a sense, I had some prepared statements but because of the EPA issues, 23 24 I'm going to read a fortune cookie first. It says: Help people reach their full potential; 25

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1 catch them doing something right."

2 Well, unfortunately there was a public hearing in regards to the pumping orders, and the 3 4 people of Los Osos, who continue to amaze me in 5 how aware they are of all issues, were very 6 specific in identifying a large number of 7 environmental concerns that came out from their 8 concern about this ridiculous pumping order. 9 The most ridiculous item within the pumping order, itself, is that the Water Board 10 Staff could not identify a valid scientific 11 engineering or reason for doing this pumping. 12 13 Neither from the literature, in fact, it was 14 identified as being unprecedented. 15 As far as the diesel fumes, however, I would like to remind you that the Morro Bay is a 16 bird sanctuary, so odds are that the birds' wings 17 will carry away some of the diesel fumes. But, 18 we've --19 20 (Laughter.) 21 MR. PERLMAN: -- really not even touched 22 the tip of the iceberg as far as what a bad idea bimonthly pumping is. It is entirely inconsistent 23 24 with any septic management of any kind. It would not be an action that would be allowed within the 25

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1 confines of an actual sewer.

2 I'd like to remind you that here present in this room are the duly elected CSD of Los Osos. 3 4 The people of Los Osos, --5 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Please wrap up your 6 comments. 7 MR. PERLMAN: -- have elected them in 8 order to solve this problem. And this Board, this Water Board currently is the biggest barrier for 9 people receiving CDOs to be able to achieve 10 11 compliance. CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay, thank you --12 13 MR. PERLMAN: By bringing them into 14 court --CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: -- for your 15 comments, Mr. Perlman. 16 MR. PERLMAN: -- and by fining them. 17 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: I'd like to give 18 everyone their two minutes. Please don't take 19 20 from their time. 21 MR. PERLMAN: Thank you for your time. CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Matt, are the lights 22 working on that? Up on the podium? Because I 23 24 didn't see that timer go off. 25 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: It hasn't been

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1 working all day.

2 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: But it's working 3 here. 4 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Yeah, but not up 5 there. 6 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: The lights? Can 7 you --8 (Technical adjustments.) CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay, is this Pat 9 Renshaw? Okay. Lawson Schaller and Julie Tacker. 10 11 Okay. MS. RENSHAW: Did you push the button 12 13 yet? 14 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: I just did, go 15 ahead. MS. RENSHAW: Okay. Pat Renshaw, Los 16 Osos. Previously not in the prohibition zone, but 17 18 because they found there wasn't enough people, they arbitrarily added me in. 19 20 (Laughter.) 21 MS. RENSHAW: I just want to -- well, I 22 just don't know if you guys are really listening to the community. And I realize Roger Briggs is 23 not here. I realize there's a lot of --24 25 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: He's sitting right

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1 there.

MS. RENSHAW: Oh, nice to meet you; nice 2 to put a face. I appreciate you being here 3 4 because I don't think we're being heard. And so 5 my part is to say thank you. I want to say thank 6 you to our CSD Board who took on this monster that 7 was left to us by the County, by the Water Board, 8 by the previous Board, and is trying to make this thing work. 9

Now, there's not a lot of people who
Will do this. They work hours and hours and
community volunteers come in on their own time.
We've put together press releases, newsletters.
There's minds from CalPoly, from biologists,
people that are just stepping forward and giving
their input to help make this thing go.

I mean we didn't move to Los Osos 17 18 because it's just another town. We didn't want to live in San Luis; it's too busy. We didn't want 19 20 to live in Morro Bay. We don't want to pay for 21 state water. We don't want to live in Oceana. We 22 want to live in Los Osos. It's a wonderful town. We love it. We want it to be green. We want it 23 24 to be healthy.

25 We don't want to drink dirty water. We PETERS SHORTHAND REPORTING CORPORATION (916) 362-2345

want to keep our water, and we want to keep it 1 clean. We have a 10,000 year old aquifer that we 2 didn't even know existed until we had a study. 3 4 Now, why would we want to dirty something that's 5 10,000 years old? There's not much on this planet 6 that's that old that we can actually identify. 7 So I urge you to use your heads and 8 think logically about this. Thank you. Thank you, Roger Briggs. 9 10 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Thank you for your comments. Lawson Schaller. Then Julie Tacker. 11 MR. SCHALLER: Hello, I'm Lawson 12 13 Schaller. I'm a property owner in Los Osos. 14 First, I'm opposed to the CDOs and this hearing 15 process. There appears to be a great deal of confusion and/or misinformation on the hearings 16 and proceedings by a previous or earlier show of 17 hands. 18 There also seems to be a lot of 19 questions on whether or not it's a due process, 20 21 and whether or not it is legally sound. I think a 22 lot of questions still remain is it fair and 23 sound. It doesn't appear so from just being an 24 observer. 25 Opposed to the CDO pumping for a lot of

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reasons. Briefly, a couple. Millions of dollars 1 will be spent by the community on the pumping, if 2 it goes through. And I think it would be much 3 4 better to apply these millions of dollars towards 5 a sewer. I think the community would really like 6 to do that. It's an awful lot of money. 7 There will also be millions of gallons 8 pumped out of the area and I think that water should stay in the community to help recharge. I 9 10 think that's very very important. The air and noise pollution and its 11 associated health risks were mentioned earlier. 12 There's going to be potentially a great deal of 13 14 traffic congestion and also increased costs on road maintenance. Clearly, quality of life will 15 be impacted, which the previous woman addressed. 16 All of this money and all of the energy 17 18 I highly recommend it be applied towards a solution instead of penalties and fines. 19 20 In echoing the words of Mr. Blakeslee 21 earlier, I think we all need to work together on 22 this instead of against each other. And I really think that leadership must take a role in this. 23 24 The government boards, you people, the CSD. There are people within the community that are 25

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economically very powerful. I think they need to 1 reach out and come together. People with a great 2 deal of political connections and power, that I 3 4 think need to come together. 5 And I really think that needs to happen, 6 that initiative needs to come forward on your part 7 before it spirals out of control. Thank you. 8 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Thank you for your comments. Ms. Tacker. Followed by John O'Connor, 9 I believe, and then Judy Vick and then Anton 10 11 Vesely. MS. TACKER: Good afternoon, Board. 12 I'm Julie Tacker; I am the Director of the Los Osos 13 14 Community Services District. I put a slide on the 15 overhead, and then I've provided hard copies for you, because if your eyes are like mine, they're 16 over 40 and maybe you can't see that very well. 17 18 This is our community of Los Osos broken up into its economic makeup by census tract in 19

20 2000. And then overlaid is the prohibition zone.
21 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Ms. Tacker, I'll
22 stop the clock. I just want to ask you a
23 question. Is this part of the CSD's presentation?
24 MS. TACKER: No. This is Julie
25 Tacker's.

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CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Is this the CSD's 1 2 information or data? MS. TACKER: No, actually I had this 3 commissioned, myself. The census data is readily 4 5 available on the --CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Go ahead. 6 7 MS. TACKER: -- web. 8 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Go ahead. MS. TACKER: Okay. I am a Director with 9 the Los Osos Community Services District. I'm 10 also the Chair of the Los Osos Middle School 11 School Site Council. I'm the Vice Chair of the 12 13 Baywood Elementary School School Site Council. 14 There I serve as the Title I liaison to the San Luis Coastal Unified School District. 15 And Title I, if you don't know, is 16 government funding, federal funding, for students 17 that are at risk due to their low income status 18 and their ability to buy or pay to have a free 19 20 lunch. These children that are represented 21 through Title I receive free and reduced lunches. 22 So my interest in Los Osos is and has always been its people, its families. And I have 23 24 been involved with the children. I am a mom, and 25 I've been involved with the children in the

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1 multiple boards and councils that I've been on
2 through the schools.

My concern for the people is and has always been the economic impacts of the sewer, estimated at \$200 per month per household. Now the economic impacts of CDOs on those very same families. It sounds like, from Mr. Allen's testimony, that even \$2400 a year, it could be in excess if you went to the pumping scheme.

10 My concern has always been on the home 11 values and equity in their property. And I would like to focus my comments on the children. 12 And, 13 again, you have the economic makeup of our 14 community there. And I think you can see that our 15 community is not wealthy, and especially the prohibition zone. And that's something our Board, 16 speaking as a Director, is going to analyze 17 18 through an affordability study, is the ability of these people to pay for their sewer. 19

20 And what I think your enforcement 21 actions today, they are compromised and unable to 22 pay even for representation today. The 45 23 citizens do not have a lawyer representing them 24 today.

25 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Thank you for your PETERS SHORTHAND REPORTING CORPORATION (916) 362-2345

comments. John O'Connor. Is Mr. O'Connor here? 1 2 I'll put his name at the bottom of the stack, maybe he will appear. 3 4 Judy Vick. Miss Vick or Mrs. Vick. 5 Don't see her. Anton Vesely. Okay. And then Joe 6 Sparks is going to follow you; and then Steve 7 Senet and James Tkach or Tkach. 8 MR. VESELY: Thank you, Board, for allowing me to speak. And thank everybody else 9 10 for being here. My main concern is the efficiency or 11 effectiveness of the proposed pumping plans. And 12 13 I go back -- my main concern has been an 14 expenditure of several -- well, many millions of dollars for this it if were imposed continued 15 pumping until the sewer is built. 16 An expenditure of that size, if it were 17 18 coming out of the Board's budget, or any commercial enterprise, would have a scientific 19 20 foundation. You're not going to spend that kind 21 of money if you don't have a basis in fact. 22 So, my questions that I presented in a 23 letter for this hearing were -- well, basically 24 they came down to how are you going to measure the

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25

effectiveness of how this money is spent. And can

you measure it, since you don't have a baseline. 1 2 You don't even know where the, you know, where the 3 pollution level is at. You can't prove it came 4 from the septic tanks. How are you going to 5 measure how effective that pumping is? 6 So, it's -- nobody would spend that kind 7 of money. When it's our money, yeah, I get 8 excited and upset about it. 9 And let me say I'd rather put my time and money into a solution. And I see the proposed 10 CDOs as not solutions, unprovable experiments that 11 many of us, myself included, perceive as 12 13 punishment. 14 Good place to stop, I guess. 15 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Thank you for your comments. I just wanted to mention, you know, I 16 found your letter, which I read and I highlighted 17 your points in here. 18 You know, we're not focusing on the 19 levels of nitrates in the Bay. 20 21 MR. VESELY: Yeah. 22 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay, you understand that? It's groundwater? 23 24 MR. VESELY: Yeah. 25 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: And did you know PETERS SHORTHAND REPORTING CORPORATION (916) 362-2345

that when you wrote this out?

2	MR. VESELY: Yeah, that's the I mean
3	my statements, doesn't matter where you're
4	measuring.
5	CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay.
6	MR. VESELY: You got to measure.
7	CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: You're concerned
8	about the effectiveness of whatever's proposed?
9	MR. VESELY: Right.
10	CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay. Thank you
11	very much.
12	Okay, Joe Sparks.
13	MR. SPARKS: Mr. Young and the Board,
14	thank you. This Board made a distinction at the
15	District ACL hearing on the actions that got us
16	here. And this Board should be consistent with
17	that distinction, I believe.
18	The Board should not consider individual
19	CDOs, I believe, until at least early next year
20	where it's probable that by then the homeowners
21	will have the opportunity to reaffirm a commitment
22	to a project and mitigation without this
23	enforcement.
24	The issuance of an ACL complaint and
25	fines against the District already constitutes a
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form of enforcement against the homeowners and 1 2 property owners within the prohibition zone since the services are funded by their property taxes. 3 These CDOs basically are no more than 4 5 throwing salt in that wound. 6 Compounding the problem, the District 7 ACL complaint there was only fines, which was due 8 to the actions that this Board determined, by the District, and not by the individual homeowners and 9 property owners. 10 The homeowners and property owners, as a 11 matter of record, took preemptive action by 12 approving an assessment in 2001 for a wastewater 13 14 treatment system. There was no reason for CDOs to get the homeowners to commit then. Certainly 15 there's no reason now. That was the one and only 16 time the homeowners were legally asked to obligate 17 18 themselves to a treatment system, and they 19 responded overwhelmingly. Present payments from that, on the order 20 21 of \$20 a month for 30 years, your Board should 22 give that consideration when you evaluate the potential of economic harm to individual 23 24 homeowners. 25 Combining these CDOs against individual PETERS SHORTHAND REPORTING CORPORATION (916) 362-2345

homeowners and property owners with the ACL enforcement is financial double jeopardy against 2 these homeowners. Especially when many of them 3 4 cannot even vote for matters of the CSD.

5 As regard to pumping, please consider 6 less frequent pumping, potentially bi- or tri-7 annual initially so that the effects, that is if 8 you do consider pumping, so that the effects can be monitored gradually with empirical data to 9 10 determine its effectiveness. The nitrate accumulation in the prohibition zone are an 11 empirical system. So, there is a rationale for 12 implementing it more gradually than what was 13 14 recommended to determine the effectiveness and minimize the cost. 15

Please consider that data being assessed 16 to improve the treatment system and expected at 17 18 that time payments were about 100 to 120 a month, based on that engineering assessment report. The 19 20 prosecution's contention that the individual is 21 realizing a benefit based on the \$205 a month neglects the influence of both the District 22 actions, the litigants, possibly other agencies. 23 24 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Mr. Sparks, could 25 you please wrap it up.

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MR. SPARKS: So, in closing, please, if 1 2 you issue these, make sure that they are constructed to achieve the ultimate environmental 3 4 and socioeconomic goals. And consider the 5 commitment of the property owner legally 6 encumbered by that assessment. Thank you. 7 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Thank you, Mr. 8 Sparks. Steve Senet, James Tkach and then Chuck 9 Cesena. 10 AUDIENCE SPEAKER: Mr. Cesena had to be 11 (inaudible). CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay. James Tkach 12 13 and then Richard Margetson, Marla Jo Bruton, Tom 14 Hallis or Hellis. 15 AUDIENCE SPEAKER: Hollis. MR. TKACH: James Tkach, Los Osos. 16 17 These are just some random thoughts, so it may 18 sound a little disjointed. 19 Holding individuals responsible for not 20 having the sewer is like saying the victims of the 21 flooding and hurricane Katrina are responsible for the failure of the levees. 22 The issue in this matter is not whether 23 24 or not we want a sewer, but what type and the cost. The Clean Water Act, your own guidelines 25

call for sustainability and affordability. That's all the CSD has been trying to achieve, and why they opposed the previous project.

And I believe that pumping every other month is actually going to hurt water quality by destroying the biological system that forms in the tank. As the previous speaker said, I think the frequency of the pumping will actually hurt water quality.

As far as the citizens of Los Osos, probably the most informed about septage and sewers and are actively working to build a new project. The new CSD Board has already started a new project. The Board soon will be starting on a revised environmental document. So they are moving ahead.

We were this close to having a project 17 18 through the Blakeslee agreement. I was in the room that night. Mr. Shallcross wanted us all to 19 20 sing kumbaya. We were close that night. We 21 really were. There were people on both sides of 22 the aisle, they were holding their nose a little 23 bit to accept the agreement, but they were willing 24 to go with it. And unfortunately that was torpedoed by the actions of others. 25

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And I think if this Board and the Executive Officer would have supported that agreement we'd be building two-thirds of the project today. And this action wouldn't be necessary.

6 So I think we can come to some, as Mr. 7 Blakeslee said again today, that I think there is 8 a solution on the horizon that we can get done 9 soon without having to go through this action.

10 I object to the perception that if I'm 11 discharging I'm violating the basin plan. You know, I'm 40 feet to groundwater where I am. And 12 13 the technical advisory (inaudible) technical 14 report back in the '80s showed the complete 15 denitrification was occurring within 15 feet below the leachfields. I realize that doesn't help all 16 areas in Los Osos. 17

18 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Can you wrap up your 19 comments.

20 MR. TKACH: But it certainly would show 21 that some of us are not violating the basin plan 22 by our discharge. I urge you not to adopt this 23 measure. Thank you.

24 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Thank you for your25 comments. Is this Mr. Senet or Mr. Cesena back

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that? Mr. Senet. Okay, you're next. And then 1 2 Richard Margetson. This is who? MR. CESENA: Mr. Cesena. Chuck Cesena. 3 4 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay, all right. So 5 the other Director is not here? Steve Senet? 6 MR. CESENA: He had to leave. 7 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay. 8 MR. CESENA: He had another appointment to get to. 9 10 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Well, your card is 11 here. MR. CESENA: It's there. Is that a "get 12 out of jail free" card? 13 14 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Go ahead. 15 (Laughter.) MR. CESENA: Good afternoon, Board. Mr. 16 17 Tkach and Mr. Sparks seemed to steal a lot of what 18 I wanted to say. But I do want to leave you with 19 one thought. Perception is everything. 20 I heard that from a political science 21 professor the other day, speaking before our local 22 board of supervisors. And whether it's the perception that you're biased because you started 23 24 discussing ACLs and CDOs the week after the recall 25 election. Or whether it's a perception that you

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are anti-sewer because you want to move the sewer 1 2 outside of town and build a more sustainable and affordable project, perceptions are very 3 4 important. And they're difficult to overcome. 5 But there is one undeniable fact that 6 should overcome the perception that we don't want 7 a sewer out in Los Osos. And Mr. Tkach touched on 8 it. The strains of kumbaya that were coming out of our community center in late October. 9 10 We had what we thought was a resolution 11 to address what we thought were negotiations. Now, you can call those negotiations bureaucratic 12 13 convention if you wish, which is what the State 14 Water Resources Control Board spokesperson called them after sending us a letter that talked about 15 the framework for negotiations. 16 17 We thought we were negotiating. We 18 thought we have a solution. We would be under 19 construction now. But there was some sabotage 20 that occurred. And some of that sabotage would 21 have been brought to light with a subpoena that 22 was issued earlier today that you squashed. And I really think that we should have 23 24 heard from Ms. Bianchi. I really think that she 25 had a role in stopping the construction that would

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1 have been going on right now and would have

2 precluded the need for the CDOs.

3 There's no need for this. We do want to4 build a project. Thank you.

5 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Thank you for your
6 comments. Mr. Margetson, followed by Marla Jo
7 Bruton, and then Tom Hollis.

8 MR. MARGETSON: Richard Margetson. The first thing I want to talk about is the subpoenas. 9 10 I found it very interesting that Jerry Gregory and Pandora Nash-Karner were issued subpoenas, but 11 were not in the building this morning. Did they 12 already know that you were going to quash them, --13 14 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: No. MR. MARGETSON: -- or were they given 15 advance warning? Okay. 16 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: The answer is no. 17 18 So don't speculate, don't make assumptions. MR. MARGETSON: Well, it's very 19 20 interesting that Shirley Bianchi showed up and the 21 representative from the County showed up about 22 theirs, but the other two didn't show up, and then weren't able to be called by --23 24 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: You know, Mr. 25 Margetson, you can spend a lot of time spinning

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1 whatever you want to spin --

MR. MARGETSON: I'm not spinning. I'm 2 just saying it's very --3 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: -- and I've stopped 4 5 your time --6 MR. MARGETSON: -- interesting that 7 they're not here. CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay. All right. I 8 have no idea why they did or didn't come. 9 10 MR. MARGETSON: Okay. I also continue to have a problem with Lori Okun's presence at 11 these hearings. You have four agenda items on 12 13 closed session today where she's not going to be 14 in that discussion. But she assisted the Taxpayer 15 Watch Group previous to being a party to the second action. And talk about tainted process, I 16 think her sitting on the prosecution side totally 17 18 taints this process. Shirley Bianchi and Sam Blakeslee, what 19 an opposite. Sam Blakeslee came here and talked 20 21 on behalf of the community of Los Osos. And if 22 you wonder why Shirley Bianchi needed to be 23 subpoenaed, I think it was proven by her comments, 24 or lack of comments up here at this podium. She said nothing, representing the biggest community 25

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1 in her district.

2	And we're here talking about solutions.
3	You want solutions. Here's an alternative.
4	Instead of the pumping order, include everybody in
5	the prohibition zone in Los Osos; and instead of
6	\$200, what it would average a month for these
7	people to pump, why don't we put \$50 a month from
8	everybody into a trust fund that both the CSD and
9	the Regional Board have a say on.
10	Figure what that would amount to in a
11	year. And the restrictions on that trust fund
12	would go completely to the needed studies and the
13	requirements to build the new project.
14	And start with
15	CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Can you wrap up your
16	comments, please.
17	MR. MARTYN: Yeah. And included in
18	that, a serious water conservation program. Los
19	Osos continues to use twice as much water, the
20	average household, than our two neighboring towns,
21	Cambria and Morro Bay.
22	Thank you.
23	CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Thank you for your
24	comments. Marla Jo Bruton, Tom Hollis, then Gail
25	McPherson.

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MS. BRUTON: Good afternoon; I'm Marla Bruton from North Morro Bay. I would like to quote Benjamin Franklin in a warning that he gave a long time ago. And that warning was that a person who relinquishes their most basic civil rights in exchange for temporary security deserves neither security nor freedom.

8 I want to applaud the people in Los 9 Osos. I've seen this revolutionary process taking 10 place. The CSD Board that they have is one of the 11 most impressive boards for a community that I have 12 ever seen.

They have been working their hearts and 13 14 their minds out searching. They deserve respect. 15 The woman that was in here, Mrs. Moylan, every time I come here you guys really flabbergast me, 16 really. Telling a woman that only her husband can 17 18 speak when they have a CDO order. As far as I checked, the last time I checked women have 19 20 property rights. We had to fight for that. We 21 had to fight.

And your coming here and dismissing this woman because she's the wife. She has a property interest and she has a right to speak. And I really -- you would do well to go back to school,

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1 especially if you're going to be on a board like 2 this.

And you can start with the Brown Act. 3 4 And the Brown Act, the beginning of the -- Brown 5 Act is that we do not relinquish our sovereignty. 6 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Thank you for your 7 comments, Ms. Bruton. And my comments before to 8 the Moylans was that they jointly had that time. I did not intend any inference that either one of 9 10 them had to use the time. It's joint. Mr. Hallis, Gail McPherson. Boy, Ms. 11 McPherson, you're getting your time in today. Do 12 13 you live in Los Osos? 14 MR. HOLLIS: Yes, I do. CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: No, Gail McPherson. 15 (Audience speaking simultaneously.) 16 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Do you live in Los 17 18 Osos? 19 AUDIENCE SPEAKER: Duh? 20 AUDIENCE SPEAKER: It's none of your 21 business. 22 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: And then Elaine Watson. Mr. Hallis. 23 MR. HOLLIS: Okay, yeah, Tom Hollis. 24 I'm an 18-year resident of Los Osos. 25

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AUDIENCE SPEAKER: Can't hear you, sir. 1 MR. HOLLIS: Oh, sorry. Eighteen-year 2 resident of Los Osos. For the last ten years I've 3 4 been a science teacher at Atascadero High School, 5 geology teacher at Questa. And ten years before 6 that I was a environmental consultant, and did 7 groundwater studies, groundwater mitigation was 8 part of what I did. 9 I want to address the CDOs --10 AUDIENCE SPEAKER: Louder, please. MR. HOLLIS: I'll try. I want to 11 address the CDOs. I had to ask myself why were 12 13 these issued in terms of how is this going to help 14 groundwater. How was this going to help clean the 15 groundwater basin. And, you know, it's -- to clean the 16 17 nitrates, what you really need to do is you need 18 to flush it out with clean water. And that's 19 going to take decades. Groundwater does not move 20 very quick, and it's going to take decades to do 21 that. 22 And a sewer treatment plant would help that because we would put that clean groundwater 23 24 that's been treated back in and be able to flush 25 that. So that is the ultimate goal, to put this

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in.

But, to take and pump septic tanks and replace dirty water with less dirty water, for one, is probably not going to have a significant effect. And for two, it's really not going to address the problem very quickly. Again, it's going to take decades on this.

8 So, I look at this and I know that you 9 guys have the same level of education that I have 10 in groundwater if not a little bit more. And so I 11 would think that you would know this.

So I look at the next thing, I say, 12 13 well, maybe this is punitive; maybe this is to get 14 our attention. Well, now I'm going to draw on my 15 next ten years of experience. And as a teacher in high school, when I have a class that I'm having 16 problems with, I don't randomly pick students to 17 18 punish, nor do I pick the entire community to 19 punish.

20 What I do is I go to the counselor, I go 21 to other teachers, I go to the parents and I try 22 and understand the students I'm having problems 23 with.

And what happens then is that I don't even want to punish at that point. I want to help

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1 them --2 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Mr. Hollis, could 3 you wrap --4 MR. HOLLIS: -- in some other way. 5 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: -- could you wrap 6 your comments up, please. 7 MR. HOLLIS: My point being on the 8 second thing is that I think you really need to work with us and not be punitive. Thank you. 9 10 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Thank you. 11 (Pause.) CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay, Ms. McPherson, 12 go ahead. 13 MS. McPHERSON: Well, good afternoon. I 14 15 think some of the comments we've heard already that there's some ideas out there that make this 16 issuance of individual CDOs wholly unnecessary. 17 And the idea to provide a provision for a sunset, 18 in the event that you did adopt CDOs, is a 19 20 wonderful idea from Mr. Blakeslee. 21 Participation in a structured process to 22 get the weapons put down and actually identify who would like to come into the room as leaders from 23 24 Los Osos and from the agencies that would be making efforts for legislation to help us solve 25

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our problems is wonderful. I love that.

2	But there are people who clearly would
3	rather dissolve the community and continue to
4	fight. Mediation, arbitration, whatever you do, I
5	think that Sam Blakeslee is on the right path.
6	There's many people who have come and
7	offered that, offered to pay for it, offered to
8	host it. I hope that you'll be there. I think
9	that that's essential to see the sincerity of the
10	County and the various regulatory agencies.
11	I have some concerns because I don't
12	believe that any health effects issues have been
13	analyzed, or economic analysis. And to do a CDO
14	or any enforcement action, especially on an
15	individual, it would be very very important to
16	take a look at the conditions of ability to pay.
17	Is this going to cause more environmental harm.
18	And it said very clearly in the staff
19	report and all the reports is that in the interim,
20	until we get a treatment plant, we need to have
21	something to improve water quality. The test is
22	if this does not improve water quality then let's
23	spend that money somewhere else and do other
24	things.
25	And there have been proposals to pump

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some of the upper aquifer and do some remediation 1 2 around town to stop some of the nitrogen, lower the nitrogen that's going in. That's clearly a 3 4 better idea. 5 But if it does not, if this proposal 6 does not improve water quality, we should be 7 applying those resources elsewhere. 8 Thank you very much for your time. CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Thank you for your 9 10 comments. Elaine Watson, then Al Barrow, then Barbara Akle, Akle. 11 MS. WATSON: Elaine Watson. I live in 12 13 the prohibition zone. You've already heard a 14 number of very well thought out protestations to 15 the CDOs. And I just want to state my objection to the CDOs, as well. 16 They are environmentally and financially 17 18 unsound, and in no way contribute to the long-term 19 management of the community's wastewater. 20 Los Osos wants a wastewater system. We 21 want to manage our waste. But we want a complete 22 system that addresses the long-term health of Morro Bay, water/energy conservation, and the 23 24 financial resources of the community. 25 I strongly suggest that you find a more

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sensible viable remedy in coordination with our 1 2 CSD who want to build a wastewater system. You've had some good suggestions here from Mr. Blakeslee, 3 4 Mr. Margetson and our own CSD has suggested a 5 septic management program which would be very 6 helpful in maintaining our septics and getting us 7 through to the point where we can build a complete 8 system that we want. 9 Thank you. 10 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay, thank you for 11 your comments. Mr. Barrow. 12 13 MR. BARROW: Good evening, my name is Al 14 Barrow. I want to talk very clearly and very 15 plainly. The approach that you're taking is one 16 17 of many that you could have taken. This approach 18 that you're taking is leading you down the wrong pathway. Good decisions are about how you 19 20 approach your problem, how you deal with it. 21 The approach that this Board has taken 22 for the last 25 years hasn't worked. The first cleanup taken place in Los Osos is taking place 23 24 right now at the fire department. The very first 25 attempt. I worked there this morning installing a

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1 lysimeter.

I want to give you an example. You hold 2 that no soil treatment is given credit, no soil 3 4 treatment is given credit for denitrification. 5 Nitrogen being the problem. 6 Let me just say that if there was 10,000 7 -- I'm going to wait till you finish your 8 discussion -- 10,000 pounds of nitrogen have been put into the basin through septic tanks in the 9 10 last 30 years. Why do we only have 1 mg/liter increase in the basin over the last 30 years? 11 Where did this nitrogen go? It was treated in the 12 13 soil. 14 You're lying about the soil treatment, 15 or else you're in denial. Because that water was treated by the soil and reduced the nitrogen; 16 almost over 9 million pounds of nitrogen had been 17 18 removed by the soil columns. If it weren't so, it would show up with 19 20 high monitoring rates for the nitrogen. So, 21 you're making a big mistake on the soil treatment. 22 I wanted to tell you that. I would also like to say that a nitrogen 23 24 management plan, which is what you use and your staff used at Santa Cruz, is a much more 25

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constructive approach. How you handle and how you 1 manage the nitrogen that's going in the basin is 2 very very important. 3 4 You can use soil uptake, you can use ag 5 exchange. CSD is working on those issues right 6 now to try to --7 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Can you wrap up your 8 comments, please. 9 MR. BARROW: I will try to do that very quick, give me another 20 seconds. The CO2 issue 10 hasn't been addressed yet, which will make a big 11 difference. The cost of actually treating 12 13 nitrogen rather than using a soil uptake approach 14 is huge expensive. 15 And finally I'd like to say is the reduction of the waste in the septic tanks can 16 achieve secondary treatment right now in the fire 17 18 department. And why don't you let us clean up our basin, why can't we get a permit for a simple 19 20 system that's cleaning up the basin? 21 You say you want to clean up the basin, 22 you're not --23 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Thank you, Mr. --24 MR. BARROW: -- allowing us --25 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: -- Barrow for your

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time. Thank you for your time. You said 20 1 2 seconds. You went over that. You're taking time from --3 4 MR. BARROW: Thank you. 5 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: -- your neighbors. 6 Please. 7 MS. WATSON: I hope you heard what I 8 said. 9 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Barbara Akle, please. Richard Sadowski, Michael Jones, John 10 O'Connor and Judy Vick. 11 MS. AKLE: Barbara Akle, Los Osos 12 13 prohibition zone. 14 AUDIENCE SPEAKER: Can't hear you. 15 MS. AKLE: Sorry. Pumping the septic tanks every two months is a poor solution to the 16 sewage problems in Los Osos for all the reasons 17 18 that you've already heard, air pollution, salt 19 water intrusion, financial hardship for many. The 20 only benefits I see to that is to the pumping 21 companies and to the lawyers. 22 If the County is truly serious about 23 getting things moving they should approve the 24 dissolution of the Los Osos CSD and take matters

25 into their own hands.

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I would also like to point out that the 1 County was not blameless in this situation. After 2 all, they handed out over 1000 building permits in 3 4 Los Osos after the moratorium without any 5 infrastructure in place to deal with the sewage. 6 So, that's all I have to say. 7 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay, thank you for 8 your comments. Richard Sadowski. Mr. Sadowski, are you here? Okay. We're at the end of this 9 10 list, folks. Michael Jones. AUDIENCE SPEAKER: -- Sadowski --11 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Oh, he is. Okay, 12 Michael Jones, are you here? Michael Jones or 13 14 John O'Connor. 15 AUDIENCE SPEAKER: He was coming at 4:00, Michael Jones --16 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay. At 4:00, 17 18 okay. Mr. Sadowski? Go ahead. MR. SADOWSKI: Richard Sadowski, 19 20 citizen, Morro Bay. I would first like to commend 21 the Los Osos CSD on their expertise and diligence 22 in doing the right thing. Currently in the State of California 23 24 Governor Schwarzenegger's -- the Governor's Office is attempting to have a \$50 billion bond for 25

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1 infrastructure repair.

Now, this bond is going to require what 2 they call a report card. Now, fortunately, Los 3 4 Osos and this County is on point with this 5 information. What we have to do is, as a County, 6 not slow down Los Osos, but speed up and catch up 7 to these people. And let's get on point and get 8 some of this available funding for this infrastructure. It's a statewide problem that's 9 recognized by the Governor's Office. 10 Now, I have a collections grade four 11 certificate from the California Water Environment 12 13 Association, and a bachelor of science degree in 14 chemical engineering. And while working in the 15 aerospace industry we had what we called a tiger team, an assembly of first- and second-level 16 17 supervisors that were experts in their field. And 18 that's the kind of people you have in Los Osos. They are the template for this County in getting 19 20 this funding. 21 Los Angeles County, Orange County, 22 Inland Empire, the Bay Area are all submitting It's time that the Regional Board, instead 23 this. 24 of asking Los Osos to -- penalizing these people,

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commend them and help us with the rest of the

1 County get up to speed.

2 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Can you wrap up your 3 comments, sir. 4 MR. SADOWSKI: Thank you. 5 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Thank you. John 6 O'Connor. Okay, not here. Judy Vick, not here. 7 Okay, so, Mr. Jones you say is coming at 4:00. 8 Let me go through this list. These are the people that have checked off they do not want to testify. 9 10 MS. SCHICKER: I have a card in that. CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: I don't think I saw 11 a card for you. Well, come on up. 12 MS. SCHICKER: Good afternoon, Board. 13 My name is Lisa Schicker. I'm the President of 14 15 Los Osos Community Services District. In 2004 I testified before your Board two times. Both times 16 17 you told me you don't like the downtown sewer; you 18 must change your Board; you must change your Board. 19 20 The State Water Board told me that. The 21 Coastal Commission told me that. And you told me 22 that. And the County told me that. So I ran and was elected in 2004. 23 24 Recent editorial in the paper -- Mr. Young, do you need to stop a second? 25 PETERS SHORTHAND REPORTING CORPORATION (916) 362-2345

CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Are you asking me a
 question?

3 MS. SCHICKER: Yeah, I saw you look away 4 and I thought you didn't want --

5 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: I'm listening to 6 what you're saying, Ms. Schicker. You have one 7 minute and 15 seconds.

8 MS. SCHICKER: We're not anti-sewer. I 9 published an editorial in the paper and I want to 10 make sure that you gentlemen got it. I am sending 11 things through Mr. Briggs and I hope you are 12 getting the mail that I'm sending you to keep you 13 updated on our projects.

14 The CDO is the wrong approach, you are 15 terrorizing the citizens. You honestly are. And you're not helping the situation. We're trying 16 very hard to get going on projects. We're 17 18 expending great resources in these arguments and fights and lawsuits and piles of documents. 19 Ιt 20 takes great energy. And it's not productive 21 energy; it's negative energy. We can do better than that. 22

In October we had the Blakeslee
compromise. We know it was kyboshed; we know how
it was kyboshed. We have a pile of emails to

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1 prove it. It's too bad.

2 During that compromise we promised four 3 things. We promised that we would negotiate and 4 meet with the Water Board Staff to keep them 5 updated on our project. We have delivered. We 6 have a good relationship with your staff and we're 7 meeting monthly.

8 We promised that we would start a new 9 project immediately. We have delivered. We are 10 doing that right now.

11 We promised that we would implement 12 septic management. We're working with Blakeslee 13 for legislation. We may not need it. We're 14 implementing it anyhow. We're doing it now.

We promised that we would do short- and long-term solutions. We're doing that.

17 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Can you wrap it up. 18 MS. SCHICKER: And wrapping up, you can 19 be powerful powerful heroes today, and you could 20 work with us. That's all we're asking. We have 21 the same goals, the same goals for clean water.

You have many tools in your toolbox, the
CDOs are the wrong tool. Please work with us.
Thank you.

25 (Applause.)

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CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Geri Walsh. Geri 1 2 Walsh, followed by Linde Owen. Mr. Bleskey, you're an employee of the Community Services 3 4 District, and so I would prefer it if you put your 5 comments in during that time. We've allotted, I 6 think, two hours for that. So I think it's 7 different -- many of the Directors have spoken. 8 Clearly what Ms. Schicker said were really representations on behalf of the CSD. And 9 10 I allowed that. All right. I'm trying to be generous as much as I can with time, but I would 11 appreciate it if you would put your comments in 12 13 with the two hours that we've allotted for you. 14 Thank you. 15 Geri Walsh. MS. WALSH: Geri Walsh, 20-year 16 homeowner in the prohibition zone in Los Osos. 17 18 We, the people of Los Osos, have not had representation. Our Supervisor, when asked by 19 20 numerous individuals, would not get involved in the sewer situation. 21 22 I find it strange that our Supervisor, unlike Mr. Blakeslee, had to be subpoenaed to 23 24 speak to the people of her District of Los Osos. 25 Then hide behind her attorney that the people of PETERS SHORTHAND REPORTING CORPORATION (916) 362-2345

1 Los Osos pay for.

I find it strange that our County health 2 representative had to be muzzled by his attorney 3 4 that the people of Los Osos pay for. I find it 5 strange that the people of Los Osos pay this Board 6 and their attorneys to fight against us. 7 A previous speaker and spokesperson for 8 the past recalled Board spoke about the state-ofthe-art system that was designed actually to cause 9 10 the financial demise of 40 percent of the people of our community. She spoke in favor of 11 dissolution. I'm not willing to give up our fire 12 13 department and water department that we've worked 14 so hard to bring back to a state of financial 15 accountability from the out-of-control spending of the past Board. 16 And where is the past Board today? 17 18 They're not here. They formed a group to work behind the scenes and send emails to you asking 19

you to fine us out of existence. Some of the same
people you would not allow to be subpoenaed today.
I find it all very strange. Thank you.
(Applause.)
CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Linde Owen.
MS. OWEN: Good afternoon, Linde Owen.

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I'm wearing a couple of visuals. This is what it 1 would feel like to be next out of 4255 people --2 homes, excuse me, that are still left to be put 3 4 into this position of fear. 5 My other visual is, and my point is, 6 these are unproductive. These CDOs are 7 accomplishing nothing. 8 I would, as long as we have Mr. Briggs in the room, I would like him to maybe address 9 10 what happened with 8312 which was issued the exact same day that 8313, which is what you're enacting 11 the CDOs off of, was also put into play. 12 13 That resolution said that septic 14 management needed to be done. And they would have 15 taken steps to lower the upper aquifer so that we did not have septic leach fields sitting in water, 16 17 groundwater. 18 If you want to do the science we can put a great sewer in in Los Osos. But as long as you 19 20 choose to do politics we're going to get noplace. 21 I have another comment. Oh, the data 22 that you're working off of is 23 years old. That resolution was based on old data from questionable 23

25 says that we are polluting very little of the Bay,

wells. We have new data. It's much updated. It

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from what the shellfish study said.

Take that data and let's look at it and 2 re-analyze this resolution. I think that we have 3 4 properly operating septic tanks. They're not --5 the CDOs are meant for major polluters, not 6 residences with properly working septic tanks. 7 The procedural structure was designed 8 for corporations. I'm just an individual. I don't have a special lawyer or a retainer like 9 Shell or Exxon. 10 So, in closing, I would like to say that 11 perhaps those who urged you to sue us out of 12 13 existence, go ahead and pay the money to have 14 their group septic tanks pumped, and then they can donate it to -- I think they should be donating it 15 to the people that need the help right now. 16 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Thank you for you 17 18 comments, --MS. OWEN: I urge you to drop this 19 activity. 20 21 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: -- Ms. Owen. Okay, 22 Michael Jones, have you shown up yet? Okay. Folks, I'm going to read these cards; 23 24 these are people who said they didn't want to 25 testify. Perhaps someone misunderstood what that

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1 meant.

2	Thomas Dempsey. Josephine Dempsey.
3	Braverman, two Bravermans, Betty Braverman.
4	Charles Kostas. If you hear your name and you
5	wish to speak, come up to the podium.
6	Shirley Norman; Hans Schwarz; Mark
7	Holley; Mary Pastel; Mark Robinson; Darlene
8	Reynolds; Susan McGinty; J. Harding; John
9	Anderson; Sharlot Sunshine; Carol Cribbs. Okay.
10	(Pause.)
11	CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Is anyone here to
12	speak on items not on our agenda besides this one
13	card I have from Reginald Fagan? Okay, Mr. Fagan,
14	if you're here, come up.
15	This is our public comment period.
16	These are and I may have confused my labels
17	earlier, but I characterized the interested
18	persons portion, which we have just concluded,
19	except for Mr. Jones, with public comment. But
20	this is for comments unrelated to anything on the
21	agenda.
22	Okay, Mr. Fagan, go ahead.
23	MR. FAGAN: Hi, and I appreciate the
24	opportunity to speak. I feel, you know, the
25	energy of folks around the agenda, but I just

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wanted to, you know, touch upon water quality.

I'm a person that's lived in this
County, you know, for about ten years. I live
presently at San Luis Obispo. As a child I grew
up and always looked forward to coming to this
County, San Luis Obispo, you know, the beautiful
lay of the land, you know, the beautiful
recreation opportunities.

9 But I just, you know, would like to just encourage the community to try to come together, 10 try to work these issues out. You know, I'm 11 thinking about when I was a kid, I loved coming 12 13 here fishing and camping. I'm thinking about the 14 future generations, you know, that are in front of 15 us, and that, you know, what are they going to do if we just keep gridlocking, we keep fighting and 16 politicizing issues. 17

You know, bottomline is we need to focus our resources; we need to try to come together. We need to try to, you know, look at common ground.

I sat here for the last three to four hours and I've heard a lot of brilliant ideals, a lot of different alternatives. I just ask the Board if it's possible, because I'm a disabled

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1 guy; I'm on a fixed income. And I really feel for 2 people that are struggling. You know, it's hard 3 enough trying to deal with the oil, gas price and 4 all these other issues that we're dealing with 5 today.

6 We need to try to come up with some best 7 practices. We need to make sure that the things -8 - the decisions we make are science-based 9 decisions, not politically based.

10 I guess I'm a citizen here. I'm an 11 African-American. Don't see to many of them here. 12 We need to try to make sure we bring everybody to 13 the table. Because I think so many times we're 14 being left behind.

Okay, so I'm just coming up to encourage that somewhere in there we can put the egos aside and start looking at, you know, what's the best interest for the future generation. We have to make decisions for the kids.

Because I remember being a kid that loved to come to San Luis Obispo. And I just want to make sure my daughter has that option, as well. Okay, thank you, folks, for this time.

24 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Thank you for your25 comments.

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(Applause.)

2	CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Mr. Barrow, you
3	submitted a speaker card for public comment. And,
4	Mr. Barrow, if you get into anything related to
5	Los Osos I will ask you to step away from the
6	podium. So, please, don't do that.
7	MR. BARROW: Good evening, public and
8	staff. My name is Al Barrow, and I've been a
9	supporter of the Clean Water Act since it was
10	initiated. I've been a supporter of the Coastal
11	Act, protecting our resources. I strive very hard
12	to save water in my daily routine. Some people
13	think I should take a bath more often, but doesn't
14	matter, I save the water.
15	(Laughter.)
16	MR. BARROW: And I believe in the
17	Regional Water Board system. I believe in the
18	State Water Board system. I believe especially in
19	the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency. And I
20	believe in their mission, and I support that from
21	my heart. And I think everybody in this room
22	does, as well.
23	I don't want you to mistake frustration
24	for a lack of purpose or a negative approach. We
25	all support your mission, and we appreciate the
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1 work that you're doing towards that mission.

2	We criticize you, it's constructively.
3	And it never hurts to get a little well, it
4	might hurt a little bit, constructive criticism,
5	but take it as heartfelt assistance public input
6	to improve our efforts to keep our beautiful
7	planet clean.
8	Thank you.
9	CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay. Dave Duggan.
10	Then Linde Owen. And I hope Mr. Jones appears,
11	because that'll be the end of the interested
12	persons.
13	MR. DUGGAN: Dave Duggan, Los Osos. I'm
14	here to talk about smart growth, 2050. I think we
15	had a vision, 2025, here not too long ago, talking
16	about water, estuaries, riparian, restoration
17	wetlands, and growth versus water usage.
18	The San Luis Obispo is going to be doing
19	amendments to the general plan and other items
20	such as that, which is going to include
21	agricultural saving agricultural space as well
22	as open space.
23	People should be aware that what is
24	going on right now with San Luis Obispo County and
25	the supervisors and the planning commission. They
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1 2 should be watching and going to these meetings and be aware that they're making changes.

That if you are planning on putting in a system, wastewater, anywhere other than in the middle of your town, that you may have people -doing that, if you're not aware what's going on.

7 They're trying to keep areas greener
8 around communities. And in doing so they may
9 block any type of development that would keep you
10 from siting the system where you want.

11 Now, I'm not trying to breach what you 12 asked us not to do. I attended the meeting at the 13 supervisors and we had a pretty good discussion on 14 their vision for 2050 and even sooner. The CSD, 15 as well as other small organizations -- just

16 issued, very aware --

17 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Thank you for your
18 comments, Mr. Duggan.
19 MR. DUGGAN: -- that this is going on.

20 Thank you very much.

21 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Linde Owen.
22 MS. OWEN: Linde Owen, thank you, again,
23 for another opportunity. I wanted to do just a
24 little mini primer on why I hate conventional
25 gravity-fed sewers.

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Number one, they're failing all over
 America. They're one of the highest
 infrastructure repair costs that's going undone.
 There's not enough money on the planet to fix all
 of them.

6 Now, what you have to think about is 7 you're taking raw sewage and other liquids from a 8 home and you're putting it in pipes. And you're running them far underground where nobody sees 9 10 them. And if you have test mechanisms to go in and see if they're leaking, or if the pipe is 11 broken, but you don't always know until it's 12 13 broken and it's spewed raw sewage into a drinking 14 supply, into a lake, into an ocean, into a river, 15 onto open land.

And so I believe that the EPA has come up with what is called the small flows clearinghouse, and they are urging smaller communities throughout America, and people that have to add onto their sewers, to look at doing an effluent collection.

22 Because what you've done then is you've 23 kept the toxic material in a tank. It's the tank 24 has much less chance of breaking and spilling. 25 And they can be tested much easier than the pipes

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1 can.

2 All the leaks along the coast of California, the major can't swim here anymore. 3 4 Danger signs up and down the ocean front areas. 5 It's all from sewer pipes, raw sewage going 6 through conventional gravity-fed pipes. 7 Los Osos would love to do something more 8 creative than that. Thank you. 9 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay, Michael Jones, 10 are you here, Mr. Jones? He is here? You're Mr. 11 Paige. MR. PAIGE: Yeah, I was wondering --12 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay. That is it. 13 14 MR. PAIGE: I was wondering if I could 15 speak, just a short --CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: You know what, 16 folks, the last few comments really are getting 17 18 into issues related to what we're discussing today. And if you really have something 19 20 legitimate that was not related to sewage 21 treatment or siting in Los Osos, I would be more 22 interested in entertaining the thoughts. But we have --23 24 MR. PAIGE: This doesn't have anything -25 - it has to do with administration generally, of

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1 the Water Board's doing. Thirty seconds.

2 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Thirty seconds. MR. PAIGE: EPA's smart growth policies 3 4 and objectives of minimizing infrastructure while 5 increasing urban population density cannot be 6 consistent with zero emissions requirement by the 7 Water Quality Control Boards throughout the state. 8 If Porter-Cologne enforcement is to have a positive public participation, flexible, smart 9 growth enforcement that uses a menu of solutions 10 11 would give the Porter-Cologne Act a more contemporary environmental credibility and quicker 12 13 results. It is the only way we're going to get 14 smart growth density in small cities throughout 15 the state, and still meet CEQA regulations and watershed criteria. 16 17 Public participation is the key. So assuming that the public are a bunch of idiots is 18 a real tragedy. Like myself, I'm trying to find a 19 20 solution. Thank you. 21 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay. Mr. Payne, 22 one minute. 23 MR. PAYNE: Thank you for a minute. It 24 was several minutes ago that I put in a card for 25 public comment, and it got lost. And I wanted at

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that time to welcome Mr. Hayashi to the Board. 1 2 And I'm glad to have him here. He knows a lot about people helping other people and a great 3 4 family history that everybody should hear about. 5 The other thing that I wanted to talk 6 about is choices. Many many years ago the 7 Russians made hats out of a little animal called 8 sea otters. And they almost got rid of them for us, but unfortunately somebody felt sorry for them 9 10 and -- by the way, my parents came down here in 11 1953 and lived in Pismo Beach. And my brother used to go clamming for Pismo clams. They were as 12 13 big as gooeyducks and they tasted good, and they 14 weren't as tough as horse necks. And today you'd 15 be lucky if you can find one an inch in diameter. CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Thank you for your 16 17 comments. 18 MR. PAYNE: You're welcome. Wrong 19 choice. 20 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Michael Jones. 21 (Laughter.) CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay. Mr. Bleskey, 22 tell me what -- is this --23 24 MR. BLESKEY: Just some general comments 25 about my experiences here, unrelated to the PETERS SHORTHAND REPORTING CORPORATION (916) 362-2345

project. Just some issues related to what's going
on in Morro Bay --

3 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Go ahead, two 4 minutes. And this is the last interested person 5 comment. We will break after this. And then when 6 we return the prosecution team is going to put its 7 case on.

8

Go ahead.

9 MR. BLESKEY: Chairman Young, thank you 10 for letting me speak. One this is that I've been 11 here now for about seven months, and I envy the 12 central coast residents. I do come from Ventura, 13 and Los Osos is an interesting place to work and 14 it's even more of an interesting place to live, 15 which I do during the week.

16 Since the time that I've gotten here it 17 became quite evident the frustration that your 18 staff has experienced over the course of the 19 challenges facing you right now. And you got some 20 real doozies and some great opportunities, though, 21 too.

But over that course of time and our latest conversations, your staff, especially Harvey and Allison -- I keep wanting to say Alicia -- I think that we're starting to grow the

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relationship that we can cement with your staff 2 over time, from a rocky start. And actually be productive in helping all of the central coast. 3

4 I think the other thing that the central 5 coast has, as a really unique opportunity, is the 6 ability to use a lot of tools that you didn't have 7 about 23 years ago, or, heck, even five years ago. 8 And I see that reflected a lot in your young staff; also in a lot of the young engineers and 9 10 environmentalists that I see coming out now. And 11 their excitement on these opportunities that I, as an engineer from many years ago, didn't have. 12 13 It's pretty cool stuff. And we'll talk about that 14 later when you give me permission to do that. And 15 I appreciate that.

I do want to ask that we do look at the 16 17 problems that we're faced with on the central 18 coast in light of those new tools. Both in 19 technology that can be applied, and also the 20 comments on some of the regionalization issues now 21 in an era of very very sketchy energy costs. We 22 may be better off to look at growing over time, a 23 system or a linkage of systems that have been used 24 in other areas of the state, that we can afford, and that make use of all the skills of your staff 25

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and the citizens and the technology available to 1 2 you. But I did want to come up and say thank 3 4 you for the staff time and their cooperative 5 effort. Thank you, Mr. Young. CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Thank you for your 6 7 comments. MR. MATTINGLY: Can I make one 30-second 8 comment? 9 10 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Wait a minute, --MR. MATTINGLY: Dustan Mattingly --11 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: -- what is it 12 related to? 13 14 MR. MATTINGLY: It's not related to Los 15 Osos sewer or crap problem. What it is concerning is that --16 (Audience speaking simultaneously.) 17 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Your name? 18 19 MR. MATTINGLY: -- you were not given --20 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Excuse me. Your 21 name, please. MR. MATTINGLY: Dustan Mattingly. I 22 said that before. 23 24 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Okay. 25 MR. MATTINGLY: I just wanted to ask if

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maybe, you know, besides Mr. Blakeslee, who I see 1 2 you all gave your full attention to, maybe the rest of the people you could treat like people, 3 4 not emails where you can glance at it and look 5 away. I just noticed you guys were looking out 6 the window or at the camera, doing your hair or 7 something. This gentleman had his hands over his 8 eyes --9 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: Thank you for your comments, sir. 10 MR. MATTINGLY: So if you could just 11 please treat us --12 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: We're going to take 13 14 a break, folks. We're going to come --MR. MATTINGLY: -- like humans --15 CHAIRPERSON YOUNG: -- back at 4:25. 16 17 We'll start the prosecution team's presentation. 18 (Whereupon, at 4:09 p.m., the meeting was adjourned, to reconvene at 4:25 19 20 p.m., this same day.) 21 --000--22 23 24 25
